Vacation Bible School Will Begin Monday; Enroll June 1

Farm Home Near Friona Destroyed By Fire Sunday

The farm home of J. W. Beattie, two and a half miles north of Friona, was destroyed by fire Sunday afternoon.

The house and all furnishings were completely destroyed.

The Friona Fire Department made the run to the scene, but the fire was out of control and the house nearly destroyed by the time the firemen arrived.

Mrs. Beattie was cooking on an oil or gas stove when the fuel tank ran dry, and in pouring more fuel into the tank, the vapor ignited and the fire spread so rapidly that she had just time to get herself and the children out of the house.

Mr. Beattie was not at home at the time, and one of the small girls ran to the home of a neighbor a quarter of a mile away for help.

Mrs. Beattie's hair was singed but none of the family was injured.

The people of Friona went to the aid of the family with clothing, food and other needed articles.

I have lived on the farm, and since 1937, I have worked for different businesses in Friona, including nearly four years with the Friona State Bank, where I was employed as assistant cashier when I was drafted into the armed service on October 21, 1941. I served four years with our Air Forces, including 2 1-2 years of foreign service with the 9th Air Force in the Middle East, the 12th Air Force in North Africa and the 15th Air Force in Italy. I was honorably discharged at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, October 21, 1945. I took advantage of the educational opportunities offered in the army and attended the Air Force Clerical School at Ft. Logan, Colo., and a School of Gases at O'Fallon, Ill.

I did a great deal of personal and administrative work in the army, as well as work in the field of the generation of breathing oxygen for flying combat crews on our heavy bombers overseas.

I returned to Friona after my discharge, and was married to Miss Wana Vestal of Friona, who has had considerable teaching experience in Parmer County schools. Soon after the first of the year I was employed as bookkeeper by the Friona Consumers Co., where I have served to the present.

I feel that I am well qualified to serve as your county and district clerk, and if elected I will always strive to faithfully and honestly discharge the obligations of the important office with which you have entrusted me.

In the course of the campaign I will endeavor to see as many of the citizens of Parmer County as time and circumstances permit, and I will greatly appreciate any consideration you may see fit to give me.

Lee H. McElroy of Farwell, County Agent for Parmer County, was a visitor in Friona last Wednesday forenoon, and favored the Star office with a short visit.

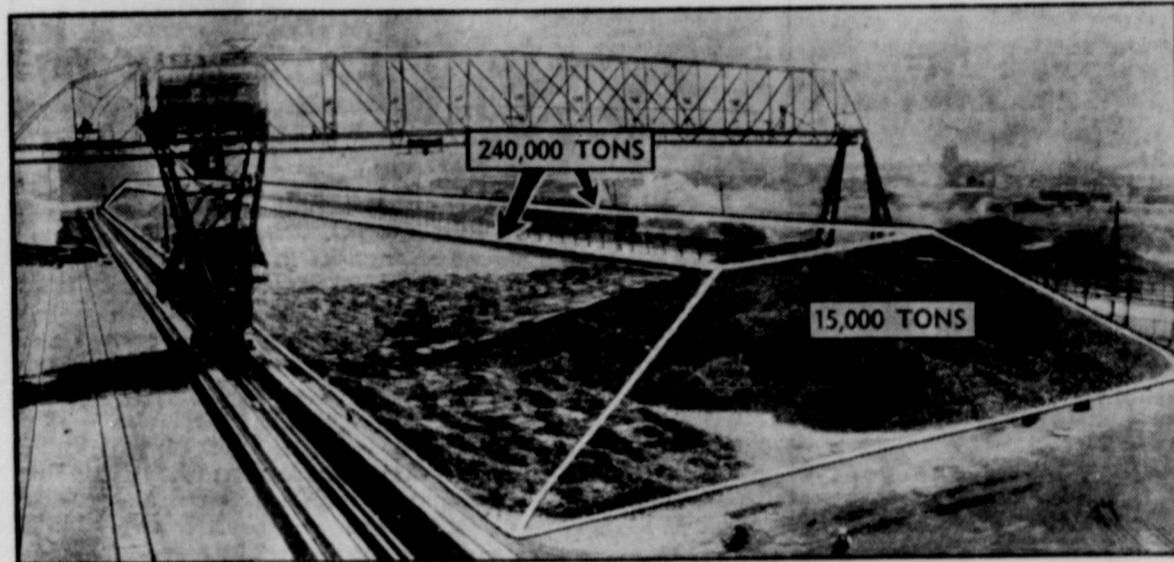

Memorial Table For War Dead Is Erected Here

A monument dealer from Clovis was here Tuesday erecting the Memorial Monument or tablet which has been prepared in memory of the boys of Parmer County who paid the supreme price for this country during the recent World War II.

This memorial tablet was suggested by two of the buddies of the Friona American legion post No. 296, who originated the idea, and which was adopted unanimously by all the buddies at a regular meeting of the post.

After adopting the idea, and during that same meeting, donations were offered by those present and the greater part of the cost of the monument was secured then and there. Later, business firms or individuals of Friona were allowed to contribute toward the completion of the fund for defraying the entire expense of the project, although the members of the Post had originally planned to raise the entire amount among themselves.

Therefore, it will be seen that no outside suggestions regarding such a move were offered, much less adopted by the Legionnaires and only at the request of some local business concerns were any funds offered or accepted.

Insofar as the best information the Star's reporter was able to secure regarding the matter, Legionnaires Foister Rector and Frank Griffith were responsible for the idea and its presentation to the members of the Post. So, to this group of men should go all the compliment for the erection of this beautiful memorial, which was unveiled with fitting ceremonies as a part of the Memorial Day services held here yesterday, Thursday, May 30, Memorial Day.

FRIONA WEATHER

Mostly just typical Panhandle weather—cold in the mornings, hot in the middle and ideal during the evenings and early nights, with a few six-inch sprinkles scattered through the week, when other places were getting showers, the heaviest one coming early Tuesday morning when the drops actually fell so close that they actually ran together. And it was so cold that everybody but a few of the smaller folk, wore their shoes and the men wore their socks.

But the highlight of the week's weather capers was the strong southeast wind, which raged a part of Sunday night and all day Monday and far into the night, threatening all the time to tear the limbs from the trees and demolish the houses, but it never did. But dirt was in the air and much real estate was changing hands without a transfer title. Strong southwest wind prevailed on Wednesday.

In connection with our proposed sewer system, the City Commission has approved a plan whereby we will be able to finance the cost of this system without having to raise the tax rate more than 30 cents on the \$100 valuation, Mayor Glenn E. Reeves said this week.

"At present the city has a 70 cent tax rate, and we believe that by raising this to \$1 on the \$100 valuation, we will be able to meet our obligations without any trouble," he said.

This assumes that 75 percent of the water consumers will be willing to tie onto the sewer system at a flat rate of \$1.50 per month. This rate is figured for domestic users and not for commercial users. Rate for commercial users will be determined by the amount of water consumed during the month.

A bond issue of \$82,000 will be voted on; this being the engineer's estimate of the cost of the system. City officials believe a contractor's bid on the job may be somewhat less than that figure.

"The system will cover, as nearly as possible, every residence in town with the exception of Block 1," Mayor Reeve pointed out, "and by making some changes we perhaps will be able to cover that block also. We have maps that we will be glad to show anyone interested in seeing them, and any questions regarding same will be gladly answered if possible."

"One thing to remember is to find out the facts as when voting time comes, have your mind made up and go cast your vote as you like and not be influenced by someone else."

"There will be more information before voting time, and we will get this to you through the paper, such as who are qualified voters, how to mark ballots, where and when to vote, etc."

The city is in excellent financial condition, it is pointed out, with total assets, including cash on hand and collectible at fixed assets of \$81,816.76. Capital and surplus as of the end of June, 1945, was \$42,654.48, and surplus accumulated since that time is \$5,537.66.

Deaf Smith county producers may avoid some feed difficulties by making preparation now to produce high quality feed at home. Soybeans make high grade hay when harvested as the beans are about half mature and the beans are an excellent source of protein when harvested at maturity. The beans can be processed at Amarillo or Lubbock and processors at both places are anxious to obtain beans according to recent information.

MEXICO ENTERS NEW ERA



For the first time since the revolution Mexico will elect a president who is not a general. Leading candidates are Miguel Aleman, pictured above with his wife and daughter Beatriz, and Ezequiel Padilla. Aleman, a Vera Cruz attorney and former governor of that state was head of the cabinet under President Avila Camacho and is the overwhelming favorite to be elected July 7.

His program calls for greatly expanded irrigation to open up millions of acres to farming, introduction of woman suffrage, improved housing conditions, improvement in the standard of living, a program of education far in advance of anything previously known in Mexico, and a road and railroad system which will make new markets available to the farmers and to the artisans in rural areas.

Aleman is the son of a revolutionary general who was killed in action. He is the candidate of the Institutional Revolutionary Party, Mexico's only political party. Padilla is an independent candidate.

Wheat Prospects in Santa Fe Area Dim, Says Railroad's Last Survey

On account of continued dry weather, the general condition of wheat in Northwest Texas is gradually declining, according to the latest Santa Fe Railway estimates based on reports received up to April 27.

Very little moisture has fallen in this region since last September, the Amarillo weather bureau reporting only 3.4 inches of rainfall between October 1 and April 26.

Wheat on summer fallow is still holding its own fairly well, but that on other land is becoming spotted and badly burned.

With the summer fallow is approximately 75,000 acres of irrigated wheat that is in fair condition and quite promising.

Oklahoma Area
 Showers that covered most of the Oklahoma wheat belt less than a week ago were not sufficient to stop the inroads which a combination of dry weather and green bugs have made in the crop outlook during the last 30 days. A general rain could still revive hope of a normal crop, but there has been a marked decline from the first official estimate of 71,126,000 bushels. This is particularly true along the western border of the state and in the Panhandle region.

Kansas Prospects
 Prospects of another bumper wheat crop in the Kansas area have gone glimmering right at the time when it was most needed to feed a starving world. While immediate rains could still result in a normal or better crop, dry weather has knocked a serious dent in the first official estimate of 212,175,000 bushels.

New Mexico
 Wheat in eastern New Mexico is suffering from dry weather. Considerable acreage is being plowed under. Summer fallow, comprising about 25 percent of total acreage, is holding up fairly well. It will take a normal rainfall, starting right away, for this area to produce 50 percent of a normal crop.

Veterans Office Explains Rights to Unemployment Benefits in GI Bill

Many veterans apparently do not clearly understand the regulations governing payment of unemployment benefits under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill). To help clarify the matter, the Veterans Administration offers these reminders.

Veterans who take temporary jobs retain their rights to unemployment allowances after they are released from the jobs.

Veterans are not required to apply for jobless pay immediately upon leaving service in order to protect their right to unemployment benefits. These benefits may be obtained any time within two years after the official end of the war, or within two years after the veteran's discharge, whichever is later.

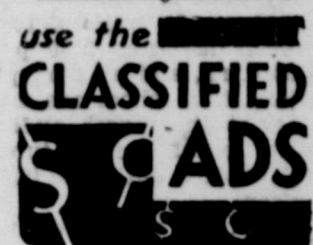
A veteran may be eligible for unemployment compensation up to \$20 a week if he becomes unemployed any time within the time limit. The maximum period for which he may draw jobless pay is 52 weeks, but benefits need not be drawn for consecutive weeks. A veteran with at least 10 months' active service is entitled to the maximum 52 weeks' benefits.

The veteran may apply for compensation as often as he becomes unemployed, provided he does not voluntarily leave his job without good reason, or is not discharged for cause, and still has benefits available. Should veterans become unemployed after using all their vet-

erans' unemployment credit, many of them will have built up enough credit to be eligible for regular State unemployment compensation.

A veteran also may qualify for self-employment allowances if he engages in his own business for profit and does not realize a net income of \$100 a month. In that event, an eligible veteran may draw the difference between his net profit and \$100 for the month for which the allowance is claimed. Self-employment allowances may be drawn for a maximum of 10 2-5 months.

A veteran who reenlisted in the service during the war years will be eligible for unemployment benefits when he leaves the service, but in no case can such payments be made later than five years after the end of the war. Thus, a veteran who has reenlisted for three years will still have a full two-year period to claim his unemployment benefits after he is discharged.

Spring Cleaning For Every City Doctor's Orders

A good old fashioned spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who said in Austin today, "From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'Cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the objective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be," said Dr. Cox, "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid, and poliomyelitis. Good community housekeeping and ordinary san-

itary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

Couple Injured in Wreck at Bovina Monday Night

Billie Joe Ebertine, 20, and Geraldine Niece, 17, both of Bovina, were injured last Monday night when their car crashed into a parked truck on Bovina's Main Street.

The accident occurred about 10:30 p. m., shortly after graduation exercises at Bovina High School where the Niece girl had

received her diploma. Both young people were taken to the Clovis Memorial Hospital at Clovis. Ebertine, driver of the car, suffered a possible skull fracture and had both jaw bones broken. Miss Niece was suffering from cuts and bruises. Neither was believed to be in a critical condition.

The accident occurred, according to State Highway Patrolman Bill Fowler, when the car driven by Ebertine crashed into the rear of a trailer truck which was parked in the middle of the street. Fowler said center parking was a local custom in Bovina, and since the street is a county road, the State patrol had no authority to order a change. The truck was unoccupied.

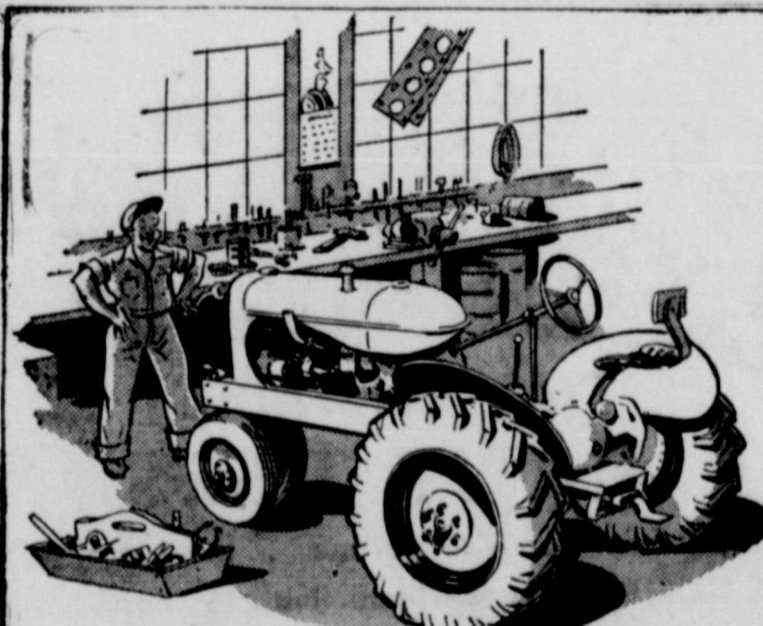

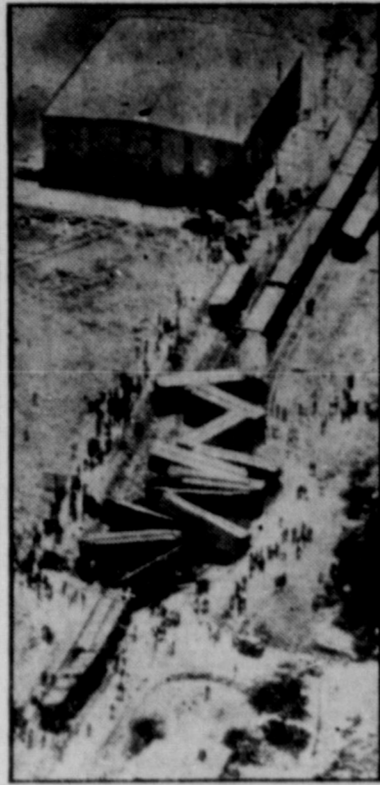

Williams Kills Hopes for Opening Agriculture Experiment Station

D. W. Williams, vice president for agriculture of Texas A & M College, virtually killed all hope of having an experiment station established in this area by A & M in a letter to Wayne Evans, president of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce last week.

"The Legislature is not making any appropriations for the purchase of land for additional branch experiment stations," Williams said, "and it is necessary to get the legislature to make an enactment before any new station is established."

"I am frankly of the opinion that the advisability of establishing an experiment station in the Hereford area is questionable, because of the expense involved."

Williams suggested that a possible solution of the problem would be to send a man either from the Lubbock or Amarillo station "to conduct a series of trials on farms owned by people willing and anxious to cooperate in order to get the information."

"I do not want to pass the buck," he told Evans, "but am referring the matter to C. H. McDowell, acting director of the Texas Experiment Station."

Both McDowell and Williams were in Hereford in March, and at that time both appeared favorably impressed with the need for an experiment station in this area.

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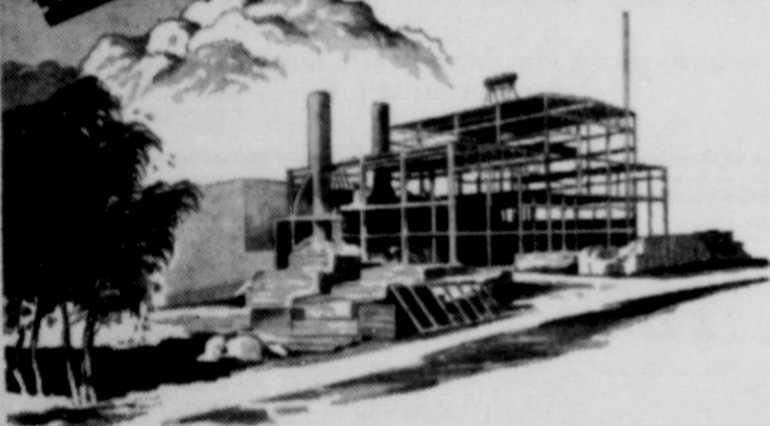
