Nordyke's Article On Panhandle In Current Issue Of Holiday Magazine

The Panhandle is featured in the December issue of Holiday as Texas' "last frontier, still proud of its rough edges, its tall stories and its rugged, dust-blown prosperity."

The 4,000-word article on the Panhandle, written by Lewis Nordyke, well-known Amarillo newspaperman, is part of the magazine's three issues which the magazine has devoted principally to Texas.

"The Panhandle isn't a great deal like the rest of the State, but it probably tallies better with the average American's conception of Texas than does the rest of Texas," Nordyke tells the magazine's 6,000,000 readers. It has the chatter of coyotes and the buzz of rattlesnakes; it is the country of 45 caliber ranches and whopper wheat fields; it is where some old cowman said: "Feller needs some elbow room, 'bout forty mile or so," and where another said he could stand on the schoolhouse steps and see straight ahead for three days.

"Wheat, cattle, and oil and gas are listed as the Panhandle's chief sources of prosperity. Four million acres in the Panhandle produced 75,000,000 bushels of wheat last year, and oil and gas have become a \$200,000,000 annual business, it was pointed out.

"Amarillo is the Panhandle metropolis," the article continues. Largely because of the war boom and farming and ranching prosperity its population jumped from 40,000 to more than 80,000 in the past 10 years. Amarillo wears a big hat and likes a good story.

Author Nordyke continues, "Quite a chunk of this adoration for the mammoth came from Gene Howe, publisher of the Amarillo News Globe. For twenty-five years he has good-

The ranch has been so successful that fully a dozen states in Texas and several other States are planning similar projects."

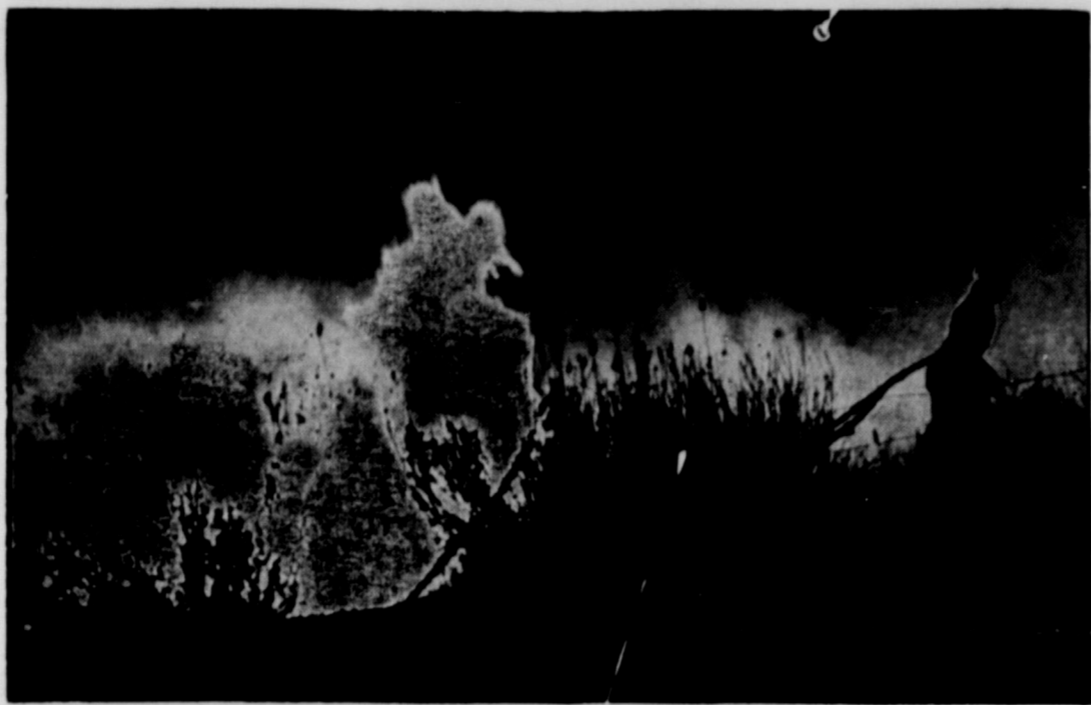

Cattle Grubs Are Robbers!

County Agent Warns Cattlemen To Treat Now For Grubs; Formulas and Methods Are Given

"At the market, cattle with grubs docked from a half cent to a cent and a half per pound. This means around \$3.86 per animal, which amounts to quite a bit when you're the owner of a big herd," said County Agent Hugh Clearman, warning cattlemen that this is the time of year to do something about grubs.

Two million Texas cattle are slaughtered every year, and over one-third of these are grubby cattle. A more direct loss to the farmer is feed. It has to feed his cattle about 15 percent more than usual just because of the grubs, Clearman pointed out.

The fall and early winter is the best time to treat cattle for grubs because this is the time

of year the grubs mature and fall off the animal to the ground, says Clearman.

The stockman has three choices of controlling grubs—dust, spray and dip. If you use the first method, dust the backs of the animals thoroughly with one part 5 percent rotenone and two parts tripoli earth or talc. Clearman suggests using a fruit jar with 15 holes in the lid one-fourth inch in diameter. Rub the dust into the hair with the fingertips.

For a spray, mix seven and a half pounds of 5 percent rotenone in 100 gallons of water. Wet the backs of the animals thoroughly with a sprayer that holds at least 250 pounds pres-grubs because this is the time

Both lice and grubs can be controlled in a dip containing one pound of 5 percent rotenone and 10 pounds of wettable sulphur in 100 gallons of water. It'll take two dips 17 to 21 days apart, and the first should be made 10 to 14 days after the grubs are first noticed in the back.

Here's another way to picture the grub losses. Enough leather is lost each year to furnish shoes for one million people for a year.

The milk flow is reduced around a quarter, says Clearman, but most important of all, is the five million dollars lost by Texas farmers.

That's a lot of money to pay for grubby cattle.

Panhandle-Santa Fe Seeks Merger Of Six Companies

Application was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission Nov. 3, by the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company for permission to merge six non-operating subsidiary railroad companies, according to Fred G. Gurley, Santa Fe Railway president.

The Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe also filed with the Commission to merge eight non-operating subsidiary railroad companies, Gurley added.

Purpose of the proposed merger is to simplify system corporate structure and accounting. The properties of all the merging companies are leased to the Panhandle or Gulf companies, which operate all the railroads of the Santa Fe system within the State of Texas.

No changes in operating or working conditions will occur if the mergers are approved by the Commission, but the merger will create an internal simplification.

Governor Urges "Silent Guest" Plan To Aid Starving Families In Europe

On Thanksgiving Day the American Silent Guest Plan for relief to distressed Europe will be inaugurated over the nation for a second consecutive year, Governor Beauford H. Jester has announced.

The Governor has proclaimed the month November 25 to December 25 as Silent Guest Plan month in Texas.

Last year's drive netted more than \$1,400 for Texas's share of the aid to Europe's poverty-stricken people—war orphans, widows and old folks. The Governor expressed confidence that donations in 1948 will exceed those collected last year.

As projected through the nation, this plan calls for each American family to invite a "Silent Guest" to eat at his table for one month, sharing in a Thanksgiving and a Christmas dinner.

Mindful of the fact that it would cost a family approximately \$30 to feed a guest for one month, the Governor has suggested that those families with limited incomes may "share" a Thanksgiving meal, or that and a Christmas dinner.

After calculating the cost for feeding this extra person, the family may mail a check or money order, covering that sum, to the Governor's Office in Austin. The collections will be forwarded then to Committee headquarters for purchase of food packages from the non-profit government-approved organization, CARE, for delivery to needy families in Europe. Governor Jester said.

3 Plains Youths Win Educational Awards Of Santa Fe

Rheumatic Heart Disease Is Most Dangerous, 10-25

AUSTIN, Texas—Rheumatic heart disease, a crippling and killer of children, is one of the leading causes of death and disability among children and young adults in the age group 10 to 25 years.

No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough has as yet been developed for its prevention and control, but we do know some of the danger signals and with a physician's early diagnosis, some of the damaging results of this disease may be prevented.

Quoting Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, "in general, the early symptoms of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is felt usually in one of these joints and spreads to the others. Often a child is irritable and cross without any apparent cause; he may cry easily and develop habits indicating nervousness. These symptoms may mean the beginning of an attack of rheumatic fever, and a physician should be consulted immediately.

Predisposing causes to this disease, which include frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, poor diet, colds, an attack of scarlet fever or other infections caused by certain streptococcus germs, should be carefully avoided.

Protection against these predisposing causes may mean protection against rheumatic heart disease, and these safeguards should be observed. Have children examined by a physician at least once a year; see that they have a well balanced and nourishing diet; make certain that they get sufficient rest, and see to it that they are dressed according to the temperature of the room or the playground. Consult a physician at once if symptoms indicate that this disease may be present, and if the doctor prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be followed exactly as given.

Farm Products Bring Firm To Higher Prices; Movement Of Turkeys Remains Light

Southwest farm products remained mostly firm to higher prices during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Corn climbed seven to ten cents a bushel for the week, as wheat gained five, oats three, and barley two. No. 1 hard wheat closed Monday at \$2.45 1/2, at Texas common points. Based on No. 2 grades white corn sold around \$1.78 to \$1.90, yellow corn \$1.63, barley \$1.45 to \$1.49, and oats \$1.01 to \$1.02 at Galveston. Sorghums gained 12 cents a hundred pounds to sell at \$2.67 to \$2.72 for No. 2 grade.

Some feedstuffs brought higher prices for the week, while most others held firm. Top quality alfalfa and prairie hay maintained unchanged to firm values. Lower grades took heavy discounts. Peanut quality improved on late diggings. Prices of the Spanish and runner types remained at support levels.

Movements of turkeys to the Thanksgiving market remained light last week. Prices ranged from around 40 to 45 cents for young toms and 45 to 50 for young turkey hens. Eggs strengthened slightly, while poultry held mostly steady to firm. Best fresh eggs brought 56 to 55 cents in North Texas, and fryers 32 to 34 cents.

Texas vegetables and citrus fruits moved to market in increasing volume during the past week. South Texas green beans, spinach, broccoli, eggplant and bell peppers had become regular offerings at Fort Worth about unchanged prices. Tomatoes held firm, as Texas shipments began to roll. Truck arrivals at New Orleans included many Texas products such as carrots, lettuce, eggplant and peppers. Sweet potatoes sold firm to slightly stronger in Southern Louisiana.

Cattle sold generally unchanged to \$1 or more higher for the week. Stockers and feeders showed greatest strength in Texas and Oklahoma. Medium and good whiteface stocker calves changed hands at \$19 to \$22 at Houston, where Brahams moved at \$17 to \$20. Medium and good stocker calves went back to the country at \$22 to \$24.50 at San Antonio and \$21 to \$26 at Oklahoma City. Fort Worth took stocker steer calves at \$25 and down Denver bought a few loads of choice at \$29.
