Can the Two Factions in Education, the Cultural and Practical, Be Harmonized?

RICHARD BURTON, University of Minnesota.

TSEE three things operating against the welfare of a rightly conceived organic science of popular education. The three are: the fevered chase of the "practical" in education, resulting in no less than a revolution within the generation between 1885 and the present time; the abuse of the so-called democratic ideal; and, as a direct consequence of these two in union, the failure honestly and clearly to see and say that two distinct types of training, the scholarly and the practical, are being commonly lumped together.

It is high time to ask if a college is a machine from which any and every kind of information should be handed out as you turn the crank, or has it for its object intellectual attainment and the pursuit of learning for its own sake? To make the inquiry is not to say that both aims are not legitimate, nor is it to forfeit a claim to sound Americanism. It is simply to ask that we clarify our muddy thinking, and substitute a clear perception of what we are about for a mush of vague conceptions.

Logic demands that we acknowledge that hordes of people in a country like this need all sorts of practical training, and that institutions providing it, and so labeled, should be furnished them, leaving to real colleges (thus clarified by the proper drainage), the business of taking

care of those who want truly collegiate work, and are capable of doing it. In the perfervid desire to give everybody anything he wants, or thinks he wants, in pseudo-education, we have fallen into the danger of giving least to the few intellectual aristocrats who refuse to be standardzed and find most difficulty in fitting into the scheme.

Here, subtly pervading the whole conception of education, is the inine assumption-equally egregious in education and in politics-that Il are equal in brains, if only they are given equal chances. The truth is that in education, politics, life at large, brains are exceptional. Making ducation universal, and all but coercing people to go to college, does not in the least alter that primary fact. It is the business of democracies to remove all artificial and unnecessary bars to personal welfare and progress, but not the bar of nature.

"What a blessing if our colleges had the backbone to say to inquiring youth, 'Almost anybody can go to college, but this doesn't mean that everybody should.' How wonderful if some college, by inheritance the beneficiary and guardian of the sound academic ideal, should speak right out and say that its aim was aristocratic; to prepare the saving remnant to rule the rest of us! But what courage it would take in what we call democratic America!"

#### High School Geography Course Is Declared Vital in Modern Education

DR. GILBERT GROSVENOR, National Geographic Society.

The failure to teach geography in high schools is one of the anomalies of American public school education.

Geography is a basic subject. It enters into history, science, literature, and even the languages. It is a cultural subject of abiding interest and lifelong intellectual fascination. It is a vocational adjunct to many kinds of business and the professions.

A knowledge of geography is essential to understanding the news, and better teaching of geography would stimulate intelligent reading of

A direct service to schools the National Geographic society now renders is the issuance of weekly sets of bulletins to some 20,000 school teachers for use among about 750,000 pupils. These bulletins, which constitute a gift to American education, supplement geography texts with upto-date, interesting, informative, illustrated bulletins on geography. They add to the zest of the study; they enliven it by making contact between the day's news and geographic facts; they take the subject out of the laboratory and make it a part of life.

The National Geographic society, with its membership of nearly one million, has broader facilities for popularizing the use of maps than any other single agency in the world.





#### **FARM ITEMS**

(From S. C. Hoyle, Editor of Extension Service Publications, A. and M. College of Texas.)

Farmers Make Money on Ton Litters.

The idea of producing a ton of pigs from one litter in one hundred and eighty days originated in Indiana in the year 1922. The world was startled that year by one litter having reached 3,040 pounds. In 1923 the leading live stock states entered the contest. In Texas the movement was originated and sponsored by the Extension Service of the A. and M. College of Texas, in co-operation with the Texas Swine Breeders' Association. In 1923 Texas broke the world's record by producing a litter of twelve pigs weighing 3,898 1/2 pounds in one hundred and eighty days, at a cost of \$5.85 per hundredweight. In 1924 Texas again lead all states with a litter of fourteen pigs weighing 4,291 pounds, produced at a cost of \$4.72 per hundredweight. During both years feed was extremely high and out of proportion to the selling price of hogs. In spite of this fact the average profit per litter was \$45.

The work of the past two years has proved conclusively that the old method of requiring from twelve to twentyfour months to finish a hog for market is unprofitable and has cost Texas millions of dollars in wasted feed. It points clearly to the fact that a pig of good breeding receiving balanced and sufficient rations, can be made ready for the market in six months' time, giving not only a profit on the feeds consumed, but a quickturnover on the money invested.

The Texas Ton Litter Contests of the past five years proved so valuable and profitable and have been the source of so much valuable information to Texas hog raisers that plans have been made to have a similar ton litter contest for 1925. The contest is open to all hog raisers in Texas.

#### General Requirements.

(1) Any hog owner residing in Texas is eligible to enroll in the Texas Ton Litter Club without cost. (2) Litters farrowed between February 15 and May 25 are eligible. (3) Litters must be nominated and ear-mark ed within fifteen days after farrowing. (4) The owner shall mominate the litter on cards provided for the purpose, showing the ear-mark, date of farrowing, and number of boar and sow pigs in the litter. Nominating cards can be obtained from county agents or from A. L. Ward, state leader Texas Ton Litter Club, College Station, Texas. (5) The ewner of the county agent shall send the nomination cards to A. L. Ward, College Station. Texas. A duplicate of the nomination card shall be kept by the county agent for reference at the time of inspection. (6) As soon "s possible and not later than July 1, 1925, the litters shall be inspected and the markings verified by the county agent or a person appointed by the state leader. (7) Pigs of the litter which were raised by hand or by other sows can not be included in the final weight of the litter. (8) Members are request ed to keep a memorandum of the rations feed to the sow during the suck ling period and rations fed to the pigs from weaning time until the time of final weighing.

Realizing the fact that the value of this work to the farmers of Texas will be determined by the number enter ing the demonstrations, some of the leading farm papers of the state such as the Farm and Ranch and Dallas Semi-Weekly Farm News, together with the Texas Swine Breeders' Association and several large business firms, have gotten behind this move prizes as well as their co-operation and influence to encourage the farm-Swine Breeders' Association is chartered under the laws of Texas as a non-profiting organization of farmers and has guarateed attractive prem iums. 


