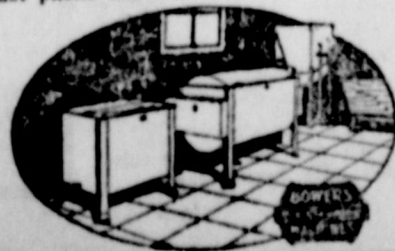

## BIG OIL LEASE DEAL IS CLOSED LAST WEEK-END

Mrs. J. B. McPhee Pays \$1.25  
An Acre for Hamilton Land.

A deal which has been pend-  
ing for the past four months  
was closed the past week-end  
when Mrs. J. B. McPhee, noted  
in the oil industry, leased ap-  
proximately 14,000 acres of land  
at \$1.25 an acre from Russ and  
Hal Hamilton.

The land is located in Terrell  
County near the Val Verde  
County border line. The deal  
was closed for \$19,600.

Mrs. McPhee plans to drill on  
this land. During the past four  
months, she has had an option  
on the land and has had her ge-  
ologists working on it.

She has also leased 5,000 acres  
of land from Jim White and  
5,000 acres from Earnest Ham-  
ilton. This land also brought  
\$1.25 in lease money.

Socrates and later writers made versions of the Babrian inventions, to which they gave Aesop's name, thus bestowing immortality upon one sage and robbing another of his rightful laurels. A mistake in computation by a Sixth century chronologist is responsible for the com-

mon and erroneous understanding that Christ's birth was in the year 1. Christ was not born in the first year of the Christian era but about four years before the beginning of that period. Cinderella's slipper was made not of glass but of sabbie. Nothing else and similar errors, Josh Billings once wrote: "The trouble with most folks isn't so much their ignorance, as knowin' so many things that ain't so."—Mentor Magazine.

**10-TON ROCK NEARLY WRECKS FAST TRAIN**

Struck Front Side of Engine, Breaking Step and Damaging the Coaches.

As the east-bound Argonaut limited passenger train reached a point even with one of the bluffs between Castle Canyon bridges Nos. 1 and 2 Saturday morning, a ten-ton rock was dislodged from the bluff by the vibration from the train and slid down onto the right-of-way. Fortunately for the crew and passengers, the big rock did not fall far enough to cause it to bounce and strike with sufficient force to derail the train.

Only an edge of it struck the front side of the engine, cracking the link step on the left side of the engine and breaking the step off the engine tank as it passed. Every car on the train, with the exception of the baggage car was slightly damaged.

If the big rock had not come to rest almost clear of the train, it is believed that it would have caused one of the most serious wrecks of recent years, because once the engine and cars were derailed going at the speed traveled by this limited train, they would have hurtled to the bottom of the incline on the opposite side of the track, probably killing dozens of passengers.

A wrecking crew was immediately dispatched to the scene of the incident to remove the rock, which was first blazed into smaller pieces and removed from the roadbed.

Damage to cars of the train was confined to the battery boxes hanging down underneath, which struck the rock as the train passed. This damage is estimated to total about \$20 or \$25 a car.—Val Verde County Herald.

TEXAS ITEMS

There has been increased interest in irrigation around Uvalde since a number of shallow wells have been brought in.

About 150 cars of cattle have been shipped from Center this season, 25 to a car, and the price paid is an average of about \$25.

DeWitt county will probably ship out more corn this year than for several seasons past, as there seems to be a surplus to spare.

Four issues of Port Bend county special road bonds aggregating \$675,000 have been approved by the attorney general's department.

Texas leads all states in the number of farm-owned motor vehicles, having a rural registration of 262,000 motor cars and 23,000 motor trucks.

San Marcos river valley farmers in the Martindale section have decided to grow spinach and it is stated that more than \$2000 has been spent for seed.

Corpus Christi's postal receipts for the first quarter of the fiscal year beginning July 1, totaled \$24,261.61, an increase of nearly \$2,000 for the same period.

In 1925 there was more than \$20,000,000 valuation in Matagorda county. In 1927 it had more than \$23,000,000 valuation, an increase of practically \$3,000,000 in two years.

The tax rolls of Colorado county have been approved and sent to the state comptroller's department. Total valuation of the county is \$13,941,566, an increase of \$73,809 over 1926.

Pecans are ripening and falling in the Weimar section and will be plentiful within a short time.

The state highway headlight division is warning motorists who have bought second-hand cars since January 1 to file bills of sale and applications for license transfer with county clerks.

New homes valued at \$126,565 were started during September, records from the office of the building inspector disclose. Permits for 66 homes were taken out.

Texas Press Association members are to be guests of the State Fair Association Friday, October 14, and Saturday, October 15.

Release of a large number of cotton pickers in the zone south of Waco within a few days is expected to relieve an acute situation felt by farmers in West Texas.

Everyone of the 381 patients treated for rabies at the Pasteur Institute at Austin during the fiscal year just ended recovered, the report of S. W. Bohls, superintendent, to the board of control has revealed.

New cotton rates between five Texas towns have been posted by the railroad commission in response to application of the Texas and New Orleans railroad.

Superiority of Texas sheep and wool over those from other states was emphasized at the recent official show of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association of Texas at Fort Worth.

An average of \$20.40 was spent during August for support and care of each of the 13,348 inmates of 15 state eleemosynary institutions.

Damage estimated at \$70,000 was done when the dam on the Nueces River six miles north of Crystal City collapsed under the strain of water unloosed by a six-inch rain recently.

Road construction contracts including 515 miles costing \$8,188,761, and maintenance contracts involving 393 miles of highway and totaling \$930,121, were let by the State Highway Commission between March 10 and September 26.

The State Board of Water Engineers has set for hearing at Mercedes, November 5, the application of the Cameron and Hidalgo County Water Control Improvement District to embrace the areas of the American Rio Grande Land and Irrigation Co., with pumping station at Mercedes.

Developers of the new townsite of La Jolla, 11 miles west of Mission, have placed an initial order with a nursery for 18,000 citrus trees.

Revolt in Mexico

Mexico City.—The iron hand of Calles already has fallen upon the alleged instigators of the military revolt. Less than 24 hours after the uprising started in Mexico City General Francisco Serrano, candidate for the presidency, former war minister and once close friend of General Obregon, declared to be the main leader in the attempt against the government, was captured, court-martialed and executed.

Range Conditions Good. Fort Worth, Tex.—Range conditions in Texas are good and seem to be improving.

Treat Editors to Barbecue. McAllen, Tex.—Texas editors at their State meet at McAllen November 24 to 26 will be entertained with an old-fashioned barbecue.

New Texas Postmasters Named. Washington, D. C.—The appointment of Miss Edna Siman as postmaster at Grayburg, Hardin County, Texas, was Friday announced by the Postoffice Department.

Ships Through Panama Canal. Panama.—Vessels numbering 549 passed through the Panama Canal during September, according to figures published this week.

England's Health Costs \$4,500,000. London.—Scarlet fever, diphtheria, and kindred diseases cost London nearly \$4,500,000 during 1925, according to the Metropolitan asylums board report.

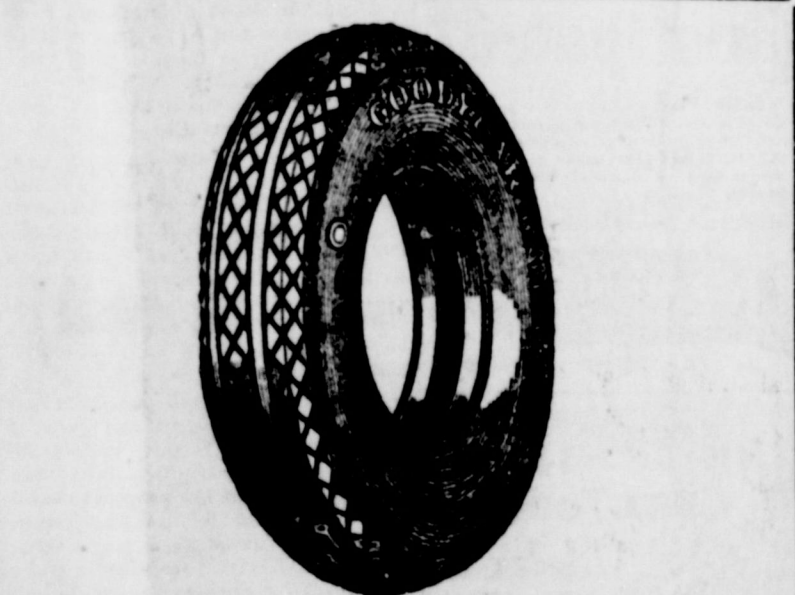
