Will Visit World's Fair

For the first time since the organization of Terrell county, in 1903, candidates for the various county offices will this year enter the Democratic primary election, which will be held Saturday, July 28th.

This change in the practice of former years, was the result of a petition presented to Clyde Griffith, the County Democratic chairman, the first of the week, and signed by all candidates for offices within the county, with the exception of one, signifying their willingness to submit their candidacy to the action of the voters in the primary election.

Though the date of filing applications for places on the primary ballots, the Times was informed that several candidates have already made such application, and the others will file before expiration of the time limit, which is midnight of July 16th for county candidates. Monday, June 4 was the deadline for filing applications by State and District offices.

While Terrell county is one of the very few counties in Texas in which county candidates did not enter the primaries, it has always held a Democratic primary for state and district offices, with a fairly large vote being polled each time.

With county candidates entering the primary, there is no doubt that practically every qualified voter in the Terrell county will turn out and vote in the coming primary election on Saturday, July 28th.

Mexican Seriously Wounded in Cutting Affray Here Early Tuesday Morning

Refugio Perez is recovering from serious wounds inflicted by a razor wielded by Melecio Saldivar, and the latter is free in bond, following an altercation which occurred in the early morning hours Tuesday, at the home of Saldivar.

Perez emerged from the melee with an ugly wound about eight inches long when Saldivar attempted to cut the young man's throat with the razor, it was stated.

Following the cutting Dr. Sharp, who was called to the scene, rushed Perez to his office where it required several hours to sew up the wound, and stop the flow of blood. The slash started at the shoulder, ranged downward to just below the right breast, puncturing the lung. Perez, though in serious condition, and very weak from loss of blood, will recover, barring complications.

Claims Victims Had Threatened Life; Is In El Paso Jail

Antonio Carrasco, a former resident of this city, was placed under arrest at Van Horn late last Saturday night after he rode into that city and reported to the officers that the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Riley R. Smith was on fire and that the bodies of the couple were in the burning structure.

Carrasco formerly worked on the Guy Nation ranch in this county and after Mr. Nation had disposed of his ranching interest here he secured the job for Carrasco on the Smith ranch. Mr. and Mrs. Smith being an uncle and aunt of Mr. Nation's. Carrasco had been employed on the ranch for several years.

Carrasco claims that he killed Smith in the corral after Smith had reprimanded him for some work that he had done and that Mrs. Smith, who rushed to the aid of her husband, was killed after she had attacked him with a knife. He said the house was accidentally set on fire after he had started a fire in the cook stove to prepare his supper, claiming that he poured gasoline on the flame instead of kerosene in starting the fire. The bodies were burned to a crisp.

The accused mexican was taken into El Paso for safe keeping early Sunday morning after news of the horrible crime had reached citizens of Van Horn.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith were wealthy citizens of Van Horn, he having a ranch 17 miles of that city. They also had a residence in Marfa and Mr. Smith was connected with a bank in that city.

If Carrasco is held over to the grand jury, he probably will be tried at Van Horn in October.

A warning comes from the state
department of health at Austin that
malaria is on the increase. With it
is an admonition to clean up about
the premises, especially during any
period of frequent rainfall, to re-
duce breeding of mosquitoes. Re-
move all trash from backyards, in-
cluding old cans, pails, bottle, and
automobile tires or bodies. Clean
up generally.

Put new washers in leaky hy-
drants. Screen rain-water barrels,
or oil them regularly. Get some
top-minnows and place them in the
lily ponds or cisters. Look over the
roof gutters and drain spouts and
remove any trash and straighten out
sagged sections. Fill or drain any
spots in the yard where water stands
after a rain. The pamphlet con-
cludes: "Before you make complaint
to the health department about mos-
quitoes be sure your own premises
have been thoroughly inspected and
found free from mosquito breeding
places.

Teeth Put in Law Curbing Swindlers of Home Owners

Additional drastic power to curb swindlers to seek to muleet home owners applying for mortgage relief from the government is provided in the amended Home Owners' Loan Act, it was stressed by the Board of Directors of the Home Owners' Loan Corporation today in a statement commenting on a one-year prison sentence recently imposed by a Buffalo, N. Y., judge. The convicted man was found guilty of collecting \$110 in three "fees" from a home owner, under the pretence of aiding him to obtain a loan.

Since the first offices were opened the Corporation and applicants for loans have been embarrassed in many localities by persons collecting fees from home owners for so-called "influence" in the expediting or granting of a loan, or for "legal" or other advice.

The new law makes it a felony even to solicit or "attempt to collect" unauthorized fees or commissions from applicants, regardless of whether or not money is actually received. Convicted violators are subject to imprisonment up to five years or a fine of \$10,000 or both. Many racketeers are serving sentences in jail for the offense and others have been indicted. Warning have been issued by the Corporation in every state urging applicants to avoid such solicitation.
