

### Barbless Hook Teaches Both Good Sportsmanship and Good Technique

By H. T. PULSIFER, in Izaak Walton League Monthly.

OME ten years ago, in the late summer, I was paddling across a mirror-like pond in the woods of Main for its fighting trout and their skill in evading the angler's lure. For an hour or so I had east in vain, and then suddenly from behind a lily-pad a great fish rose and struck at my dry fly with that rush which never fails to thrill the angler's heart, no matter how many times spring. Roup is easily recognized he may have seen it. When the fish wearied, I drew it toward the boat.

"That's too fine a fish to kill so late in the season," I said. "I'll slack my line and let him escape." I slacked the line, but nothing happened. I was forced to net the fish and extract the hook, which was deeply embedded in its tongue. Even though the hook was released as gently as cheesy substance clogging the nostrils possible it was no use. ### Roup in Chickens.

While roup may be found in the poultry flock throughout the year, yet the worst epidemics occur during the shifting weather conditions of fall and since it causes the formation of a running mucous which appears in the eyes and nostrils thickening and gradually clogging up all the breathing tubes of the respiratory system. Eventually the mucous secretion turns into ing of the windpipe, causing the bird to lose appetite and die. An offensive the cheesy matter sometimes starts of sight.

Quarantine all ed flock or use implements and utenthem in dry and well ventilated houses, being careful to provide natural surshow the slightest trace or indication of the disease, and watch them care roost. It is extremely important in the prevention and control of the disease that birds, showing the symtoms commonly known as "big eyes," be instantly separated from the flock and solution of potash permanganate. Disinfect the entire house once a week, including fixtures and birds, with a mixture composed of equal parts of water, kerosene and kreso or zenoleum, applying with a fine mist sprayer. When signs of the disease are notice able, spray once a day as directed disinfectant on the heads of the birds. Disinfect all drinking water with a stock solution of potash permanganate,

Some of the most common causes are over-crowding of roosts, dirty and tion from any cause, direct drafts while on the roosts, damp quarters est cause is lack of plenty of fresh air at all times without drafts.

Sunshine in abundance is one of the tives known. Give your birds an op portunity of running out at any and all times. It will keep them strong.

Cull every month and especially early in the fall, disposing of all weak and inferior specimens. It has been noticed that the smallest and weakest birds in the flock are always the first to catch cold. Birds in a weakened be attacked with cold and roup. Apply blue ointment (poison) to kill the lice. It has been our observation that pens fed wet mashes were more liable to contract colds than those fed dry mashes; also, that a draft upon the floor, especially if it strikes the shanks of the birds, is a very common cause of colds. A deep, dry, loose litgood floor, while cement floors have proven very injurious.

While it is not considered practicroup yet an exception may be made in the case of very valuable birds.

Sometimes a cankerous growth in the windpipe may be removed with success. A bird with a noisy, rattling breathing, upon examination will re real a cheesy formation in the wind pipe, almost entirely closing up the opening. Experience teaches that this operation should be performed quickly to prevent suffocation. The following method of performing the operation has proved successful: First, open the mouth wide, pull the tongue out as windpipe within easy reach. Have a piece of broom straw handy for use in an emergency in case of strangulation. With two fingers mercilessly force out the cheesy matter and swab out the inside of the throat with peroxide of hydrogen. This operation may be performed in a few minutes and the bird generally recovers very rapidly unless otherwise affected. Another in dividual treatment which consumer very little time and has been found very satisfactory, is to dip the head of the affected bird into a 2 per cent so lution of potash permanganate. 

## MANY DEVICES USED

TO EXERCISE BULLS

Many a valuable bull is rendered useless by improper care and management, says the United States Department of Agriculture. The importance of exercise is often underestimated. and many bulls, after their value has been proved, are found to be sterile or slow breeders, due largely to close confinement and lack of activity. This is more true of dairy bulls, perhaps, because of their temperament, which makes them more difficult to handle.

Regular exercise helps materially to Seep the bull in good condition. Any method that will make the sluggish bull take exercise regularly and without overwork is satisfactory. The main point is for him to get it. In some countries bulls are yoked like oxen and used to pull a plow, to haul manure, or to do other farm work. Where there is only one bull, special hitching arrangements for work on a cart may be made. Thus the bull not only gets his exercise but at the same time does useful farm work. A treadmill is sometimes used, but is not always satisfactory because the bull sometimes learns tricks for stopping the machine and needs to be watched.

exercising may be all that is needed for some bulls, but others are lazy and need to be forced to exercise. A young bull turned in the lot with an older one will usually cause the older one to take his "dafly dozen." The younger buil will usually be active enough to keep out of danger if the pen is large enough to prevent his being cornered. The owner should use his judgment as to the merits of this

Bulls may be induced to exercise themselves with an empty barrel or keg by bunting or rolling it around the ground or hung by a rope or chain low enough so the bull can butt it with his head. A block of wood, with the corners removed, will serve the same purpose. Some bulls spend hours playing with contrivances of this sort. while others pay little attention to

When an exercise pen is not available, it is a common practice to tie the bull to a ring which slides on a suspended wire or cable 75 to 100 feet long and high enough above the bull's head to prevent him from getting his feet over the lead chain, which should be 12 to 15 feet long. A revolving sweep will give the bull some exercise if he will use 4t.


