COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of Jodok

A copy of the "Christian Century" one of most popular religious magazines, was handed to me by my publisher, from one of our lady friends, with a request to hand it to me, and on which was marked title, calling my attention to an article entitled—"Why Youth Programs Fail." The author of the article was Wesner Fallaw.

I do not know Mr. Fallaw, either through reputation as a writer, or otherwise, having, so far as I remember, never before read any of his writings. However, I have read the article over rather carefully, so far as weariness and drowsiness in the evenings and interruptions in routine work during the day, will permit. I would be pleased if I could reproduce it here, but my space will not permit, even though I were not to interpose comments of my own way of thinking, which I wish to do, as I take it, that was partly the purpose in sending the article to me.

But whether that may have been the intention or not, I shall begin by stating that ideas expressed by the author fit into my way of thinking to a T. I shall take the privilege of quoting some of the author's expressions, however as bringing out the poignancy of some of my views and also a criticism of the author's grammatical use of words. He uses the word "youth" in the singular form, and with plural verbs. That, no doubt, is correct usage, but sounds awkward to me. That, however, does not matter but I mention it only in the event that I may quote some of such of his expressions.

The article begins with the following question and answer: "How can the church hold its youth?" His answer is: "It can't." I wholly agree with the author on that point. No institution, organization, individual or group of individuals, of whatsoever kind or for whatsoever purpose, can keep anything that it or they does or do not have. If a church or any other organization has a "youth" group, it need not worry, for that group will keep itself within the jurisdiction or dominion of the organization of its own accord, because it is a principal part of the said organization. Since the author in his article deals only with the church and the young people, I like the term "young people" better than the word "youth" so I will use mostly in my own comments. I will also deal with the subject from that view point, but allowing that my views shall apply the same to practically all other organizations or as individuals.

All the way throughout the article by Mr. Fallaw, as I understand him, he is defending the young people or "youth" as he expresses it. It occurs to me that the greater number of crimes that are recorded in the newspapers are committed by the younger or rising generation, which has a tendency to create an impression that the younger people are a group of criminals. I have never thought so nor do I now think so. Neither do I agree with some people that there is no such thing as a bad boy. There are such, and it appears that some of them are the descendants of some of the best parents on earth, and more is the pity, so it seems.

### What is Fate of Dairymen

In the article which appeared in the Friona Star in its issue of March 18th, entitled "What is Fate of Dairy Men Faced with Surplus Milk?" by J. W. White, the statement was made, "One of the bones of contention seemed to be the 'surplus milk' problem, and this seems to have come about in this manner, as understood by a disinterested party. Some time ago, the Borden Company prevailed upon the local dairymen to go to considerable expense in equipping their dairy barns for the production of grade 'A' milk, agreeing then to take all their products at grade 'A' prices. The company then, it seems, insisted upon the farmers purchasing more dairy cows, so as to increase their output of milk, agreeing to loan the money with which to buy the cows, and to collect this money by retaining a certain per cent of the farmers' milk check, but the farmer was required to sign a contract to sell his entire output to the company."

And this is where the error was made in the statement as made in the article. Instead of being bound to sell his entire output to the company, he was required to sell only a part of his output, and that part or portion was left to the discretion of the farmer or producer. Such an agreement is truly just and fair, as the company is surely entitled to protect itself for the funds it had put out in loans to the producers, and was no imposition whatsoever upon the producers, as they were at perfect liberty to dispose of any surplus milk in any form and on any market they might choose. The company further agreed to pay the dairymen the prevailing "sweet cream" price for any surplus milk they sent in to the company.

This later information was brought to me by Tilden Slagle, secretary of the Paramer County Dairy Association on Monday of this week and I am more than pleased to have the information and be able to correct the erroneous statement. My informant further informed me, that the "total" production provision was with some other milk buying concern, as he understood the matter, and had evidently been confused with the terms of the Borden Company and thus gave rise to the erroneous report, and that he had also heard it as I had stated it in the former article.

I trust I have made my correction clear, and I sincerely beg the pardon of all concerned, as I most surely do not desire to do or say anything that may be unjust or unfair to any person or persons. I thank you.

NEARLY 6000 CHILDREN TREATED BY SCOTTISH RITE HOSPITAL

Six hundred and five crippled children of Texas received surgery and medical attention at the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children in Dallas, according to the recent annual report released by Asher Mintz, secretary.

In addition to the 605 in-patients for the year, 5311 clinic treatments were given other crippled children, who came to the hospital from all corners of Texas. A large number of cases were orthopedic or bone patients, under the care of Dr. Brandon Carrell, chief surgeon. Approximately 100 of the permanent bed patients were oral cases under the treatment of Dr. A. L. Frew. There were 165 polio patients treated during the 1948 epidemic.

The annual Christmas fundraising campaign showed receipts sufficient to cover only about one-third of the annual financial needs of the hospital, and that operating costs have doubled under the pre-war period. Mr. Mintz's report indicated.

Parity Support Announced

1949 grain sorghum support price has been announced at 70 per cent of parity based on prices April 15, 1949. If these prices are the same on April 15 as they were on February 15, 1949, this would mean approximately \$1.97 per hundredweight in the county. Cotton support will be based on 90 per cent of parity. Wheat support has not as yet been announced.

Grain Sorghum Delivery

Commodity Credit Corporation has announced they will take about million bushels of early delivery grain sorghums in Texas, on a voluntary basis. This grain must grade either No. 1 or No. 2 Yellow Milo. Farm stored and county elevators will be given first preference. This grain can be under either loan or purchase agreement. Paramer county has been given an allotment of a little over a million bushels of the eight million needed. Any of you farmers wanting more information regarding this please contact the ACA office in Farwell.

Indicates Acreage Allotments

All indications point to wheat and cotton acreage allotments for the 1950 crop year. It will be necessary for us to fill out farm worksheets on all farms in the county within the next sixty days. This worksheet calls for acreage of all crops planted during the years 1941, 1945 through 1949. It would be a good idea for all producers to be thinking about this so you have it when necessary for us to secure the above information.

### Dairy Show Is Scheduled

The 4-H and FFA Dairy Clubs of Paramer County will hold a Dairy Show here next Friday, April 18th, at the Friona School Stock Barn for classifying dairy stock.

Archie Weekman, assistant dairy specialist of A&M College at College Station, will be present to do the classifying. All entries must be in by nine o'clock Friday morning. The contest in judging for 4-H and FFA boys will begin at ten o'clock. Adults will also participate in the judging. The work of classifying for the boys will begin at one o'clock in the afternoon.

After the classification of the cattle has been completed, contest winners will be announced and prizes awarded.

Classes of cattle are as follows:

- BULLS:
  - 1. 6 months and under a year.
  - 2. 1 year and under two years.
  - 3. 2 years and over.
  - 4. Breed winners.

FEMALES

- 1. 6 months and under a year.
- 2. 1 year and under 2 years. None in milk.
- 3. 2 years and under 3 years, also yearlings in milk.
- 4. 3 years and over.
- 5. Breed winners.
- 6. Get a sire: Three daughters of sire, any age. Sire need not be shown.

Scoring is to be done on the classification basis. Each animal will be competing with the ideal dairy type rather than other animals at the show. Animals will be grouped into the classes listed below.

Class AA, Purple ribbon—Animals scoring 90 points or above.

Class A, Blue ribbon—Animals scoring 85 to 90 points.

Class B, Red ribbon—Animals scoring 80 to 85 points.

Class C, White ribbon—Animals scoring 75 to 80 points.

Class D, Yellow ribbon—Animals scoring under 70.

Highest scoring female of each breed—Purple Rosette.

Highest scoring male of each breed—Purple Rosette.

It is understood that some of the animals that will be entered in this show will also be entered at the Panhandle-Plains Dairy Show that opens at Plainview the following day, Saturday, April 9th.

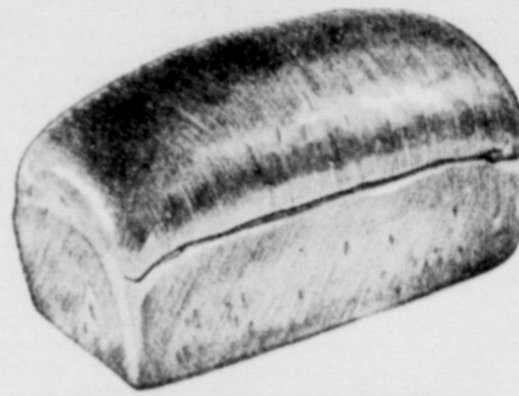

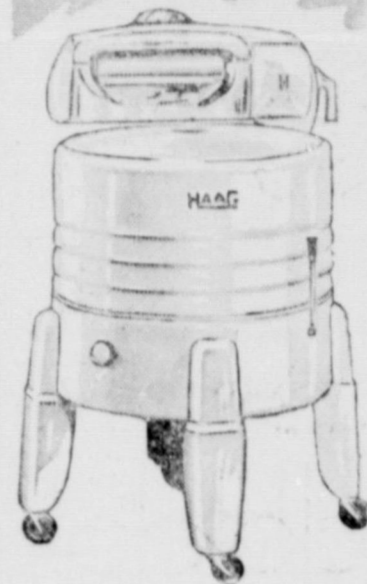

"Birds of a Feather will flock together," which is logically true, but not always nor necessarily true. There are many exceptions. There is another adage which says, "A Man's chickens will always come home to roost. Neither is that rule infallible, and that are so many exceptions to that rule, that it almost appears the rule itself becomes the exception. In the natural course of events there are more young people than older ones, and on proportionate basis, there would thus be more young criminals than older people within the present criminal list. I am writing from my own experience.

I am quoting another maxim, "As the twig is bent, the tree is inclined," which I believe has more potency than either of the two quoted above. And so far as I have experienced, it occurs to me that environment has more growing person than heritage or individual response, and environment is something the young person quite often has nothing to say about and is not of his choosing.

And here is another angle to the situation, which I want to mention before my space is all used, and I quote again from the author of the article above mentioned. (Quote) "Sponsored by the rapidly growing number of councils of churches in American cities, youth work at the community level is slowly taking shape." (Another quote), "Yet the fact has to be faced, that there are too many stragglers Youth groups, just as there are too many churches." "The life of the separate organization is complicated by denominational programs, literatures and rallies. In short, by a clutter of organizational machinery all over the place."

I will use just one more quotation from the article by Mr. Fallaw, then, as my space is growing thin and short, I will add some more comments of my own. As the friend who left the magazine for me, evidently expected me to do. (Quote), "So far as American youth are concerned, the denominations with their separate churches can die. Let them. That way Christendom can have its resurrection and Christ's purpose for his church can be fulfilled."

Ever since I have been actively interested in religion, or churchism, which was about 63 years ago, this matter of sectarianism has had a rankling effect upon my religious ardor and enthusiasm. It just has not set well with me and has cut out a large part of the joy that one should receive from his religious experience. It occurs to me that the author of the article I have referred to, believes that, what seems to be known as "The Youth Movement" has a tendency to destroy sectarianism in the Christian Religion, and if that is true, I am for it very decidedly.

I am not one of those who see men prone to lay the weight of the seeming "crime wave" of our time or the blame for it upon the young people of our land. I see it as a vagary of the human mind and is caused by a lack of something better to take its place. I do not know a large number of the young people of our city and locality, or other localities, but those that I do come frequently in contact with, treat me with the greatest courtesy and kindness. I have noted also, that their actions are the same toward adults of all ages and to those of their own age. So, they are at least, not ALL bad. And as to those whom I personally know, in my honest opinion, if you want them any better you will have to go to
