

## Hornets Next

Whirlwinds invade the Hornet's nest Friday night in a non-district game. Kick-off time is 7:30 p.m.

The Hornets came out of the Ralls game victorious last week and are expected to win the AAA Tulia game.

Head coach L. G. Wilson says they will give the AAA Tulia a good game.

In the process of rebuilding this year and suffering at the hands of AAAA Plainview Bulldogs last year with a 6-4 record last year and coach Richard Hornets continue to rebuild.

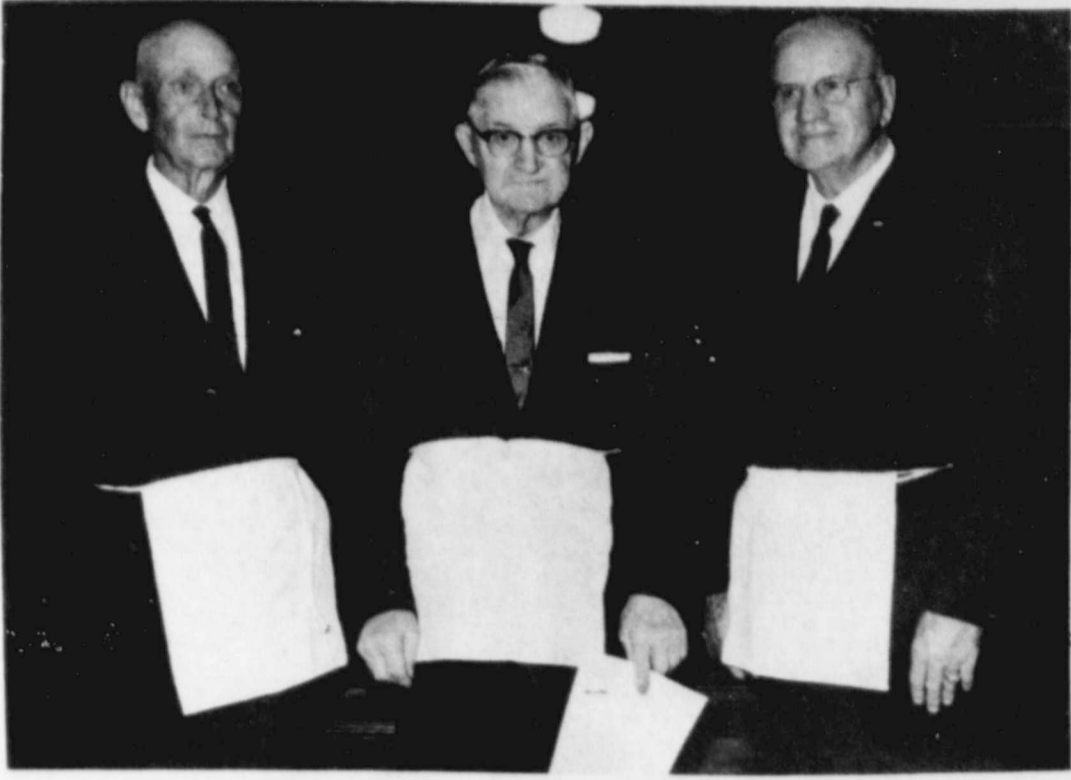

To make the pile which has been crushed down by furniture stand up, use a steam iron on the spot or a dry iron over a damp cloth being careful not to press down on the iron. Then brush the crushed pile.

Sometimes one tuft rises above the others. Do not pull it up, but simply cut it off even with the other tufts with scissors.

During excessively damp weather size of your carpet may increase slightly with temporary buckling. It will probably disappear with dryer conditions, but if not, a carpet layer can solve the problem by restretching the carpet installation.

Often static electricity, created by the friction of walking across a carpet or rug, is felt when one touches a metallic object. One way to reduce this problem is by adding moisture to the air or by applying an anti-static chemical agent to the carpet.

In new rugs and carpets, fluff material appears on the surface. This is usually loose pile left by the manufacturer. The problem ends after all the loose ends have come to the top.

Wear creates a problem especially on the frequently used parts of the rug or carpet. If you have a rug of wear appears. For carpet, use accent or decorative area rugs in these areas. They will increase the life of the carpet and add interest to the room if used with principles of design in mind.

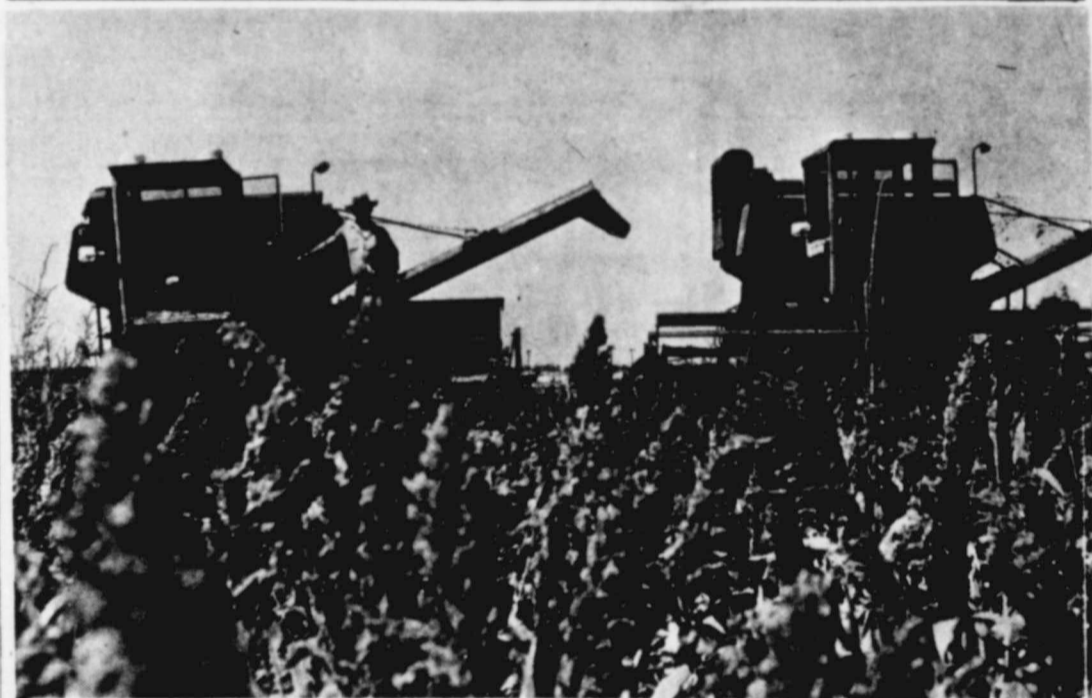

A bi-district meeting of the Farmers Home Administration will be held in Amarillo, Texas on September 24 and 25, 1968 according to County Supervisor Alfred A. Harrison. Information obtained at a regional meeting held in St. Louis on how to check the flow of rural people into urban areas will be discussed by the State Office staff.  
 The local Farmers Home Administration office will be closed from Monday afternoon, September 23 to September 25 due to the meeting. Those attending from Floydada will be Alfred A. Harrison, Donnie R. McCool and Mrs. Neva H. Baxter.  
 Harrison said that through 138 county offices, the Farmers Home Administration in Texas will loan about \$130 million to rural families and communities this fiscal year.  
 Last year, about \$60 million was loaned for operating expenses. Over 4,100 rural Texans received loans to improve or construct homes. More than 660 farmers became land own-

ers through the FHA Farm Ownership loan program, and nearly 250 Texas communities received FHA loans to build or expand water systems, sewer systems, recreation projects, and grazing associations.

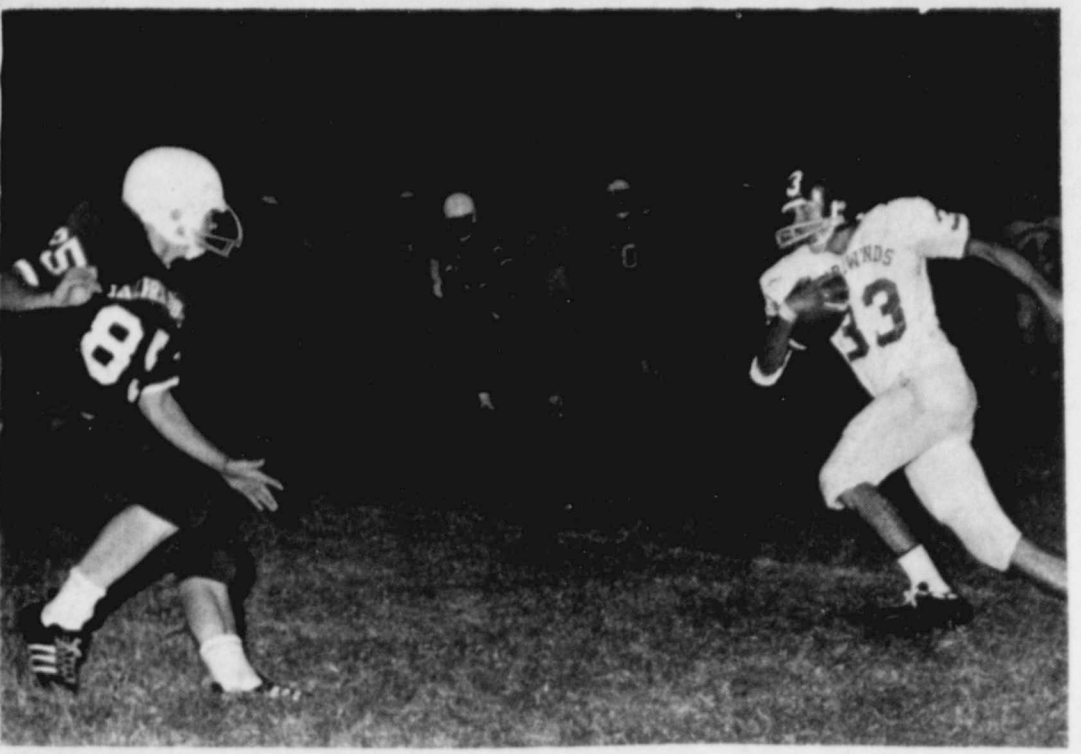

### 3 AA Enjoys Victories In Season Openers

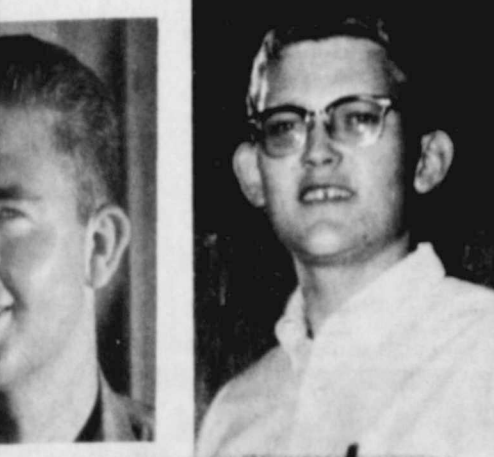
District 3-AA enjoyed unprecedented prosperity Friday night as all seven league members emerged with season opening victories.

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## FHA To Handle Freeman's New Housing And Urban Development

L. J. Capleman, Texas State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, said today he had been notified by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman of the rural housing and rural community planning features of the newly enacted 1968 Housing Act.

The Act was signed into law on August 1 by President Johnson.

Secretary Freeman's state-

ment pointed out the new housing program is part of the President's drive to remove all substandard housing in the nation within a decade, including the 3 million substandard houses that exist today in rural America.

Freeman announced that benefits of the new Housing and Urban Development Act will be channeled into Texas rural areas through the 138 local

county offices of the Farmers Home Administration, and through the rural system of Technical Action Panels.

The Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture supervised credit agency for housing, farming, and community facilities, carries on rural housing programs, established by the new act and previous legislation, for farmers and for other people in the countryside and in rural towns of up to 5,500 population.

New housing services under the act will include -

- \* Housing loan interest supplement payments for families with income too low to meet in full the amortized loan payments on individual rural housing loans.
- \* Interest supplements on loans to develop nonprofit rental and cooperative housing for low-income people.
- \* Financial support for "self-help" housing projects for low-income families including grants to nonprofit organizations for the development and supervision of "self-help" housing projects and loans to nonprofit organizations to buy and develop land to be used as building sites.
- \* Housing and training facilities for rural job trainees and their families.
- \* Expanded housing credit for city people who work in rural areas.
- \* Loans for the purchase of building sites for farm-labor housing.

Freeman announced that the interest-supplement program for individual borrowers under the Farmers Home Administration authority (Title X of the Act) will be placed in effect immediately. Individual loans may be made for up to 33 years, loans for rental and cooperative housing may be made payable over periods up to 50 years.

The interest-supplement program for rural nonprofit rental housing organizations and cooperatives of low-income families will take effect when administrative arrangements are completed. The new provisions for job-trainee and self-help housing assistance will not take effect until funds are appropriated.

The interest-supplement plan seeks to put adequate housing within reach of lower-income families by reducing their loan or rent payments. The supplement payments will be made by the Federal Government.

## Pat Boone Featured With Bovina Twirler Sweetheart At Lubbock Fair

A minimum requirement is that a home-ownership borrower who does not have enough income to pay his loan installments in full will pay at least the amount that would be due if the interest rate were one percent.

The actual amount that a low-income family will need to pay will depend on its income and the size of the family.

Freeman said the new Act will facilitate a back-to-the-country movement by city dwellers who work in rural areas.

The Act also eliminates an old provision that any tenant admitted to a Farmers Home Administration-financed rental unit, or any new member of a rural housing co-op, must already be a rural resident. In the future, low-income city dwellers who work in rural localities may move directly from the city into Farmers Home Administration-financed rental or co-op units.

Technical Action Panels, which include local representatives of USDA agencies that have local offices in rural areas, will help rural communities gain access to all provisions of the new housing legislation that can be adapted for use in small towns.

More than three dozen bands also are expected to be in the parade. Dr. Russell L. Wiley, director of bands at the University of Kansas, will serve as judge.

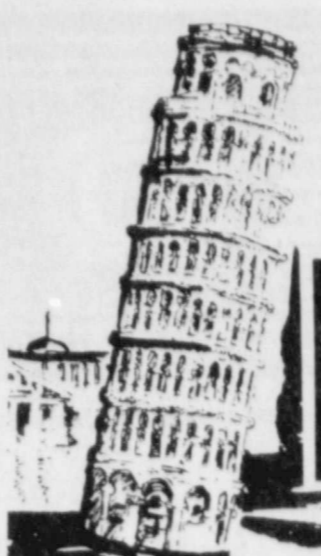

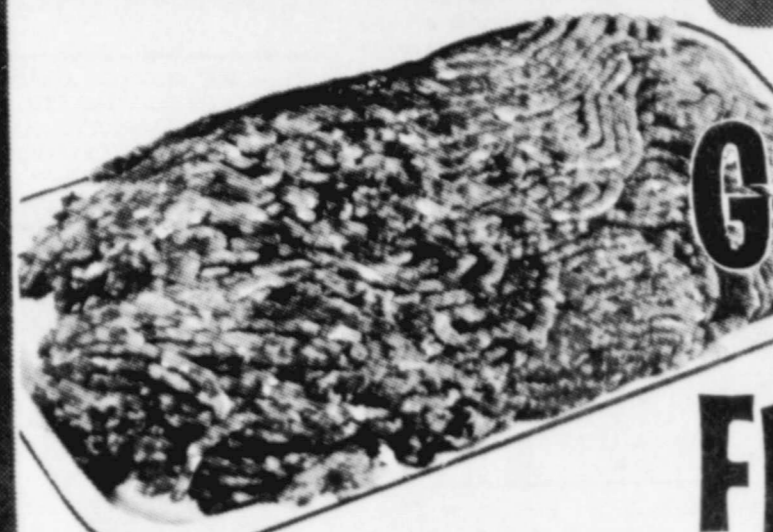

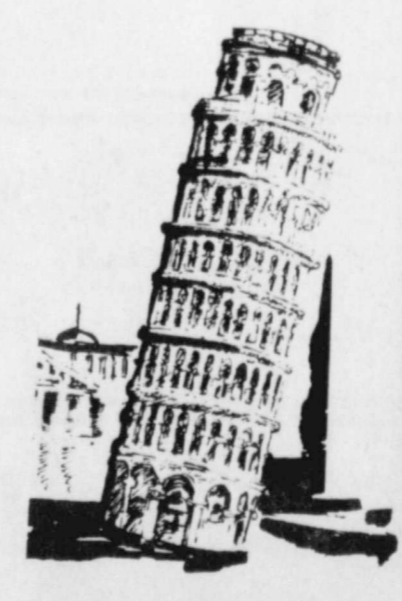
