TEXAS ITEMS

Cameron County has been granted \$75,000 state aid on one of its road projects.

Shipping of the fall clip of wool from Kerrville is now under way. About 30 cars will be required to move the crop.

Plans and specifications for a city sewer system have been completed and are under consideration by the Freeport city council.

To date this season Gonzales has shipped out 50 carloads of corn. The corn crop this year is one of the finest and largest ever known in the county.

One thousand dollars was contributed at Mercedes Thursday for starting libraries in the junior high school and the grammar schools in Mercedes.

A total of 500 cars of turkeys, representing 10,000,000 pounds of Thanksgiving meat, moved out of Texas in the past two weeks consigned to points north, east and west.

Detroit was selected the 1925 convention city of the American Society for Municipal Improvement at the concluding session of the 1927 convention at Dallas.

A total of 16,980 rats and salamanders have been reported killed by the Smith county school pupils since the anti-rat campaign started in Smith county two weeks ago.

A portion of highway No 19 from the Trinity county line through Lovelady almost to Crockett will soon be turned into a first-class highway as per contract which has just been awarded.

A recent report of the Texas Citrus Growers Exchange shows a total of 302 cars of citrus fruit shipped to date from the Valley. Shipment of grapefruit predominated.

Amarillo was selected as the next convention city for the Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Associations at a board of managers meeting Friday at Houston.

Governor Dan Moody bagged his first deer of the current season near Fredericksburg, Friday. It was a 10-pointer, Colonel Alfred Petch, on the governor's hunting party, also killed an 15-point buck, declared to be one of the finest specimens ever brought down in Gillespie county.

Thirty-four railroad accidents occurred at grade crossings in Texas during September, resulting in the death of nine persons and injuries to 29 others, according to reports received by the railroad commission. Automobiles figured in 29 of the accidents, with 6 deaths and 27 persons injured.

Airmapping of the San Antonio-Austin Post Road has been temporarily postponed until it has been found whether the intermediate towns will co-operate in the plan to re-route the highway with the view of shortening the distance approximately 10 miles and eliminating dangerous curves and railroad crossings, the State Highway Department has announced.

Corpus Christi will be the permanent headquarters of the South Texas chamber of commerce. The next annual convention of the organization will be held at Laredo, at a time to be set by the executive committee. This action was taken recently by the board of directors of the chamber, following formal adjournment of the final session of the first annual convention.

During the month of October there were 75 wells completed in Gulf Coast coastal territory, or 15 tests less than during the preceding month. Of the 75 wells completed last month 59 were producers with a combined initial flow of 45,300 barrels. This compares with 52 producers brought in in September with an initial flow of 41,000 barrels. On November 1 there were 168 wells, including wildcats, drilling in Gulf Coast-Coastal Louisiana territory, or 23 more than on October 1.

Asphalt surfacing is being laid by the present State Highway Commission at less than one-third of the cost provided for in contracts entered into by a former highway commission, Gov. Dan Moody stated this week. The governor obtained figures from the highway department and said he is "gratified to learn that this commission is having this work done at a much lower cost than it was done by its 1925 and 1926 predecessors."

The express rate on vegetables, carload, from Corpus Christi to Dallas and Fort Worth, is reduced from \$1.24 to \$1.23 per 100 pounds in an order issued this week by the Railroad Commission.

The lumber-planing-in-transit rate case hearing postponed by the state railroad commission until its December term will be extended in scope to include a proposal by Texas railroads to cancel all existing planing-in-transit rules on lumber shipments and establish a uniform set of rules, the commission announced this week.

Texas grain shippers will meet at Fort Worth on November 25 to decide what action they will take in the general investigation of grain rates by the interstate commerce commission.

One of the largest citrus fruit orchards in the United States, individually owned, is that of John Armengol, owner of the San Rafael Farm, located on the Zapata Highway ten miles south of Laredo, where at this time there are 12,000 citrus fruit trees growing on the 180 acres devoted to culture of fruit of that character.

Time for Churches to End Contentions Over Dead Issues and Petty Questions

BRIDGE, golf, dancing, aviation and mountain climbing are the gods of the hour, and they are stern rivals of all the religious attitudes which enjoin the old-fashioned virtues. I, for one, however, do not believe that human nature has become depraved. I see many signs of returning sanity, and I am confident that the native hunger of the human soul for God will reassert itself and bring social health and healing.

The persons who are saying today they do not believe in God only mean they do not believe in the kind of God they have heard preached about. It is significant that 8,000,000 copies of the New Testament were sold last year. Let the churches stop contentions over dead issues and petty questions and turn all their energies to present-day constructive interpretation of a religion of life, and the fathers and mothers of little children will quickly show a new interest.

The widespread loss of interest in religion is due mainly to the general prevailing confusion on the subject. It seems to many persons like a hopeless muddle. It sounds to them like words and jargon. It does not function. It opens no doors of life. It kindles no enthusiasm. It promotes no daring adventures. The critical situation which prevails in our homes is not due to the perversity of parents nor, primarily, to the complexity of modern life. It is due in large measure to the lack of insight, inspiration, leadership and faith on the part of those who should be the guides and prophets of religion today.

I am convinced that we cannot avoid serious catastrophe unless we deepen the foundation of our social structure; it is top-heavy and not built with a plumb-line. The situation, I think, calls for a profound reorganization of all our educational methods and systems from the kindergarten to the university graduate school. We need to shift the point of view from the supply of information to the formation of life and character.

City Methods of Church Work Have Little Value in Rural Communities

The church must teach religion to the rural population of America in the language of the open country and in farm homes, rather than in churches and in formal terms. When you go fishing, you get a guide who knows the waters, not a tenderfoot with a trunkful of sporting magazines and department store tackle. If you are going to get the residents of rural America into the church, you cannot use the plans made by city men.

The preaching mission will not work in the country. The farmers and their families stay away from revivals. Further, the rural layman will not do personal evangelistic work. He fears seeming to be self-righteous or a hypocrite. His unchurched neighbor knows him too well.

If the church is to attract the country folk, it must do so by informal meetings, in the parish house or farm home, always using the social element. Dinners for men and luncheons for women, community sings, informal talks—these are some of the methods which must be used. To such a program rural residents will invite their neighbors as readily as they would to a Rotary club meeting in town.

Mankind Cannot Ever Remain Faithful to Past Traditions and Beliefs

In order to live fully and abreast of the changing times we must, to a certain degree, become unfaithful to the traditions and beliefs of the past.

Where are the docile youths of yesterday who followed the dictates of mature minds? They have gone out into the world and become infected with the inventive fever of this age. Scientific and inventive enterprises of the past quarter century have changed the entire outlook on life.

Development is evolution, an incessant disloyalty to what has been. As for moral values, life has donated certain customs and codes, and if the codes and customs require changes suited to our needs, then the loyalty to life that ever changes must yield. Morality is for the sake of life, not life for the sake of morality.

Nation's Laws Should Be in Harmony With Conscience and Public Opinion

By JUSTICE FLOYD E. THOMPSON, Illinois Supreme Court.

The virtue of law observance is the greatest aid to law enforcement, but the degree of law observance will not be greater than the degree of popular respect for law and the agencies of law enforcement. Safety lies in keeping laws in harmony with conscience and public opinion.

Because of my recent humiliating experience in having a Constitution day address reported as advocating defiance and disobedience of distasteful laws, I was tempted to cancel this address, but realized the greater danger of cessation of public discussion as compared with that of misquotation or partisan application of remarks.

The greatest aid to law observance is law observance. Without it we cannot have orderly government. If the time should come when any substantial portion of our people obey the law only under the influence of the policeman's club, our government shall be headed for destruction.

Works of Modern Authors, Portraying Only Evil, Revolt From Convention

The youthful authors of today have an extraordinary capacity for portraying the evil they see in life, but that is as far as they can go. They are good at getting people into trouble but they can't get them out. Literature is a mirror of the civilization that produces it and the novels of today reflect in a very stark way the revolt from convention and authority among the youth of the land. All this literature of revolt is desperately tragic. There is not a joyous note in it. This is because youth has made a demand for freedom without setting up any new ideals. It would break with the authority of the old morality without establishing any new morality. They have acquainted themselves with, and portray in their literature, only the things that lead to destruction, and man cannot reconstruct himself on the basis of forces that led to his destruction.

FARM CONDITIONS GREATLY IMPROVED

Terrell Estimates The Texas Cotton Crop In Final Report At 4,250,000 Bales.

Austin, Tex.—General conditions on the farm have greatly improved, said State Agricultural Commissioner G. H. Terrell in his final crop report for the season.

Terrell reports the Texas cotton crop at 4,250,000 bales. His estimate on other crops is: Corn, 114,000,000 bushels, (1926) 106,000,000. Oats, 45,000,000 bushels, (1926) 63,000,000. Wheat, 28,000,000 bushels, (1926) 32,000,000. The 1926 cotton crop was 5,609,000 bales. Terrell said that cotton is practically all gathered except in the northwest and that it will average one-fourth bale to the acre.

"The price of cotton and cotton seed has been better than it was last season," his report said. "The price of cotton is still too low as the total crop is estimated at 359,000 below last year's production."

"The short crop and increased consumption justify 25 cent cotton, and cotton reached that price early in the season when the short crop was announced by the government, but for some unaccountable reason cotton has declined since that time with no apparent cause."

"Supply and demand are not now controlling the price, but the price is controlled by the exchange gamblers, and it may not advance until nearly all the cotton leaves the farmers' hands."

On other farm conditions, Terrell said: "With the exception of oats other feed crops are very good, such as grain, sorghum, hay and other forage crops. In 70 per cent of the counties enough feed has been made to do them. Fall planting of oats and wheat has increased about 15 per cent with the main wheat acreage in the northwest district and the largest oats acreage in the central and northern districts. "Production of pork, dairy products and poultry has increased and the price of cattle, wool and mohair is fairly good."

COUNTRY BANKS TO GET STATE FUNDS

Austin, Tex.—A policy of depositing "idle" state funds in country banks of Texas so they can make farm loans giving farmers plenty of time to market their crops, was reaffirmed on behalf of the state depository board by Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher, member, Friday, in an announcement that more than 50 such banks have just been designated as state depositories.

The number of designations will be increased to almost 100, at another meeting of the board, he said, and about \$3,000,000 will be deposited immediately with country banks. This sum represents one-fourth of the annual average treasury balance deposited, the remainder going to reserve depositories in the 19 larger cities of the state.

Allotment of \$1,000,000 state funds for the three reserve depository banks at San Antonio, designated Wednesday by the state depository board, will be increased to \$1,500,000 at the board's next meeting, Hatcher said. Maximum funds to be deposited in banks of 10 Texas cities of 25,000 population and over, will be, Hatcher said, about as follows for each city: Austin, \$2,500,000; Dallas and Houston, \$3,500,000 each; Fort Worth and San Antonio, \$1,500,000 each; Waco, Galveston and Wichita Falls, \$750,000 each; Beaumont, \$300,000; El Paso, \$200,000.

Pecos County Gusher Breaks Record.

Tulsa, Okla.—The No. 2-C Yates well in the Yates pool of southeastern Pecos County, Texas, Tuesday had developed into the second largest oil well ever found in the world and the largest ever developed in the United States. The test showed it flowing at the rate of 65,880 barrels a day, its developers, the Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company, announced.

Pension for Gen. Wood's Widow.

Havana, Cuba.—The Cuban house of representatives passed a bill granting a pension of \$500 monthly to the widow of Major General Leonard Wood.

Australian Wool Crop.

Rome.—The Australian wool crop of the present season is estimated at 790,000,000 pounds, thin, fine, sound and suitable for continental requirements, says telegraphic information received on Friday by the International Institute of Agriculture.

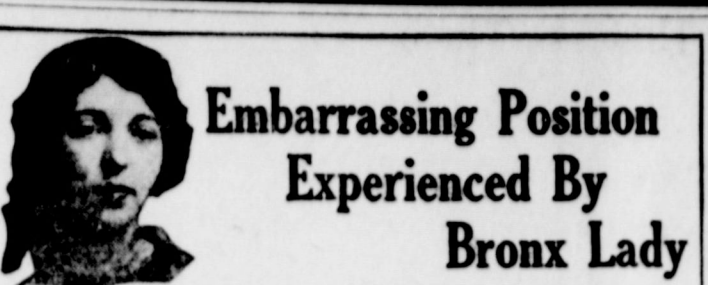
Austin, Tex.—S. H. Treadaway, Liberty County, has been appointed resident road engineer of Henderson County.

Body Proportions No Sign of Intelligence

"People with relatively small bodies are not necessarily more intelligent than people with large bodies," says Dr. William H. Sheldon of the University of Chicago. Doctor Sheldon has measured 450 men of the entering class of the university. The investigation was made in order to gain further data on this question, since a similar experiment made with 75 students by Doctor Naccarati at Columbia university in 1921 had indicated that there might be a definite relationship between body type and mentality. Reporting the results of his experiment to the Journal of Personal Research, Doctor Sheldon states that, while he was measuring each student, a personal estimate of his intelligence was gained. When he compared his records of the body types of the students with their ratings in intelligence tests and their college grades, he found that the relationship of body proportions to mentality was a less trustworthy criterion than a personal estimate of the student's brains based on ten minutes' acquaintance.

and Mrs. Pridgen's oldest son enlisted in the southern army. Six of her children were living this year, three of whom were unmarried and residing with their mother.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy in a nearby city sent a bouquet of flowers to Mrs. Pridgen on the occasion of her 103rd birthday anniversary, and other southern societies have honored this distinguished North Carolinian.
