

WASHINGTON NEWS.

The war department Friday announced that Senator Mayfield has designated Owen Cabble Earl of Meridian to take an examination in March with a view to entering West Point in July. Reece Stephens McCauley, of Houston, was named first alternate to Earl and Richard Wesley Fairchild, Palestine, second alternate.

The South is willing to compete with the North under any natural disadvantages which it may have, but wants no artificial barriers to its development, it was declared Friday during the shipping board investigation in Washington of port differentials by Matthew Hale, president of the South Atlantic States Association.

The war department has issued an order prohibiting army aviators from flying over cities at an altitude lower than that which would permit safe gliding in case of trouble to a landing on the outskirts of a town. The order also prohibits Sying over or in the icinity of stadiums, ball parks, fair ounds or other places where huge rowds are assembled.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

Ed Kirby, a negro, sentenced from Colorado County, was electrocuted Friday at the state prison at Huntsville, Texas, Kirby, sentenced at Columbus on February 19, 1923, for wife murder, was received at the prison September 16, 1924.

The 51 per cent condition of the Tex as cotton crop on October 1 forecasts a production of 4,255,000 500-pound gross weight bales. On September 25, 1923, the condition was 56 per cent of normal, or 1 point above the 10-year average, resulting in an average yield of 147 pounds of lint and a production of 4,342,000 bales. Ginnings prior to October 1 total 2,273,544 running bales, an increase of 796,608 bales since September 16. The United States condition of 53.5 per cent is a decline of 1.9 points from the estimate of September 16 and forecasts a production of 12,499,000 gross weight bales.

Suit has been filed in federal district court at New Orleans to remove Walter L. Cohen, negro comptroller of customs of New Orleans, from that office on the ground that he is of African blood and descent and there not a citizen of the United States.

Colonel William Greene Sterett, for nearly forty years a members of the editorial and news staff of The Galveston-Dallas News, died Tuesday at his home in Dallas, Texas, from a heart attack.

During the last fiscal year approximately 2000 square miles, or 1,280, 000 acres of land were mapped topographically, 720 permanent beach marks were set and much preliminary work accomplished that will count toward expediting the work of the present year, according to a report made by the state board of water engineers of progress in carrying out its flood control program in Texas.

The Giants took the third world series game, 6 to 4, and the lead in the race Monday in a ragged game full of thrills. The game was played in New York City.

FOREIGN NEWS

Great Britain's first labor government virtually came to an end at 11 o'clock Wednesday night when, by a combination of conservative and liberal votes, the house of commons carried a motion demanding that a select committee of the house investigate the action of the attorney general, Sir Patrick Hastings, in withdrawing prosscution in the case of the communist, James R. Campbell, acting editor of the Workers' Weekly, charged with inciting his majesty's forces to sedition.

TEXAS FARM NEWS

(By S. C. Hoyle, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

Crop Rotation.

The agricultural history of the world has proved that no system of farming will continue to be successful when based upon the one-crop system. The only possible exception to this is on low alluvial soil that is replenished by sediment from overflow or by con-

tinual application of fertilizers. The direct benefits that are derived from rotation may be divided under three heads: viz., first, the better physical condition of the soil, and second addition of plant food that comes from legumes and other vegetation put into the soil: third, the elimination or destruction of diseases and insect pests peculiar to a certain crop.

Under a permanent system of rota tion the soil gets in better physical condition due to the incorporation of vegetable matter. This in turn gives the soil a better water holding capacity, better aeration and makes the bacterial action greater, thus increas ing the available plant food. In the case of cotton, aeration destroys the fungus growth that causes root rot. The addition to the soil of straw from grain, stalks of corn and more especially legume vines add very materi ally to the available plant food in the

The insects peculiar to a crop generally pass their larval stage in the ground. With a rotation of crops where at least a part of the land is plowed in the fall many of the larvae fail to survive the winter; and those that do emerge in the spring are so far from their host plant that many succumb before reproducing themselves.

The great problem throughout the black land belt is the checking or eliminating of the root rot of cotton. Several years more of continued cropping with cotton and this followed by a series of wet years will make cotton production unprofitable throughout the entire black land belt. It has long been an established fact that this disease does not occur on the loose soil; but shows up more and more as the land becomes tighter or as this year. when the air is excluded from the soil by excessive moisture.

A series of experiments have been conducted on the Texas Experiment Station at Temple. Four years of this work is reported in bulletin No. 215. One set of rotations consisted of: One fourth land in cotton; one-fourth land in corn, the soil to be given a very deep plowing one year in four. First year-corn. Plant to small

Second year-small grain. Plant to cowpeas same wee't as harvested. Plow cowpeas under deep before frost. Third year-cotton.

Fourth year-cowpeas. Plow under stuble before frost.

Housing Pullets.

October is a good month to house pullets to start them laying so as to get the benefit of high egg prices during early winter. The pullets should start laying from about September 15 to November 15 to get the maximin return. The ideal time for pullets to start laying, however, is the latter part of October, according to specialists. This will make them molt about December 1, which will give the producer the high prices for November

The pullets which show indication of laying early in October should be fed more grain. A mash containing 10 per cent tankage or meat scrape instead of 20 per cent usually recommended will prove a good feed provided milk is being given. For late hatched pullets fed a moist crumbly mash once a day and at night give all the grain they want.

Housing a month before laying starts, and in houses where there is sufficient roosting room is important. The house should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected and the pullets should be freed from external parasites by treating them with sodium The pullets must be fed well to get

the best returns. A good scratch feed for early winter is a mixture of two pounds of corn to one pound of wheat. oats or barley. A good laying mash is a mixture of bran, 2 pounds, middlings 2, cornmeal 2, and tankage or meat scraps 11/2 pounds; feeding about 15 pounds of grain daily for 100 bens A liberal supply of oyster shell or some other adequate material for shell making should be easy to pick up. A heavy straw litter in the house in which the morning feed should be fed is very advisable. The success of egg producers rests in their attention to housing and feeding the pullets in the fall and winter months to get the maximum return from high-priced eggs.

Hints for Farm and Home. Garden soil will be found in much better condition for seeding next spring if it is plowed this fall. Scrubs can multiply as fast as purebreds-but they never get the right

The winter mulch for the strawberry bed should be carefully selected so that no weed seeds will be introduced into the patch.

Salt is essential to all farm animals. Ordinary barrel salt is the best to feed for the reason that an animal may have all salt desired. Salt should not be mixed with the feed but should get either tee much or too little and suffer as a result. It is not necessary to buy expensive condiments such as the ordinary "stock food," as very few animals need such a tonic but in case they do the material can be mixed at home at a much less cost.





The Surest Step Toward the Longed-For Future Brotherhood of Man

By PROF. ALBERT E. JENKS, in Dearborn Independent.

ONG life, which is so essential, if nationalisms are to be built on memories, we have not had. Our American nationalistic memories are only 150 years, while one-third of our people have no American group memories, but have come to America from groups most of which, in Europe or Asia, are, roughly, 1,000 years old.

Another of our difficulties is due to the fact that we are not a homogeneous people—either a single ethnic group or a well-amalgamated folk. We are heterogeneous to the extreme.

We have no indigenous American language. America, unlike most of the independent nationalistic groups in Europe or Asia, has a borrowed tongue. And this English language which we commonly speak is, as yet, not so common but that millions of our residents cannot use or understand it.

As to a nationalistic religion, we have none. The fundamental law of our land forever separates church and state. . . . When we consider the tremendous power religion has exerted in the civil life of peoples, the thoughtful man must ponder at the possible outcome of the irreligion of America today.

To offset our serious difficulties in the maturing of American nationalisms, we possess three dominant assets:

The first is our geographic isolation, fortunately far from the historic hatreds and fears of European groups.

The second is a gripping environment, which eventually will make us all Americans by breaking those who will not be made American. The third is such vital, idealistic hope for a realizable future in

America as no nation before has held out to individual men. As Americans we are interested in the development and maturity of American nationalisms; first, because we are confident that the ideals of our American nation hold a great wealth of unique blessing for her citizens; and, second, because we believe the constant attempt to perfect her democratic idealism is the surest step toward the longed-for future Brotherhood of Man.

A Feeling That There Is No Panacea for Modern Ills in Bureaucracy

By CHARLES E. HUGHES, Address in Westminster Hall.

The spirit of the common law is opposed to those insidious encroachments upon liberty which take the form of an uncontrolled administrative authority—the modern guise of an ancient tyranny, not the more welcome to intelligent free men because it may bear the label of democracy. It is doubtless impossible to cope with the evils incident to the complexities of our modern life, and to check the multiform assaults of organized cupidity, by the means which were adapted to the simpler practices of an earlier day, but we have an instinctive feeling that there is no panacea for modern ills in bureaucracy.

There is still the need to recognize the ancient right and it is the most precious right of democracy—the right to be governed by law and not by officials—the right to reasonable, definite and proclaimed standards which the citizen can invoke against both malevolence and caprice.

Wo of the common law respect authority, but it is the authority of the legal order. We respect those who in station high or humble execute the law-because it is our law. We esteem them, but only as they esteem and keep within the law.

I have traced more than a hundred diamonds found in glacial uy. drift in Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin. One of the diamonds found in America was a fine stone of seventeen carats, which was discovered by men digging a well in Wisconsin. More than 100 other diamonds have been found in glacial drift in America and some in Canada.

Undoubtedly diamond mines exist in some parts of Canada, and by closely tracing the glacial drift to the point of origin the general locality of the mines may be found. All of the diamond mines in the world today do not occupy an area of more than four square miles.

In its southward movement the glacier must have gouged out the top of the diamond mine and carried the diamonds about, depositing them over an area of a thousand miles or more in diameter. 
