### ICP Says Rail Freight Will Have To Double

permission to abandon the 104.8 mile stretch of track citing lack of use and decreasing profits.

Monday, a representative of Frisco, Bruce Mahon of Oklahoma City, met with about 25 residents of the three-town area to discuss the impact of abandoning the line.

Mahon explained that, under ICC

regulations, a company can justify abandoning a line if it draws less than 34 cars per mile each year.

The 104.8 mile stretch-the only rail line serving Paducah and one of the only lines reaching Quanah and Floydada-now is carrying only half the required amount of cars, it was pointed out.

The residents, many of whom expressed the desire to seek some type of settlement keeping the line open, came face to face with several options:

-Boost the amount of agricultural products and other items shipped by rail from the area until usage of the line exceeds the 34-car limit.

-Protest to the ICC possibly stimulating the agency to hold hearings on the move.

-Transport all produce leaving the area by truck.

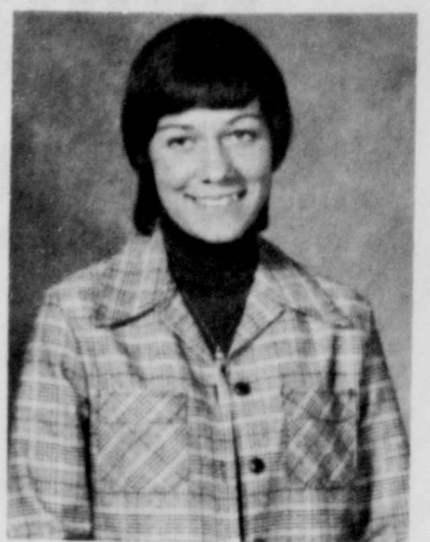
Mahon said the Frisco line based its request to abandon on an average figure last year of only 15.1 cars per mile of track.

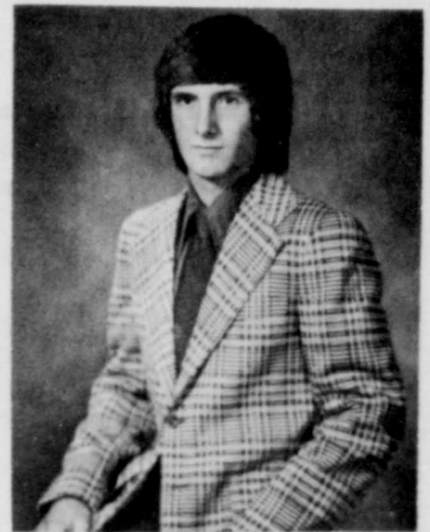
Two Kathys were announced as the top scholastic students at FHS school for 1975 by principal Charles Tyer at press time yesterday.

They voted for amendment number one 389-375 (retirement pay increase), and against amendment number two 356-406 (legislator's pay raise).

It was a very light voter turn-out across the state and also in Floyd county.

Voting for both amendments were: Southwest Floydada, Harmony, Providence, Northwest Floydada, Southeast Floydada, Northeast Floydada and the absentee vote.

Voting against both amendments were: Allmon, Sandhill, East Lockney, Lone Star, South Plains, Baker, Goodnight, West Lockney, McCoy.

Voting for number one and against

number two were: Cedar Hill, Dougherty.

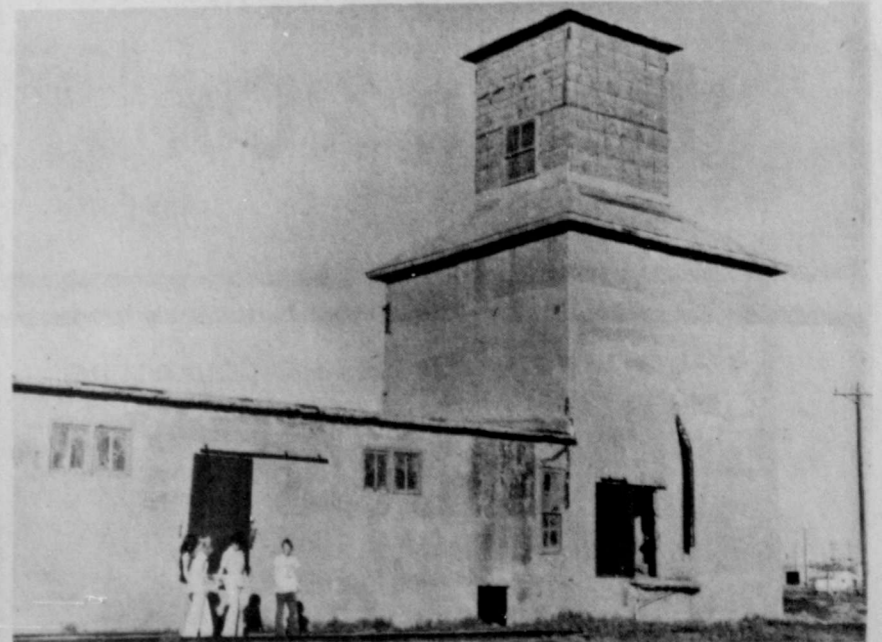
Freshman student Jon Jones was honored with the "Star Greenhand" award. Sophomore Steve Jones was selected "Star Chapter Farmer."

### Public Forum On Arthritis Set For May 1

Dr. Charles Seward of Amarillo, associate professor, Department of Rheumatology Texas Tech University School of Medicine, will discuss the various kinds of arthritis and its symptoms, diagnosis and treatment. # Farm Price Bill Approved In Spite of Veto Threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House completed congressional action Tuesday on a bill to raise for one year farm price supports on key grains, cotton and dairy products, but Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz said President Ford will veto it.

Opponents of the farm bill mustered enough votes to indicate the House may be unable to override a veto by the necessary two-thirds margin.

When Butz was informed of the 248 to 166 vote for passage, he reportedly said, "This is it. The veto's firm." The administration opposed the bill on grounds it would increase federal spending. Others asserted it would open the door to farm production controls reminiscent of the 1960s and possibly raise dairy prices to consumers.

Cost estimates of the bill hammered out in a House-Senate conference committee varied substantially. Conferees said the one year "emergency" price supports would cost

the government \$210 million. But administration spokesmen estimated the cost at \$1 billion, including production loans. The loans would be repaid.

Both House Agriculture Committee Chairman Foley, D-Wash., and Rep. Phillip Burton, Democratic Caucus chairman, urged approval of the conference report they termed minimal and proconsumer.

"Although this bill appears to have little chance of being signed into law, I feel this is a constructive and significant piece of legislation," added the committee's Republican, Rep. William C. Wampler of Virginia.

The measure, which passed the Senate Thursday objection, would increase the target price of corn this year, to \$2.25 a bushel.

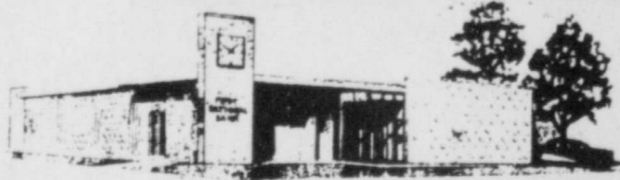
