School, City, Hospital Elections Saturday

Mayor, City Council, School Board Offices Contested



Floydada voters will choose a mayor, two city councilmen and representatives on the hospital and school boards Saturday in the midst of the Easter weekend.

Two candidates are vying for the title of mayor of Floydada—incumbent mayor Leonard Matsler and Jimmy Seay. Each seeks to serve a two-year term as head of the city council.

Two vacancies exist for the Floydada council with four candidates seeking election to the office.

Poling place for the city election will be at City Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. Saturday.

City Secretary, Jimmie Lou Stewart, reported a record turnout for the absentee balloting with 44 voters casting their ballots in the city election.

There are usually only about four or five cast by absentee in the city election so this surpasses the absentee balloting in recent years, she said.

Election judge in the city election will be R. M. Battey assisted by T. S. Brown with clerks Mrs. Jesse Smith and Mrs. J. G. Wood.

In the school board election, two vacancies exist and four persons have filed for the election; Mrs. Lon Davis Jr., Elmer Biggs, James Lee Nichols and Alex Wall.

Poling place for the Floydada school board will be in the County Courtroom from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. School board election judge will be Claude Weathersbee.

Walton Hale and J. S. Hale are the candidates for the hospital board with this election being held in the county judge's office. The election judge for the hospital board election will be Jack McIntosh.

County Clerk Margaret Collier also reported a heavy turnout in the absentee balloting. Thirty-nine persons voted in the hospital election, 72 for the school board election.

20,000 HEAD CAPACITY

Lockney Go On Cattle Feedlot

All signals are green for construction of the Lockney Cooperatives feedlot!

Board of directors gave the go-ahead last week for the proposed 20,000 head feedlot after the financial goal had been met. Stockholders voted by a 78-3 margin March 14 to undertake the project, and officials stated at that time that \$550,000 would have to be raised in a 10-day period.

Contacts already are being made to secure a manager. The board hopes to hire the manager as quickly as possible so that he may "get in on the ground floor of building the feedlot."

Actual construction is anticipated to get underway "within 90 to 100 days."

NO SITE PICKED. No site has been selected. Co-op manager Mondell Mills said that "very little work is expected to be done on the site for two or three weeks."

STOCKING IN NOVEMBER. Cattle are expected to start being received November 1 on a limited basis. Projection calls for the lot to reach its 20,000 head capacity about April 1970.

A crew of approximately 22 persons is anticipated. The management will hire employees as they are needed.

Should individuals already committed to purchase stock fail to do so, persons on the waiting list then would be given first chance at the stock, Mills says.

Money committed for purchase of either type of stock must be received by the Co-op office not later than April 5.

The board decided at last Monday night's session to close sale of capital and first preferred stock for the present. Anyone still desiring stock may sign his name on a waiting list at the Lockney Cooperatives

NFO Meets Tonight. An organizational meeting of the National Farmers Organization will be held tonight in the Lighthouse Electric Meeting Room at 8 p.m.

Guest speaker at the meeting will be Bobby McBeth, president of the Hale County NFO.

McBeth said the purpose of the organization is to unite the farmers to increase the bargaining power.

"Through collective bargaining, the farmer can insure a better price for his products and keep the market at a more stable level," he said.

"The farmer is not content with his present economic situation and through NFO these men can gain their needed representation," he added.

The organization was founded in 1955 with branches in 27 states. Since that time, the organization has spread to 46 states and has doubled its membership in the last 14 months, McBeth commented.

McBeth said that all interested persons are invited to attend the meeting but only farmers are eligible for membership.

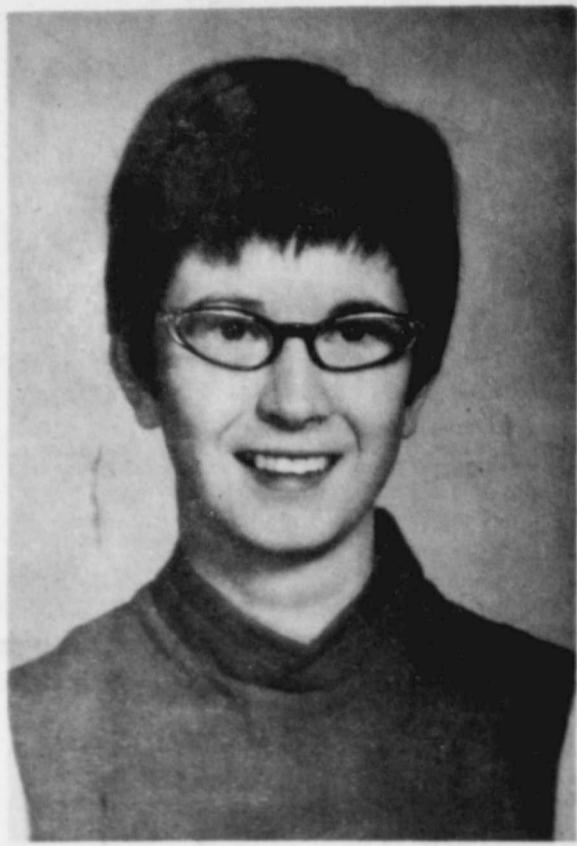

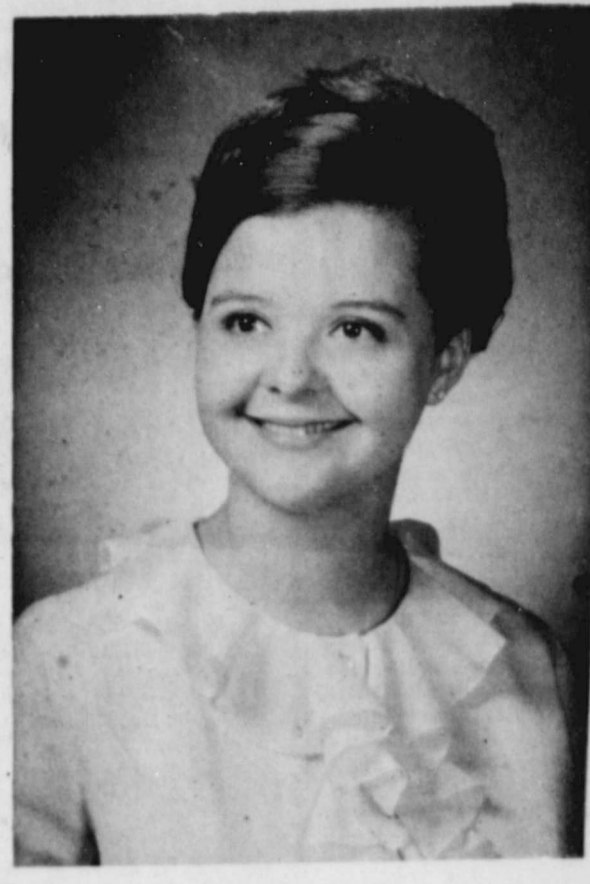

Kirk and his wife, Kaye, are the parents of two children. Their older child is a daughter, Sarianne, 7. The younger is a son, Philip, 4 1/2.

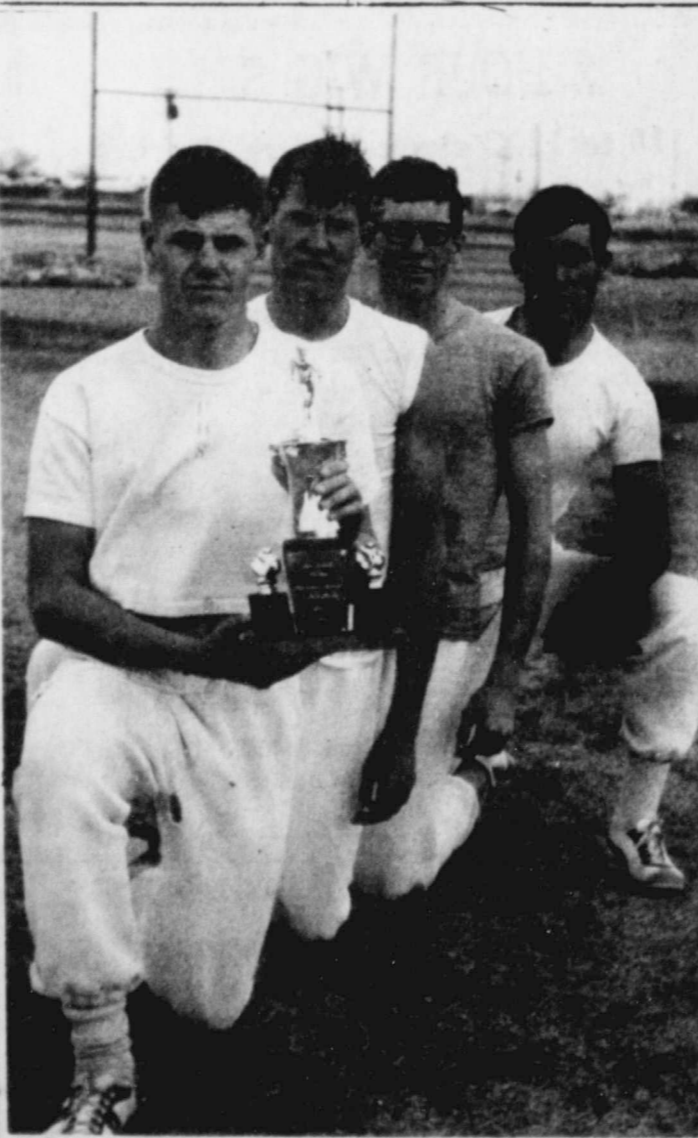

In the 300 intermediate hurdles, Steve Puckett placed third with a time of 42.3.

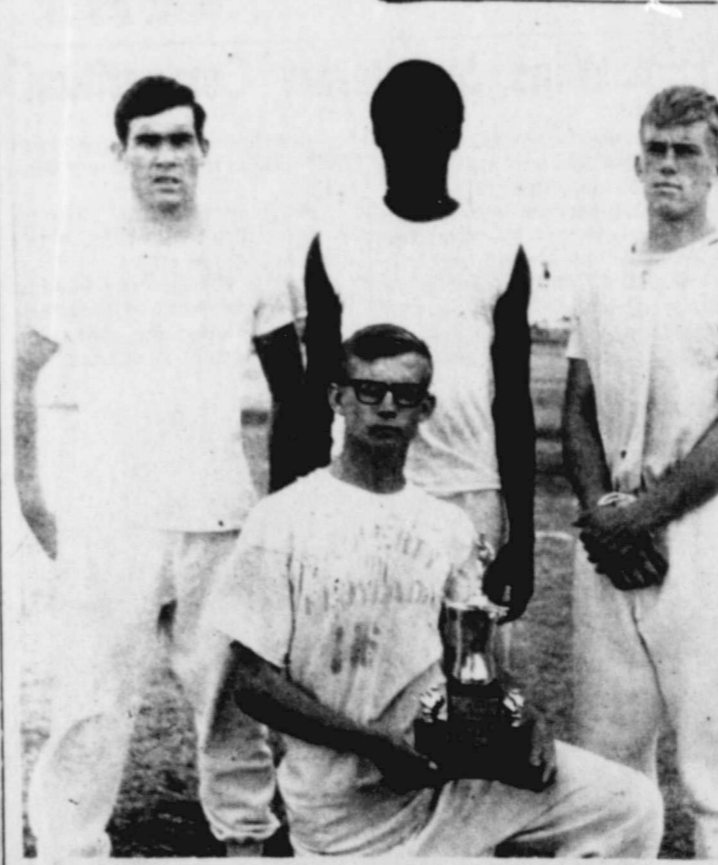
Andy Selman, Steve Puckett, Charles Jackson, and Stan Pierce won second place in the

Most weapons can be rendered harmless by a trained expert in this field and these articles can be returned to their owners upon request.

Ike Ordered Flag Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower more than 12 years ago issued the rules under which flags on all U.S. government buildings and installations are being flown at half-staff in his memory.

Eisenhower's proclamation, dated Dec. 13, 1956, established uniform rules for display of the U.S. flag at half-staff "as a mark of respect" upon the death of certain officials.

Brother Of Floydada Men Dalhart's Outstanding Citizen

Ed Bishop, a 130 pound human dynamo liberally wired with community building and public service attributes, was last week selected the outstanding citizen of the year at the Dalhart Chamber of Commerce banquet.

He is the brother of J. B. and Baird Bishop.

The Dalhart Texan newspaper has this to say about Ed. Bishop is a native of Osage, Tex., but when he was still a small child his parents moved with their children to Floydada where he was reared.

A less self-reliant and courageous family could have been crushed and embittered by the tragedy that struck when Ed was about 12, and still in elementary school.

Drug stores in those days sold prescription liquors as a medicine but only on a doctor's orders. Bishop's father was a druggist. One day a man with a gun but with no prescription, demanded liquor. When the elder Bishop refused the man shot him to death.

Bishop's mother and her children wanted to keep the family together — and they did through hard work and sacrifice. Ed Bishop, his two older brothers — J. B. and Baird — and then mother, Mrs. Bishop all went to work. The two younger children, Tom and Bernice, were too small.

The mother, the late Mrs. S. D. (Jennie) Bishop, saw to it that her children had a public school education, but the children gave up the recreation and amusements that most school-age children in order to help their mother.

The children pitched into any job they could find — lawn yard and janitor work to name a very few. While shining shoes in a barber shop, Ed Bishop became interested in being a barber and became one. After graduation from Floydada High School he went to Chicago about six months as a barber — but West Texas was in his blood and he returned to Floydada, continuing as a barber.

But it wasn't long before he was made manager of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce. Soon after he and Beryl were married, he accepted the job of assistant to the city manager in Plainview. Then in May that year he became manager of the Dalhart C. of C.

Dalhart then, as now, had many effective and enthusiastic highway boosters. Bishop immediately became a valuable addition to their ranks. He convinced the C. of C. that the only way to get paving, even on U. S. highways in the Dalhart area was to send delegations before the three-member Texas Highway Commission in Austin.

The C. of C. decided to send Bishop as a delegation member. He proved effective and was sent so many times to Austin that he was on a first-name basis with most, if not all, the Highway Commissioners and other key personnel in the Highway Department, and established valuable contacts with other high state officials.

The only time the Bishop family has been away from Dalhart since Ed and Beryl moved here in 1930 was for a brief 1936-37 period when Plainview

made an exceptionally attractive offer to Bishop, then still manager of the Dalhart C. of C., to become its city manager.

But when Bishop in 1937 had the chance to take over The Dalhart Texan as publisher, he and his family returned to Dalhart. His interest in newspaper work probably started with his first C. of C. job when part of his duties, in connection with community promotion, was to write news stories for papers — from the local level to the big state dailies. He had a natural flair for writing. His stories were widely accepted, even by the big dailies.

As soon as he returned to Dalhart as the Texan publisher, he was immediately back in civic and community work.

He had been a key figure in obtaining Rita Blanca Dam that created what is now Rita Blanca Lake Park, now a popular spot for fishing, boating, water skiing, and for sightseers, picnickers, vacationers who like to camp out. The Lake Park now has the Coliseum and Live-stock Pavilion, and other facilities for a wide variety of entertainment and sports.

Bishop made one trip to Washington, in connection with the Dalhart area's effort to get the government-built dam, and during that trip had an audience with then President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

He was among the community leaders who helped get the World War II Dalhart Army Air Base and two satellite bases that at their peak had 9,000 military personnel plus a good many civilian personnel.

He became a Mason while still at Floydada where he also became a Lion and has been one since, except that at Plainview he was a Kiwanian. He has been active in the Lions Club during all his Dalhart residence and is a past president.

Bishop sold his newspaper interests in 1947 to the present owners, but kept the job printing and office supply departments that he still operates under the name of the Bishop Office Supply.

As he moved out of the newspaper field, he established Dalhart's first and only radio station, Station KXIT, now owned and operated by Bob and Leonard (Len) Beller.

Mr. and Mrs. Bishop's two sons, after finishing their public schooling in Dalhart went on to college.

Jerry Ed, the oldest, lives with his family in New York City where he is science editor of The Wall Street Journal. He has personally covered all of America's space launchings except one; and already has solid plans to cover the next one. In 1966, he and Douglas M. Davis authored a book, "New Horizons In Medicine."

Boll Weevil Test To Be Held In Crosbyton Area

Some 30,000 pheromone are now being prepared in Crosbyton for the hopeful goal of suppressing or possibly eradicating the Boll Weevil in this area.

The trap, which has been developed in the last two years by Dr. D.D. Hardy of the Boll Weevil Research Laboratory at Mississippi State University, and has undergone testing on a small scale, is going to be used here in a large scale to saturate the hibernation areas in the north part of Dickens, Motley, Hall, and a small part of Briscoe Counties in order to catch the weevils as they come out of hibernation. They play to initiate the operation on or around the first of April.

In addition to these tests with the traps, trap crop plantings of cotton will be transplanted in the fields with a history of early boll weevil infestations and will be treated with a systemic insecticide, "Timik."

The traps are to run every seven days and close records are to be kept on the number of weevils caught so that progress of the program may be accurately checked.

The principal behind the trap is that the male weevil emits an attractant (pheromone) which attracts other weevils, both male and female, but largely the female is attracted. The live weevils are placed in a small screen cage located in the center of the trap coated with the "stickim" and other weevils are attracted by those in the cage, are caught and they will eventually die.

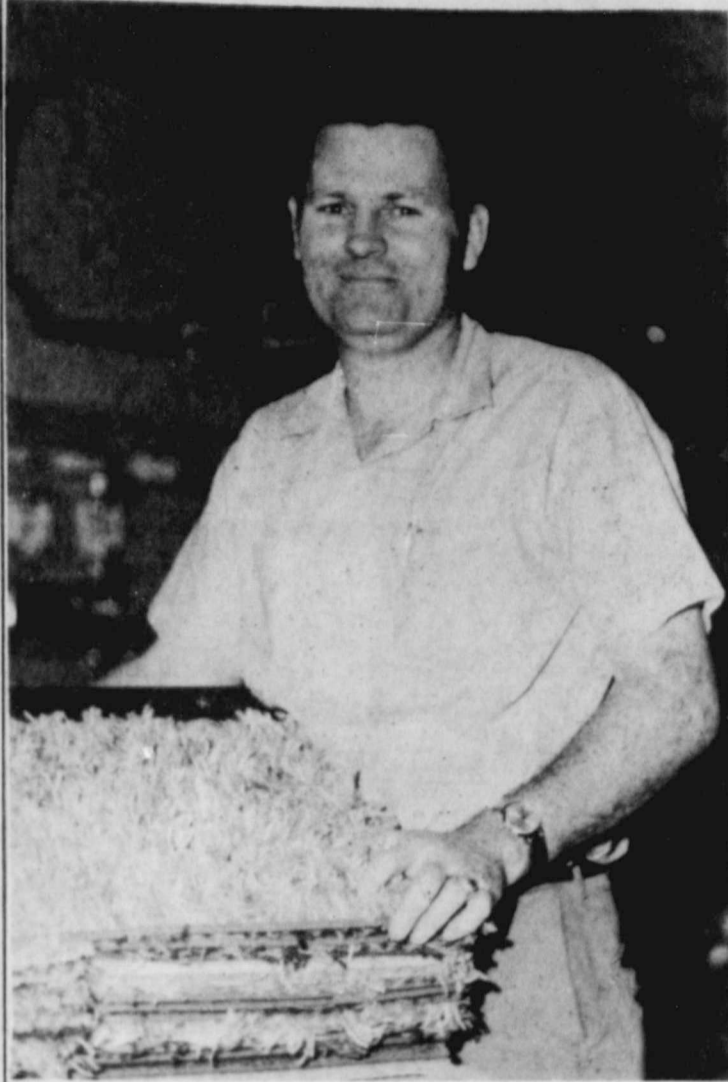

Hey, Charlie Brown - Kite Gobbling Power Lines are more dangerous than Kite-Gobbling Trees--

Almost every kiteflier is familiar with Charlie Brown's kite-eating tree.

Fewer kitefliers, perhaps, are aware that power lines also gobble up kites if they're flown too near them.

There's a grave danger in this kind of kite-eater. Each year one hears or reads of some kiteflier who has been electrocuted by flying a kite into a power line.

Such a tragic end to a sport that appeals to kitefliers of all ages can be avoided. The rules for eliminating the danger of kiteflying are, first, only fly kites in open fields where there are no nearby power lines; second, use dry string only. Wet string or any string with metal in it conducts electricity.

Third, should the kite, by any chance, fly into a power line, let go of the string at once. It is dangerous to hold on or to try to yank the kite out of the power line.

Kite-eating trees are just frustrating, but kite-eating power lines are a serious danger. We urge parents to emphasize the danger of flying kites near power lines to their youngsters this spring. The warning could save a life.

Have you ever made CORNMEAL WAFFLES? These are

good for any meal.
2 eggs
1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
3/4 cup cornmeal
1 1/2 cups buttermilk
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup melted shortening or cooking oil

Beat eggs well, stir in buttermilk. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Combine with cornmeal. Blend fry ingredients into buttermilk mixture. Stir in shortening. (If batter seems thick, add 2 or 3 more tablespoons buttermilk.) Bake in hot waffle iron. Makes about 10 waffles.

These are especially good made with your own molasses syrup.

1/2 cup light molasses
1 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 cup water

Combine all ingredients except butter in a saucepan and cook on low heat, mixing well. Bring to boiling point. Boil 2 to 3 minutes. Add butter, stirring until melted. Remove from heat and serve. Makes about 2 1/2 cup syrup.

constitution to give the nonprofit water supply companies an exemption from taxes on their lines and water systems. SB54 would carry the constitutional provision into effect if it is voted.

Under a program of the Farmers Home Administration, hundreds of loans have been made for the construction of water systems in rural areas. The loans are being repaid out of water sales.

Organizers used the voluntary water company system rather than creating water districts which would have been exempt from property taxes because they are governmental agencies. They found that organizing costs were simpler, and it was not necessary to have elections and issue bonds.

But Watson said that in some areas county tax assessors are levying taxes on the water systems.

Lt. Governor Ben Barnes referred the proposed constitutional amendment to the Senate Constitutional Amendments Committee, and the enabling bill to the State Affairs Committee.

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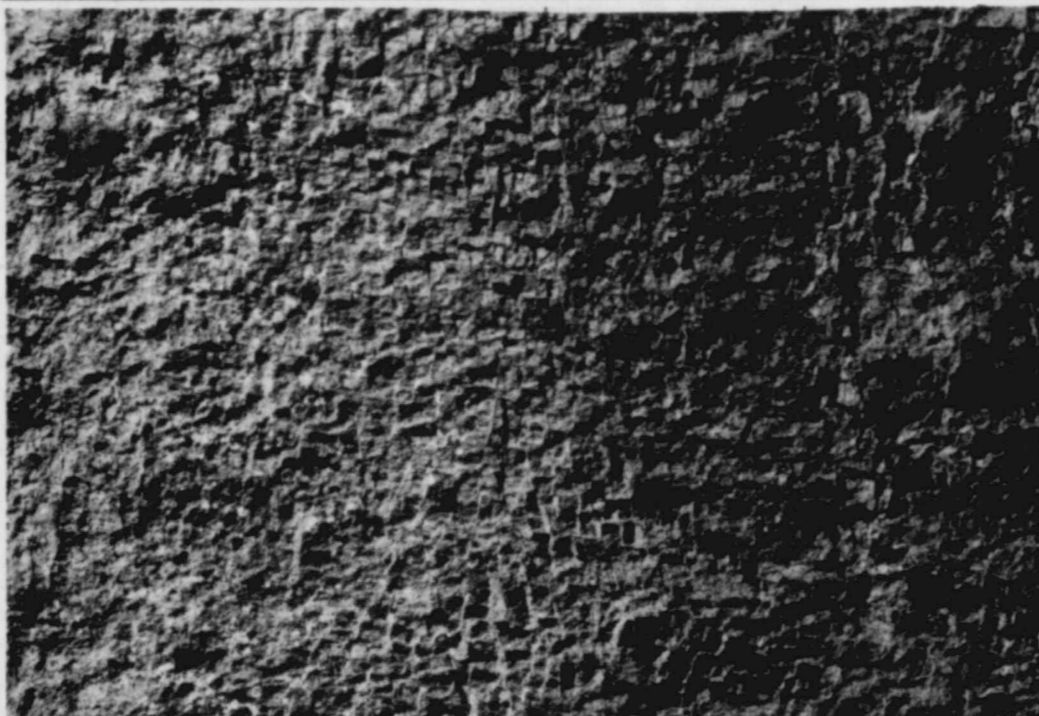

From Suffering And Death To Resurrection

A number of important events transpired before the advent of the suffering and death of Jesus Christ. As we study these events we begin, with the twenty-twenty vision of hindsight, to ponder more seriously His suffering, death and equally, his resurrection. We see Christ traveling across his native land and the wonders he worked in his preaching. We see a pattern of proofs developing, proofs which we can look back on and study. These proofs of his claims seem to tell us "What I say and do, I say and do in earnest. Your belief in me is a belief, a trust, well placed!

These events and proofs seem to come to an unusually clear perspective on two occasions. The first comes as Christ presents himself to a few specially chosen apostles in his transfiguration. He shows in a preview fashion the glory of the resurrection. He gives a notice of events to come. He cautions his apostles, "Tell no one what you have seen until the Son of Man is risen from the dead." And these disciples argued among themselves, "What did he mean, 'Until the Son of Man is risen from the dead.' " He had given a forecast of what was coming, but they failed to understand.

Again, on receiving word of the death of a very close friend, Lazarus, the brother of Mary and Martha, he gives his followers a hint of his impending sufferings and death. But they fail to grasp what he was saying so that the import of the miracle of Lazarus' return to the living, for the moment at least, was all but lost on them.

For us, the importance of his words is equally lost if we fail to see the fact of his suffering and death before he rose from the dead to glory. The reality of suffering, frustration, death must be endured before glory is available. To obtain a share in his glory, we must share in his suffering. Perhaps, through neglect of this consideration, we now find ourselves in the dilemma we experience in our own pleasure and comfort bent society.

Help us really to dig in Jesus, and be with you at the cross. After all of the poor representations of 'Biblical' movies, it is hard for me to see your cross as it really is.

I imagine it was sweaty and hot on that cross. When you said I thirst, I am sure you were thirsty. It was easy to say you were thirsting for men's souls, but it seems we use this as a reason to avoid accepting your humanity. Why do we try to forget that you were a man, hanging on the cross for hours, who simply needed something to drink.

Can we somehow get through all the decoration which has been developed about the cross and just be quiet and be there with you?

I know the real cross wasn't pretty at all. Why is reality about you so shocking to us, Lord? Your death was bloody and dirty and very real. Can't we face it that way? And can't we face the fact that you were a real man, living a human life, as well as God?

As we seek to participate in the suffering of Jesus we must try harder to see the cross in life around us. The crucifixion is not simply an historical event 2,000 years ago. The crucifixion is continuing to happen now.

The Christian chooses to die with Christ that he may be saved by believing in Him who conquered death. "I am the Resurrection. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies, he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" He has proven the truth of this by his own resurrection.

But to believe this is to accept Christ as the proven risen source of Salvation and therefore accept what he has shown in his life and teachings.

"Now if Christ raised from the dead is what has been preached, how can some of you be saying that there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead Christ himself cannot have been raised, and if Christ has not been raised then our preaching is useless and your believing it is useless; indeed, we are shown up as witnesses who have committed perjury before God, because we swore in evidence before God that he had raised Christ to life. For if the dead are not raised, Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, you are still in your sins. And what is more serious, all who have died in Christ have perished. If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people. (1 Cor. 15:12-19)

We are destined to suffer with Christ to rise with him. He suffered and rose as the head of the body, as the root of the vine, then, the members of the body, the branches of the vine too must suffer together to rise together with him in glory.

The inevitable conclusion follows. I must take an interest in the person next to me because he, too, was created to share in the suffering as well as the glory of Christ. His problems become my problems, his frustrations become my frustrations, as well as his joy is my joy. I must share now as well as share in glory later because we are members of the redeemed in the Passion and Resurrection of the Savior.

All men must be treated and respected as sharers in this suffering and this glory as a people destined for glory, not just as the individual seeking his own personal happiness and satisfaction because Christ suffered and died to save all men.

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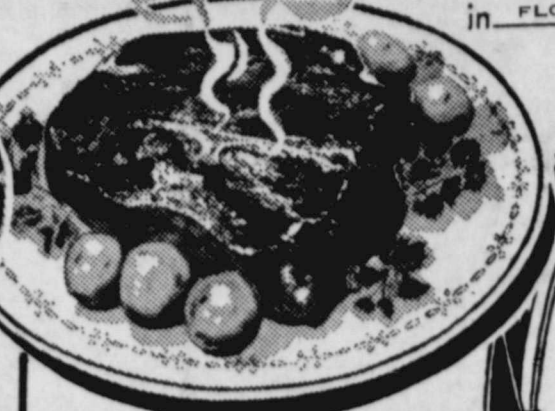
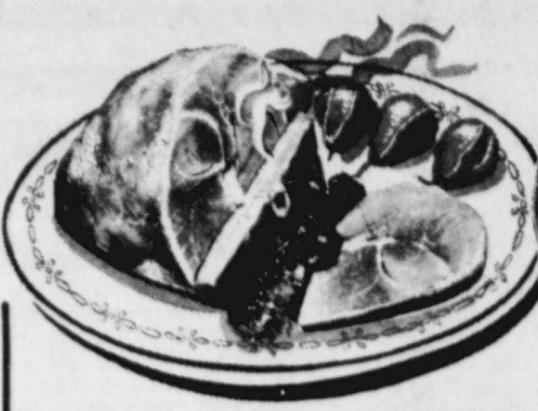
