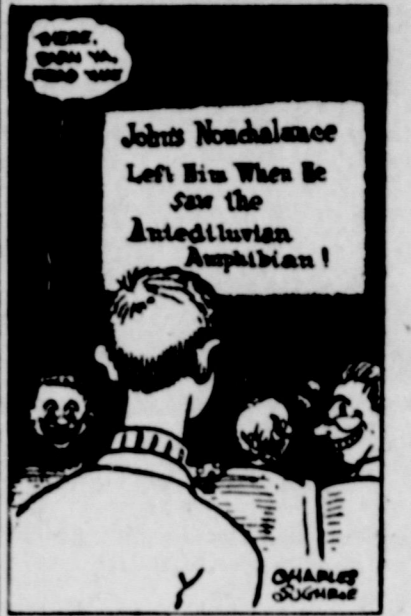

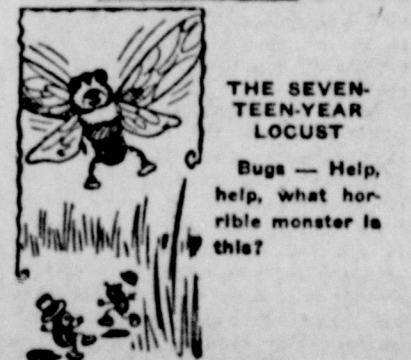

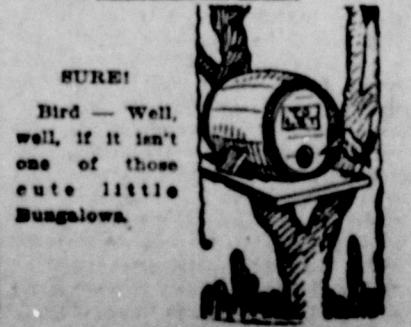

THE WORLD OVER

Interesting Items of Present Important Happenings.

EVERY ITEM A NEWS ITEM

Relating to the Latest Happenings of Interest Just Now Throughout the World.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The intracoastal canal project, providing a nine-foot channel 100 feet wide from New Orleans to Corpus Christi, Friday received the unanimous approval of the rivers and harbors committee.

President Coolidge and senate democrats urged Friday toward an open breach over future conduct of senate committee investigations.

Decision was reached Thursday by the house rivers and harbors committee, to include in the omnibus rivers and harbors bill preliminary surveys of the Colorado River from its mouth to Wharton and of the Guadalupe from its origin to Victoria.

Japanese exclusion sections in the immigration bill pending before the house and proposed amendments to the similar bill before the senate Sunday assumed Friday the status of an international issue of first importance.

The new revenue bill was ordered favorably reported to the senate Tuesday by the finance committee.

United States Senator B. K. Wheeler, prosecutor of the senate Daugherty investigating committee, was indicted at Great Falls, Mont., Tuesday by a federal grand jury on a charge of unlawfully receiving money as a retainer fee to influence the issuance of oil and gas prospecting permits by the secretary of the interior and commissioner of the general land office.

Postmaster General New Monday condemned as unwarranted the postal salary increases proposed in bills before congress, and sent to Chairman Edge of the joint sub-committee on postoffices his suggestion for salary increases with recommendations for increased postage and postal service fees to meet such a pay raise.

Six modifications would be made in laws covering administration of affairs of the Osage Indians in Oklahoma under a bill passed by the house Monday and sent to the senate. The measure provides for an increased allowance by the government of \$2000 a year to enroll Indians between the ages of 17 and 21.

An additional \$10,000 to defray expenses of the investigation by a special house committee into charges against Representatives Langley of Kentucky and Zihlman of Maryland, republicans, was requested in a resolution introduced Monday by Chairman Burton. The house recently authorized the committee to expend \$10,000.

The recount of the ballots cast in the Texas senatorial election in 1922 was completed Monday and on its face shows a substantial majority for Senator Mayfield, democrat.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

Barber's shears snicker snack through the tresses of Brooklyn, N. Y., misses at the rate of 2000 a day, it is estimated.

Work on a \$1,000,000 cotton textile mill will be started in Houston, Texas, within 60 days. The plans call for the employment of approximately 400 workers when the mill begins operation.

Weaver Moore of Houston and R. E. Seagler of San Antonio, Texas, were appointed as assistant attorneys general Saturday to fill vacancies caused by the resignations of Clifford Stone and Bruce Bryant.

More than 500,000 used automobiles were in the hands of automobile dealers at the close of March, according to figures made public this week by the National Automobile Dealers' Association.

The hearing of the Gulf Coast line's application for authority to participate in the stock of the International-Great Northern railroad recessed Friday at Austin, Texas, for a few days.

That the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association abandon its efforts to seek legislation affecting the ginning industry at this time, and that a capable legislative representative be employed to attend the next session of the legislature to keep an eye on legislation that may effect the ginners, was the substance of a resolution adopted Thursday at the fifteenth annual convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association at Dallas.

State officials of Arizona reported Friday the finding in the desert of a suitcase containing clothing and papers that had belonged to John J. Knight, wealthy Texas oil man, who disappeared July 9, 1922. The suitcase, which also contained a watch with Knight's initials engraved thereon, was found at a desolate spot far from the roadway, 17 miles from Buckeye, Ariz. Knight disappeared while traveling across the desert in an automobile.

Dr. E. E. Oberholzer, for ten years superintendent of the public schools at Tulsa, Okla., was elected unanimously Monday to the superintendency of the Houston school system.

FOREIGN NEWS.

The reparations commission Friday officially approved the report submitted Wednesday on the German reparations question. The recommendations of the commission is that the report be approved conditional upon the acceptance of it by Germany.

Hugo Stinnes, leading figure in German industrial life, died at Berlin, Germany, Thursday.

Repeated earth shocks were felt Thursday in the district of Orvito, province of Perugia central Italy.

Paris.—With brief ceremony, Brigadier General Charles G. Dawes Wednesday handed into the custody of the reparations committee the report of the commission of experts of which he is the head.

Turkish police have closed French and Italian schools in Constantinople, owing to the failure of the school authorities to remove from the schools religious emblems. Their removal was ordered recently by the national assembly at Ankara.

Russia will not fight Rumania over the question of Bessarabia, M. Zinovief, president of the executive committee of the communist international, declared in a speech Wednesday before the Lenin-grad soviet.

The Polish cabinet has decided to create a permanent Polish delegation to the league of nations.

The murder of Robert Lewis Coleman of San Francisco and George H. DeLong of New York, waylaid on the Tirana-Soutari high road in Albania, Sunday, is attributed to highwaymen. Travelers along many of the country roads are an easy prey for bandits, and the region where the Americans were traveling is among the wildest in Albania—a mountainous area.

Egypt may install automatic telephones.

McAdoo Takes Issue With Neff. Fort Worth, Tex.—A call to Texas democrats to send an instructed delegation to the democratic national convention in New York was sounded by William Gibbs McAdoo in his first North Central Texas address Friday.

Thaw Sane, Physicians Say. Philadelphia.—Counsel Wednesday confirmed a report that five physicians retained by him to examine Harry K. Thaw have expressed the opinion that he is sane.

To Sell Famous Ranch. San Antonio, Tex.—Ranch properties in Brooks and Duval counties comprising more than 200,000 acres owned by Ed C. Lasater, veteran Texas cattleman, were ordered sold at auction from the court house door at Falfurrias on July 1 by Judge Duval West in federal court Wednesday.
