EDITORIAL

STOP COTTON PESTS

Insects destroyed \$18,783,000 less cotton and seed in Texas last year than in 1951.

This optimistic news was released last week by the National Cotton Council which reported that, in spite of the evident progress in this direction, insects reduced the full yield in the state an estimated 7 per cent.

Obviously, our cotton farmers have made a concerted effort to control boll weevils, bollworms, aphids, thrips, and the other pests that plague their crops and, consequently, a great industry.

They have learned through painful experience that a hungry insect has little respect for cotton and they stand ready to greet his arrival with a control program recommended by their state entomologists.

Last year, crop losses due to insect damage in Texas amounted to \$100,932,000. This seems staggering, even in the face of the fact that it is \$18,500,000 less than the year before.

And it is urgent that farmers check fields frequently for pests and carry out a thorough poisoning schedule if the current crop is not to suffer as much or more than the one of two years ago.

The Postmaster General is apparently going to make the department break even by raising all rates. The box rents will be increased the first of the month. The parcel post rates will be increased by 36% in the fall and the Postmaster General has applied to Congress for increases across the board on all classes of mails. We heard a great deal about the economies to be expected from the new administration with the Postal Department singled out as being particularly guilty of waste. However, instead of the economies they are going to balance the budget by raising rates.

There is a great deal of editorial comment from day to day on the problem of drunken driving. We read of surveys being made in which it is found that 35 to 50% of all accidents are due to intoxication. Many states have passed laws with teeth in them to minimize the amount of driving while drinking. None of them have been altogether successful. The record of the last legislature is proof of how difficult it is to get a bill passed to control the DWI cases. About the easiest way to get by with killing a man is to do it with a car while under the influence of drink.

There is always a lot of publicity when many lives are lost in a tragedy such as the recent tornado. Many times that many are killed in Texas each year in automobile accidents attributed to drunken driving. We read of instances daily in the papers and they mean little to us. The only time we are impressed is if the victim or victims are close to us.

I conducted a funeral this week for a good friend who lost his life in such an accident. All deaths are tragic but this one was made more tragic because it was so useless and needless. Although murder charges have been filed in the case, it is unlikely that much will come of it.

The average husband and father gives much thought to leaving his family in a secure financial condition should he die. It is commendable and is a responsibility that should be met. Too many times sight is lost of how much comfort it is to the family if the one who dies is a Christian. There can be no greater solace to the bereaved than the knowledge that there is a home through eternity for the loved one who has died. The peace of mind of our loved ones should be as important as their financial condition.

1 package orange gelatin
1 Tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
1 medium, ripe banana, sliced

Drain pineapple, saving juice. Add enough water to juice to make 1 cup. Heat to boiling, then stir in gelatin until dissolved. Stir in lemon juice and salt. Cool to room temperature. Rub with vegetable oil a mold or bowl holding about 5 cups. Stir milk into cooled gelatin. Chill until slightly thicker than unbeaten egg whites. Beat with rotary beater or electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Fold in pineapple and banana. Put into oiled mold. Chill until firm. Keep chilled until ready to serve. Makes 4 servings.
