County Bank Deposits Off Just A Little

With most of the farm financing set up for another crop and a lot of the income tax paid, Floyd county's two First National banks still registered a healthy economy according to a state bank call of March 31, 1975.

In comparison with a bank call of April 24 last year, both banks were down slightly in deposits...both banks down some in loans.

The Lockney bank is down in deposits from \$12,389,997.59 to \$11,753,898.95 and down in loans from last year's \$4,665,731.68 to \$4,563,130.53.

The Floydada bank was down in deposits from \$19,568,434.44 to \$19,059,908.62 and down considerably in loans from last year's \$8,600,053.53 to this year's \$6,229,558.54.

WHEAT INCOME

The next appreciable income for depositors should be the June wheat crop. With some moisture falling on Monday in this area. Around an inch of

rainfall was received just south of Muncy and over an inch was reported in the Cedar Hill area. Dougherty reported about a half inch and about an inch fell just east of Floydada. Other

areas received scattered showers following a strong sandstorm.

Wheat prospects remain good as the huge rainfall that ruined the rowcrops last fall is available for the wheat crop.

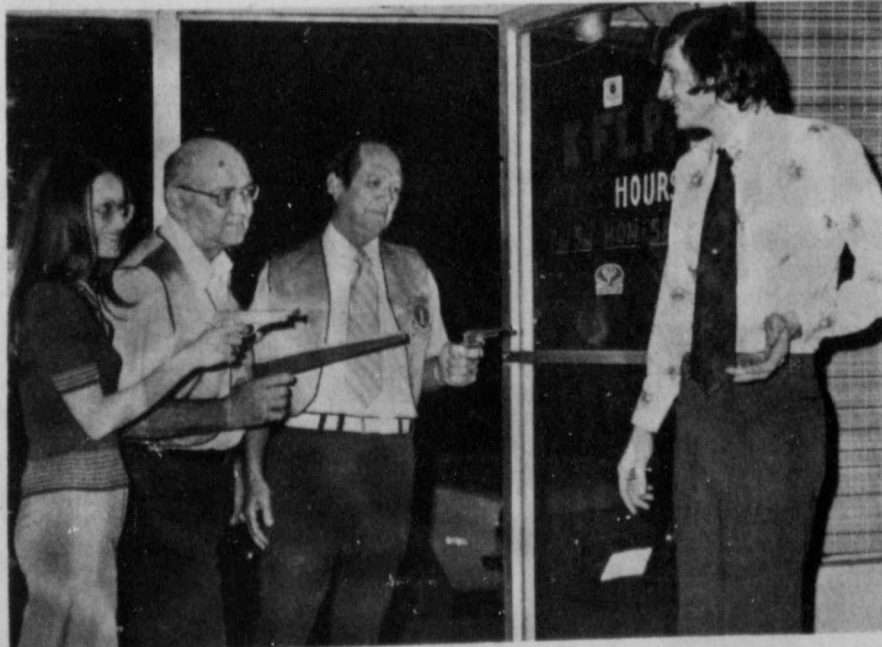

Rucker Attends Federal Land Bank Meeting

The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 66 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 500 persons in attendance.

George W. Cunningham, President, in his annual report to stockholders, reported that 1974 was another record year for new business with \$269,000,000 in loans closed. This was the largest year in loan volume in the bank's 58-year history and also in 1974, the bank reached \$1 billion in loans outstanding. W. Malcolm Harding, Governor of the Farm Credit Administration and Dr. James R. Gibbs, Vice President and Economist of the Texas Commerce Bank in Houston, also addressed stockholders and guests during the meeting.

Last Minute Toll Free

Calls To IRS

Plainview, Texas - With income tax filing season coming to a close, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has announced that it will extend its toll-free telephone tax help hours to accommodate the expected crush of last-minute filers.

taxpayers will have an extra 21 and a half hours in which they can phone the IRS toll-free for answers to their tax questions. Saturday, April 5, and Saturday, April 12, the toll-free lines will be in operation from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 15, the last day for filing returns, tax experts will be on hand to answer questions by phone until 9 p.m. The IRS's regular business hours of 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, will remain the same in addition to the extended hours. Taxpayers can reach the IRS toll-free by dialing 800-492-4830 from anywhere

in North Texas. This year's tax return must be postmarked no later than midnight, April 15, 1975.

Bill To Aid Small

Family farmers and ranchers in Texas, along with consumers, have a great deal to gain if two bills recently introduced in the State Legislature become law according to Jay Naman of Waco, President of Texas Farmers Union.

The bills, introduced by State Representative Lane Denton of Waco, (HB 1665) prohibits corporate farming in the state and (HB 1664) prohibits vertical integration in agriculture by corporations.

These two bills, if enacted into law, would protect and promote the most efficient method of production of food and fiber, the family owned production unit," said Naman.

According to the Farmers Union President, vertical integration by large conglomerates pose a great threat to the availability and reasonable prices of food items to the consumer at the supermarket level. If we reach the point, where three or four major corporations own the means of production of food as well as its processing, distribution, warehousing and retailing, consumers in this country could face serious shortages.

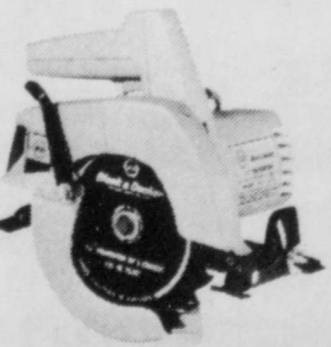

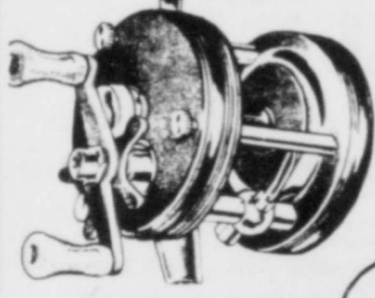

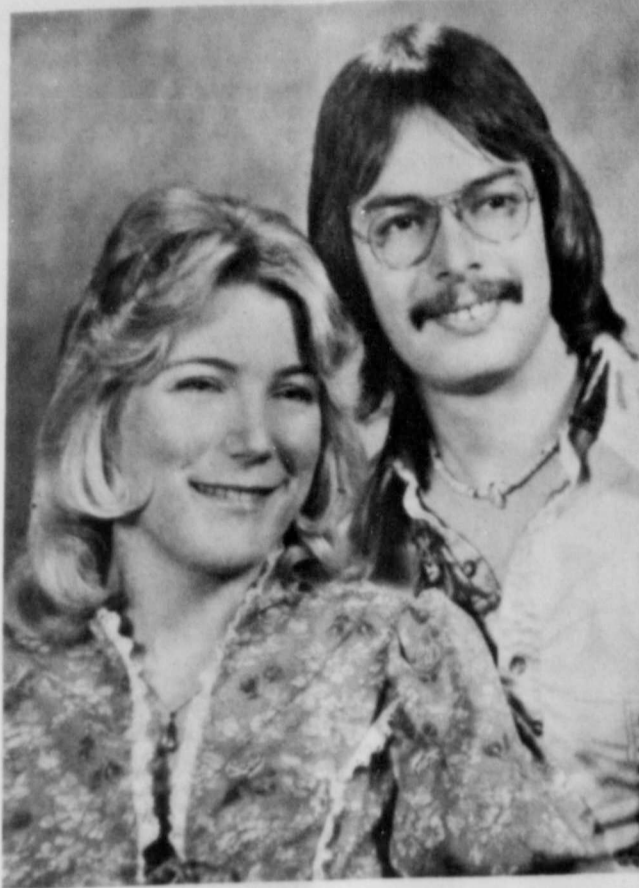

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Floyd 4-Hers Selling Garden Seed

With the increasing interest in home vegetable gardening, homeowners may want to consider planting a few vegetables in their flower beds this

spring. With sufficient garden space a limiting factor with many homeowners, numerous vegetables do well when planted in flower beds around the home, points out

Doyle Warren, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Leaf lettuce makes an ideal border plant and will grow in many areas around the home that receive only

partial shade. Most varieties will be ready for harvesting 45 to 60 days after planting. The red-leafed variety Ruby not only adds color to the flower bed but also provides food for the table.

Parsley is another vegetable crop that makes an ideal border planting and can be harvested almost the year round when grown in an area receiving partial shade.

Onions or their close relative-chives, leeks and garlic-will all do well in flower beds that receive limited amounts of sunlight.

In fact, most leaf-type vegetables as well as the bulb types will do well in areas that receive only partial sunlight, notes Warren.

Tomatoes, eggplants and peppers should be located in a bed that receives at least four to six hours of good sunlight each day. Most

fruiting crops require a considerable amount of sunlight for good growth and should be planted on the south side of the home to receive as much light as possible. Morning sunlight is often more desirable than mid-afternoon light, especially during the hotter months of the year, points out Warren.

Growing vegetables in flower beds requires little extra care over that given most flowering plants. Water stress should be avoided as vegetable crops near maturity. Adding small amounts of fertilizer around vegetable plants during the season will help insure high yields of quality vegetables.

Of course, control measures should be taken if insects or diseases become a problem on vegetables or flowering plants during the season.

With a little care and

attention, you will be harvesting nutritious vegetables from the flower bed as well as enjoying the beauty of both vegetables

and flowers, adds Warren. Remember your garden and flower seed can be purchased from your local 4-H clubs.

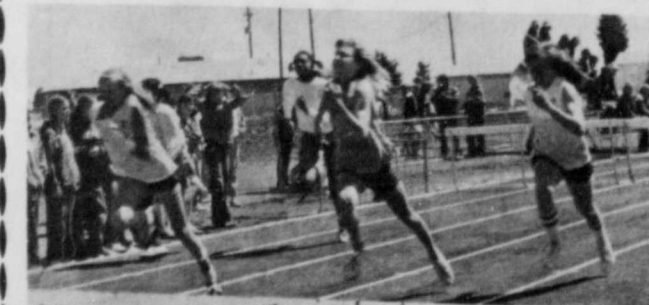

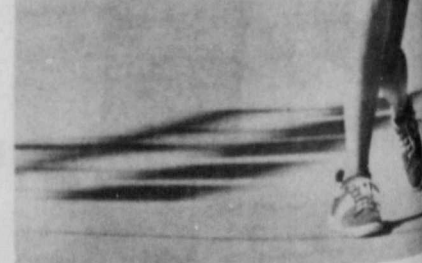

Dear editor:

According to several columnists I've read recently, the United States' failure to spend still more millions in Viet Nam is going to destroy our credibility throughout the world. If we let them down, the rest of the world will have doubts about our keeping our word," they said.

While I don't think we let the South Vietnamese down-it looks more like they let themselves down and if anybody promised them eternal aid, it wasn't you and me-what interested me was the columnists' argument about credibility. That is, about nations' credibility, not columnists', which generally is in limited supply. I'd say the credibility of most of us columnists would dress out at about 10 to 15 per cent.

But about nations, what's credibility got to do with anything? Except maybe add to the paper shortage with all the agreements they've signed and torn up. I mean, what's the credibility rating of all the major and minor countries of the world we loaned money and material to during the First and second World Wars, all of whom solemnly promised to pay us back and only one or two

have? Instead of our worrying about their losing confidence in us, it looks like they ought to be worrying about our losing it in them.

Credibility seems to be one of the least needed ingredients among nations. What's the word of the Soviet Union worth, if the dictator changes his mind? What's China's? Or Cuba's? Or Spain's? Or Portugal's? Or Turkey's? Or any other nations', whose names I'd list if I could think of them.

Actually, a country's word is no better than the politicians in power make it, and politicians change their mind from month to month, and very few of them are women.

Did you ever see a politician who, if he ran on lower taxes, didn't raise them when he got in and found out how much money it takes to operate one?

If the indebted-to-us world wants to get mad at the U.S. for not spending more than 150 billion dollars and 50,000 American lives in Viet Nam, I figure it's like the man who, over-drawn at the bank, gets mad at the bank.

Data Changes May Hike Jobless Rate

Because of federally-prescribed changes in statistical methods used by the Texas Employment Commission, the monthly unemployment rate in Texas probably will

be higher in the future, says the Commission's administrator, Henry Rothell.

Rothell explains that the Commission must use guidelines prescribed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Department of Labor, in gathering its data on the labor force, total employment and unemployment.

"The Bureau of Labor Statistics prescribed these changes in methodology to establish more accurate estimates of the unemployed," Rothell said. "In my opinion, unemployment rates taken from the revised data will show a higher rate of unemployment than the unrevised data."

Vet Home Loans

New GI loan policies that apply to all veterans with military service since the start of WW II make more than 20 million veterans eligible for the Veterans Administration guaranteed home loans.

Among them are more than four million veterans whose GI loans have been paid in full, VA Regional Director, Jack Coker, said today. Those who have never used their eligibility are still eligible even though they might have been out of service more than 30 years. Also potentially eligible for new loans are those veterans with current loans outstanding. The only condition for restored eligibility is that the first loan be paid off and the home be disposed of.

In addition to broadened eligibility rules, new legislation approved by the President on December 31, 1974, raised the maximum portion of a loan VA is allowed to guarantee from \$12,500 to \$17,500 and made it easier to buy mobile homes and condominiums.

Opportunities for purchasing one-family condominiums with VA guaranteed loans were broadened by deleting a former requirement that VA limit its loan guarantees for such units to developments in which

How Is Cancer Money Spent?

How is the money spent? "The public has an absolute right to know the answer to that question," said Mrs. Wanda Hickerson, President of the Floyd South unit of the American Cancer Society 1975 educational and fund-raising Crusade now taking place in Floydada.

"In these days of inflation and the shrinking dollar, I want to assure everyone that money given to the ACS is budgeted in such a way that it furthers the cancer fight on many different levels."

She explained that in the most recent budget, 29 percent of all ACS income went to support a wide variety of cancer research programs. "But while we are waiting for basic answers from research, we are also trying to teach people how to recognize cancer's Warning Signals and the importance of early detection and prompt treatment. There are many lives that could be saved without learning anything new from the research if people understood that. Hence, the public education programs which took another 17.2 percent of our budget.

ACS services to the cancer patient, which include rehabilitation activities, required another 12.7 percent of ACS income. Professional education for physicians and nurses on the front lines of the cancer fight took another 10.5 percent and community service 9.3 percent. The latter includes cancer detection programs, mass screening and cancer registries.

"That comes to 78.7 percent of our budget and I am proud to say that we keep our management costs to 9.6 percent and fund-raising to 11.7 percent. We are able to do that because of the energetic and dedicated people who volunteer to do much of the work of the ACS," she said.

Housing and Urban Development (HUD) had already insured loans.

The Veterans Administration today reminded married veterans that it is easier than ever before to qualify for housing assistance. Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, noted the agency now accords full recognition to incomes and expenses of both veteran and spouse in determining ability to repay loan obligations.

THERE IS GUILT AND THEN THERE IS GUILT... WHICH AM I GUILTY OF?

There is nothing so prevalent in man's life as his sense of isolation and his feelings of guilt and our, in various ways, trying to either rid ourselves of it or trying to ignore it and hope it will go away and our refusing to admit it to ourselves.

There can be no wholeness and healthy living however without the resolving of ones guilt. No problems are ever solved by ignoring it.

A sense of guilt is defined as a realization that one has violated ethical, moral or religious principles, together with a regretful feeling of lessened personal value on that account, and is strong evidence of the failure to be what you feel you can be. There is a vast difference in real guilt and neurotic subjective imagined guilt - there is guilt and then there is guilt.

Guilt can express itself in distressing disorders of the physical, emotional, and spiritual. Some people feel they can never be separated from their guilt. It is clear from the Bible that God is interested in guilt and man's freedom from it.

Real guilt occurs when a person actually does transgress the will of God whether you feel guilty about the violation or not. Guilt is associated with man's ability to recognize values.

Neurotic guilt feelings can be present regardless of man's standing with God. It painfully expresses itself in feelings of anxiety; obsessions, phobias, compulsions and depressions. Any sense of guilt that cannot be related to the violation of what God actually does require is of this nature. It is associated with personal frustration, disappointment, failure, illness, bereavement, and such like. If anything goes wrong, the neurotic assumes all the blame.

God does intend for us to be aware of guilt when we have wronged him, but does not intend for us to live with a life of guilty feelings day in and day out.

GSPA Recommends Reduced Plantings

Grain producers who cannot afford to sell their grain for \$2 per 100 pounds this fall should consider cutting acreage, finding alternate crops or contracting at higher prices either through cash contracting or hedging their crop, according to Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

The \$2 is not a prediction," Harp explained, but it is a possibility if a normal crop is produced on the acreage now intended for grain production and the proposed changes in the

government farm program are not enacted into law. The March sorghum acreage intention as released by USDA shows an overall increase of 6 percent above 1974. With an average yield, this could be a total grain sorghum crop of 900 million or one billion bushels, on top of a possible record yield of corn.

This total production of grain would be geared to maximum consumption at record levels in both domestic and export markets. With cattle on feed less than 60 percent of a year ago and hog numbers down by more than 15 percent, there

is little real evidence that consumption will be running at record levels, Harp explained.

The GSPA executive pointed out his concern that prices will drop at harvest. We could go from our present grain deficit to a surplus almost overnight, he said, adding that the surplus stocks could cause grain prices to drop back to government loan levels or to the previously mentioned \$2 level.

Harp said, "We have no assurance that grain prices will not drop to loan levels, as they did for cotton. Two years ago cotton prices were 60 to 80 cents per pound, but last fall they crashed back to loan levels of 16 to 20 cents per pound."

Natural Gas As A Boiler Fuel To Be Examined

AMARILLO, TEXAS... The Texas Railroad Commission has issued an order setting a statewide hearing to examine the facts pertaining to the use of natural gas as a boiler fuel in Texas.

In discussing the order, K. B. "Tex" Watson, Pioneer president, said, "Apparently the Commission intends to closely examine the use of gas in large electric generating plants and consider eventual elimination of this use. Other boiler fuel uses will also be investigated."

Watson went on to say that the order does not pertain to the typical domestic, commercial or irrigation use of gas and he felt confident that the Railroad Commission of Texas will not issue an order that would call for the elimination of the use of gas to generate electricity, or for any other purposes, in such a manner as to adversely affect our area.

Watson pointed out that Pioneer is in a very favorable position with its present long-term gas supply, and further, it has geared its exploration and production program and gas acquisitions to maintain the industrial growth of the company's service area. Company management feels that with the acceleration of drilling and exploration that

is taking place, new sources will be found and reserves will be adequate to continue to serve all of Pioneer's customers.

The hearing is scheduled for June 2 in Austin, Texas. At that time, gas utilities, owners or operators of gas-fired boilers and any interested party can appear to present evidence regarding the use of natural gas as a boiler fuel in Texas and the possible phasing out of certain usages of natural gas as a boiler fuel.
