ULTON of the McCoy Community is another pro-stander he caught a four pound bass down at White River Lake.

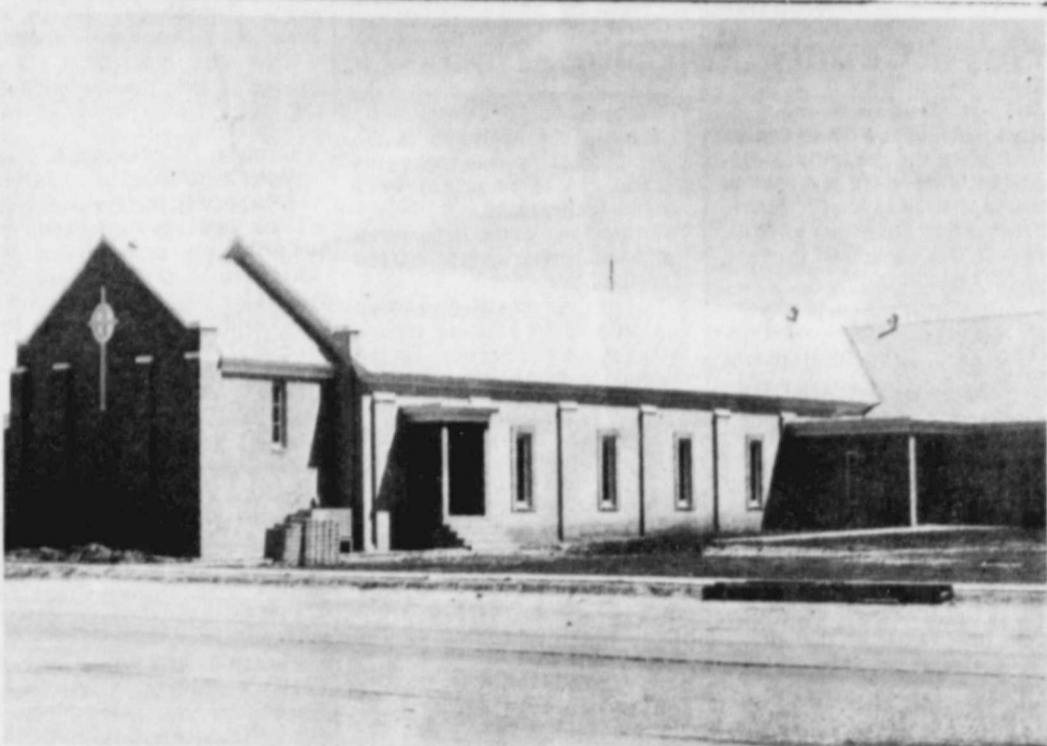

First Christian Church Open House Sunday

The public is invited to attend Consecration Services and an "Open house" showing of the Floydada First Christian Church at 2:30 p.m. Sunday. The sanctuary and educational areas of the church have been completely remodeled with new furniture, equipment and other improvements. The consecration service will be under the direction of Dr. Elmer D. Henson, dean Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University. He will be introduced by Lon Davis Jr. He will be assisted by minister of the church, Dwayne Grimes, Johnny Moore, minister of the Slaton First Christian Church and president of the High Plains Area Association of Christian Churches. Floydada mayor Jimmy Seay and chairman of the board of the local church Cecil Hagood will also participate in the Consecration Services.



Dr. Henson Following the services, the public is invited to view the improvements made in the church. Dr. Henson is a graduate of Texas Christian University with the BA, BD, and DD degrees. He also did graduate study at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He has been dean of Brite Divinity School since 1955. The theme of the program is "60 Years of Fellowship in Christ." The completion of the church rebuilding work comes at a time when the church is observing its 60th Anniversary, 1909 to 1969.

Truck And Train Collide

A Santa Fe Railroad locomotive and a diesel truck loaded with 25,000 pounds of meat collided at the railroad crossing in the 500 block of East Houston, Friday night. Robert M. Ola, driver of the truck received slight injuries in the mishap and was treated and released from Caprock Hospital with a sprained back and a few cuts and scratches on his arms. Deputy Sheriff, Connie Reed said the accident occurred at 10:05 p.m. Friday and traffic was jammed up at the intersection until 12:30 a.m. "I didn't see the train as I was approaching the intersection," Ola said. There were no flares or any other lights at the crossing and when I did see the train it was too late to stop, so I tried to speed up and cross the tracks. The train missed the cab of the truck and struck the right side of the trailer loaded with meat. "I've been driving trucks for 18 years and have had some close calls but this is my first accident," he said.

Dr. Foote Speaks To Rotarians

Dr. Foote said that in the ninth commandment we are told not to bear false witness, lies about Jesus killed him, Hitler's lies killed five million Jews. He cautioned about use of insinuations and half truths. 2. Is it fair? Aristotle said hear both sides. 3. Will it build good will? We believe in freedom of speech but it should not be indulged with rioting. We will lose all speech unless we conserve law and order. Are we ditch diggers between groups of people, or builders who unite our fellowmen. Our job is to smooth the pathways of life for those who come after. 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned? Preceding Dr. Foote's talk, Irish singer Wesley Boyd accompanied by his wife Margaret on the piano entertained the Rotarians with some songs.

Golf Tournament Begins Friday

AUSTIN - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and state director of defense and disaster relief, today reminded Texans that the peak tornado season has arrived. Information obtained from the U. S. Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicates that Texas reported 140 tornadoes during the past year. This figure compares with a record number of 232 during 1967, of which more than half occurred in September in connection with Hurricane Beulah. Since 1951, Texas has reported 1,659 tornadoes. There were no months free from twisters in 1968. The peak tornado months, April, May, and June, produced 13, 48, and 21 tornadoes, respectively. Other totals included January 2; February 1; March 3; July 4; August 8; September 5; October 8; November 11; and December 16. A circular of tornado safety rules has been prepared by the Department of Public Safety, and is available through the Floydada City Hall. Three safety units will be on guard for tornadoes in this area. The Texas Highway Patrol will observe weather conditions a few miles out of the city limits. Working closer into the city will be the sheriff's department, and the city police will work inside the city limits. City Manager Bill Feuerbacher will coordinate cause at the central control in city hall.

Tornado Alert Friday

A test of the tornado warning sirens will be had Friday, April 25, at 2:30 p.m. The test will be to determine if the sirens are operating properly and will be only one solid blast for 45 seconds. The regular tornado warning signal is as follows: A. One solid blast for 45 seconds; B. Wait one minute; C. Repeat three times (A&B); SEE TORNADO PAGE 7

Spring Sports Banquet Saturday

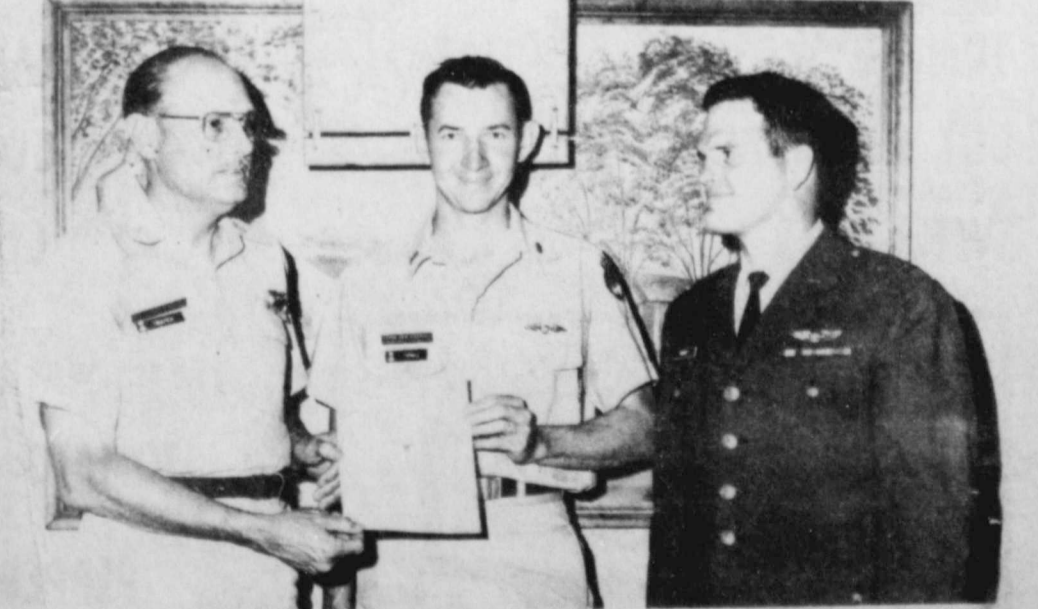

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all the claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.
