Funeral Rites for Carl T. Jennings Held Wednesday

Funeral services for Carl Thomas Jennings, 57, veteran Hereford cafe man, were conducted Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 at the First Christian Church. Rev. Marvin Boyd, pastor of the First Methodist Church, conducted the service. Interment was in the West Park Cemetery.

Mr. Jennings was found dead at his home shortly before noon last Saturday. Mrs. Jennings discovered the body.

A verdict of suicide was pronounced by Justice of the Peace Andy Thomas and Dr. R. R. Willis, county health officer, after investigation by coroner's jury Saturday afternoon. Mr. Jennings had been in bad health for some time, members of the family said.

Jennings came to Hereford with his parents from Windsor, Missouri, in 1909, and after a period as a farmer and rancher in this section, entered the cafe business in Hereford 20 years ago.

He was born September 26, 1888, in Missouri. He was a member of the First Christian Church.

Surviving him are his mother, Mrs. Lola Jennings of Hereford; his wife, and two sons, Ralph Thomas Jennings, recently discharged veteran, and Robert Nealy (Bobby) Jennings, now in the U. S. Navy; two brothers, Waldo and B. R. Jennings, both of Hereford; one sister, Mrs. Lester Vogle of Portland, Oregon; and a niece, Bessie Frances Carraway Shaw of Rankin, Illinois, who was reared by the Jennings.

Trailer Town for Veteran Students At Westex College

A "Look at the Books"

OR

"A Finger in the Pie"?

Which is the UAW-CIO really after? Is it seeking facts—or new economic power? Does it want to know things—or run things?

These questions concern you as well as General Motors.

For years the facts about General Motors have been made public.

In spite of this, the UAW-CIO demands a chance to look at our books, with the hint that we could meet Union demands "if the truth were really known."

We have firmly declined to recognize this as a basis for bargaining:

1. The Full Facts are Published

How much General Motors takes in each year—how much it pays employees—how much it pays to stockholders—how much it pays in taxes—how much net profit we make—and many other facts are plainly stated in annual reports and quarterly reports.

These are broadcast to 425,000 stockholders from coast to coast—sent to newspapers and libraries. Additional copies are free for the asking.

2. All Figures are Thoroughly Checked

Every General Motors annual statement is audited by outside auditors. Similar figures are filed with the Securities & Exchange Commission.

Does the UAW-CIO honestly believe that General Motors would or could deceive these experts?

3. Basis of Collective Bargaining is Defined

The Wagner Act lays down the rules for collective bargaining. These cover such areas as rates of pay, hours of work, working conditions.

No mention is made of earnings, prices, sales volume, taxes and the like. These are recognized as the problems of management.

4. Something New has been Added

The obvious fact is that the UAW-CIO has gone beyond its rights under the law—and is reaching not for information but for new power—not for a look at past figures, but for the power to sit in on forecasting and planning the future.

A "look at the books" is a clever catch phrase intended as an opening wedge whereby Unions hope to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It leads surely to the day when Union bosses, under threat of strike, will demand the right to tell what we can make, when we can make it, where we can make it, and how much we must charge you—all with an eye on what labor can take out of the business, rather than on the value that goes into the product.

5. This Threatens All Business

If the Union can do this in the case of General Motors, it can do it to every business in this land of ours.

Is this just imagination? Union spokesmen have said, "The Union has stated time after time that this issue is bigger than just an ordinary wage argument, that it is bigger than the Corporation and bigger than the Union."

For Labor Unions to use the monopolistic power of their vast membership to extend the scope of wage negotiations to include more than wages, hours and working conditions is the first step toward handing the management of business over to the Union bosses.

We therefore reject the idea of a "look at the books" not because we have anything to hide but because the idea itself hides a threat to GM, to all business, and to you, the public.

Hereford P. O. W. Camp Considered By Texas A. & M. for Experiment Station

Prospects for retaining the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp as an experimental station and 4-H headquarters for West Texas took a tangible form this week when a Chamber of Commerce delegation met with A & M College officials in College Station.

During January at least two A and M committees will visit Hereford, according to the local group, which reported that department heads were extremely interested in the proposal. The official A and M committee will consist of J. T. L. McNew, vice president of A and M College, chairman, Dr. Ide P.

Trotter, head of the Extension Service, and Dr. McDowell, head of the Experimental Service. Gibb Gilchrest, president of A and M, will be an unofficial visitor in the community during the next 15 days, and several other delegations from the college may also visit here.

The movement to retain the POW Camp was started here in December when C. of C. directors met with County Commissioners. Following the meeting a delegation consisting of Wayne Evans, C. of C. president, Pat Flynn, E. S. Craig and Buryl Elliston went to College Station for the purpose of reviewing the

Farmers Must File Income Tax Returns Next Tuesday

For three groups of taxpayers, next Tuesday, January 15, is a red letter date. W. A. Thomas, Collector of Internal Revenue at the Dallas office, points out in a brief review of income tax problems.

Farmers, persons who filed a 1945 Declaration of Estimated Tax but wish to change their estimates, and persons who should have filed a 1945 declaration but failed to do so will be required to file by Jan. 15.

January 15 is a special date for farmers, because, while other taxpayers were required to file declarations last March, the law specifically permitted farmers to wait until the next January 15.

rations as to their pay for active service (except regular army officers) but if they have any civilian income, it is treated the same as any other taxpayer.

Withholding Tax
If part of your tax bill is paid through the tax deductions made by your employer from your pay check, you are required to pay only the difference between the withholding tax and your total tax.

If your estimate last March was too high and you have already paid more than your correct tax for 1945, you can get a refund by filing your regular return and showing the amount of overpayment in line 9, page 1, of Form 1040.

What Form to Use?
For filing the 1945 Declaration of Estimated Tax, or for changing a previous estimate, a choice of two forms is offered: Form 1040-ES, a special form for estimating tax, or the regular Form 1040. For filing a change from a previous estimate, the word "Amended" should be placed at the top of Form 1040-ES, but if Form 1040 is used, do not mark it "Amended" as this is a final return, Thomas said.

"If by January 15 you do not have exact figures on your 1945 income and deductions, it is best that you use Form 1040-ES. In that case you will have to also file your regular 1945 return by March 15. If you are in position to file your regular return as early as January 15, however, you can file Form 1040 and it will serve as both Declaration and final return," he stated.

Penalties
The penalty for failing to file or pay the tax due on a declaration is 5 per cent (of the error) for underestimating the tax, but only if your underestimate by more than 33 1-3 per cent if you are a farmer, or by more than 20 per cent if you are not a farmer.

These penalties can be avoided by filing the amended declaration (Form 1040-ES) or annual return (Form 1040) by Jan. 15 and correcting the underestimate.

Filing 1946 Estimates
For 1946 the income tax filing rules will be the same as last year. You will have to file a 1946 Declaration by March 15 this year (if you are not a farmer) or by January 15, 1947 if you are a farmer, subject to the following provisions:

- (1) If you are single and expect wages subject to withholding to exceed \$5,000, plus \$500 for every exemption except your own; and
- (2) If you are married and expect wages subject to withholding to exceed \$10,000, plus \$500 for each exemption except your own and your wife; or
- (3) If you expect more than \$100 of other income not subject to withholding, assuming your overall income is \$500 or more for single persons and \$1,000 or more for man and wife.

Veterans Do Not File
Veterans of the armed forces are not required to file declaration.

"We were given a wonderful reception, much encouragement on the proposed project and were shown every possible courtesy," Evans declared. In brief, the proposed experimental station would specialize in new crops, increased yields, and general improvement of farm practices with results available to residents of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas. It would be conducted along lines similar to other experimental stations over the state.

The 4-H encampment headquarters, as set up in tentative plans, would embrace Districts 1, 2, 3, 6, and 7. These districts would serve practically all of West Texas from Vernon west to the New Mexico line.

"It is impossible to formulate more complete plans until the committee arrives and makes their survey," Evans declared. "The Chamber of Commerce is all set to work with them and we will appreciate suggestions and cooperation toward giving them a true picture of the needs of the territory along the lines above outlined."

Briefs are being prepared in New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas in support of the proposed program.


Veterans Advised Errors Corrected in Discharges

Lieutenant Colonel Robert L. Hardy, West Texas District Recruiting Officer, today announced that information has been received whereby discharged veterans may have corrections made on incorrect discharges received.

To have a discharge corrected the original discharge certificate should be sent in a registered letter to:
Demobilized Personnel Records Branch
Records Administration Center, AGO
4300 Goodfellow Blvd., St. Louis 20, Missouri.

A letter and documentary evidence should accompany the Discharge Certificate to prove that it is in error. It is recommended that photostatic copies of birth certificates, orders, etc. be sent if there are no duplicates available.

Since the certificate may remain with the Records Administration Center office for some time, it is recommended that it be recorded at the County

Clerk's office in the county in which the veteran resides even though it contains error—since the Veterans Administration or other agencies may request the original or certified copy. When the corrected discharge is returned, it is well to have it re-recorded again with the County Clerk.

The individual is not permitted to correct his own discharge certificate no matter how small or unimportant the change. Any erasure insertion or correction other than by the Adjutant General is unauthorized, and such a discharge will not be considered official.

Veterans who want information of any kind are urged to contact local Recruiting Officers. Recruiting Stations are located throughout the West Texas Area. Permanent Army Recruiting Stations are in the Post Office Building in Amarillo, Abilene, San Angelo, Lubbock, and Big Spring, Texas. Temporary Army Recruiting Stations are located in Dalhart, Pampa, Borger, Wellington, Childress, Plainview, Lamesa, Odessa, Sweetwater and Ballinger, Texas.
