Canada Girl Sees World With Oil Exploring Husband

kinfolk in Arizona. Lucy shares some of her sightseeing experiences since joining the hunt for oil with her husband:

AFRICA

"Arrived on a Saturday, February, 1973 in Abidjan, Ivory Coast. Sunday we went out to a beach cabana with my husband's boss and several other French people. I was overwhelmed by the beautiful deserted white beaches of the Atlantic. Abidjan is probably about 500 miles north of the equator so it's quite hot and humid, and from the moment we arrived, I never felt cool.

Abidjan is a beautiful bustling port city. The port is used mainly as a loading

point for lumber taken from West Africa's jungle. Since Ivory Coast was once a French colony, the French influence is the strongest. Everyone speaks French, and the American colony there is very small. Ivory Coast still has close ties with France, and it is believed to be the most prosperous West African country. Abidjan must be one of the most beautiful cities in West Africa, built as it is on several large lagoons. A five-minute drive took us to a beautiful beach.

Two days after we arrived in Abidjan I had the inevitable stomach trouble. The third day I visited with the director of the American school about a job teaching

French, and he started telling me all the precautions a westerner must take to avoid more trouble. Water had to be boiled twenty minutes before it could be drunk, all vegetables and fruits eaten uncooked or unpeeled had to be soaked in potassium permanganate 20 minutes before it could be eaten, and all laundry had to be ironed after it was washed, including sheets and towels, because a certain fly would lay its eggs in laundry, and its larvae could hatch and bore into a person. Needless to say, at that moment, I was ready to come home.

We had a chance to take one trip, a 28-hour train ride through the jungle into the bush. Very hot and dirty ride, but so much fun. Passed through scores of small, thatched hut villages. Visited Ouagadougou, Upper Volta from which we took a trip to a nearby game reserve, where we saw some elephants, but that was about all.

Esso Exploration had been drilling off shore West Africa with little luck there. The operation closed down, at least temporarily, and we were transferred to Malaysia, May 27, 1973. On the way we stopped off in Beirut, Lebanon, which is a lovely city with a temperate climate, built right on the sea. We must have been almost the only tourists in the city because it was very recently after some trouble there, but we felt very welcome.

MALAYSIA

Kuala Lumpur is the capital and largest city of Malaysia. Malaysia is a breathtaking country. The green of its jungles, the densest I've ever seen. Kuala Lumpur is situated in what was once a swamp, but nearby are mountains covered with tropical foliage that almost always have clouds covering them.

Malaysia is made up of three main races — Indians, Malays and Chinese. They make for a colorful mixture of people.

Malaysia leads the world in rubber production. There are rubber plantations everywhere. When we drive through the countryside early in the morning, we pass tappers going out to collect the latex. Other important industries include tin, tapioca and lumber.

Malaysia was colonized by English, so many people speak English. Malay is the national language.

We've seen most of peninsular Malaysia, and it lives up to its reputation as a beautiful, friendly country. The east coast is my favorite part; the beaches are supposed to be some of the best in the world. Golden sands stretch for miles, always deserted, and the water is crystal clear. Perhaps sea snakes discourage local people from swimming, but not me.

There are several oil companies based in Malaysia, including ours. Esso has had a good oil discovery there and is making plans to build a platform from which they'll drill other wells. They are drilling 180 miles off shore in the South China Sea.

So many religious holidays with all these different peoples — Chinese are Buddhists, Indians are Hindu, and Malays are Muslim. Also some Christians are there. Once a year the Indians have their day of atonement. Those who have

been especially fortunate during the year feel they must pay something back, so they pierce their cheeks, tongues and upper bodies with spikes and lead a procession through the streets to a temple."

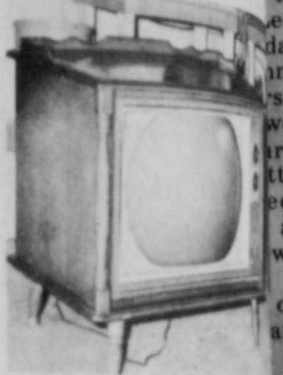

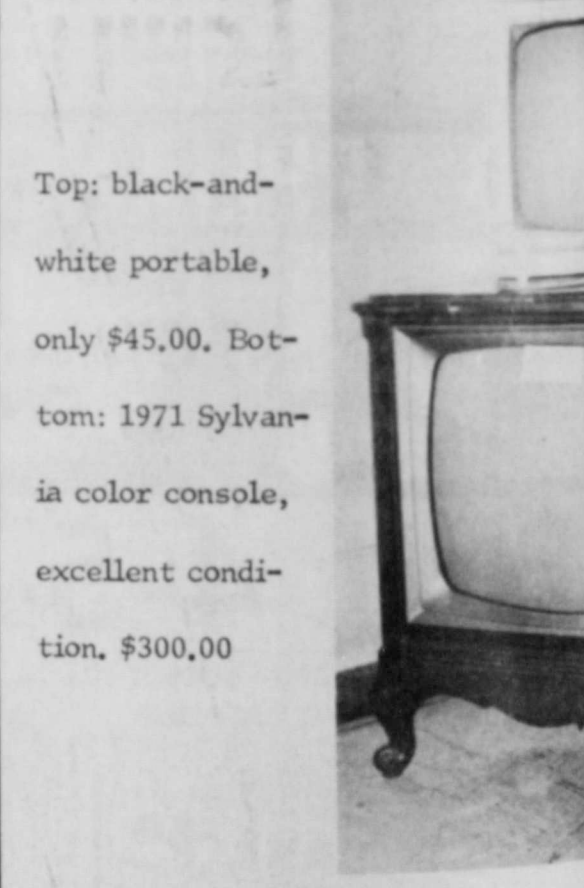

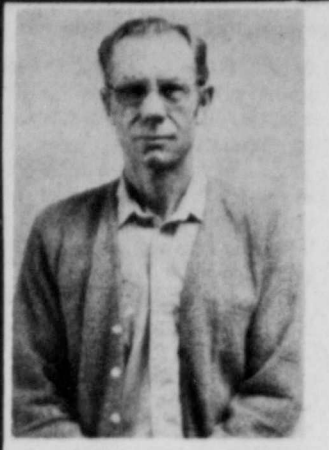
