Election Order Withdrawn On Livestock Tax

Was Ordered at Regular Session of Commissioners' Court

The election which was ordered at the last regular session of the Commissioners' Court for the purpose of voting on a proposed tax of not more than one cent on sheep and goats and not more than five cents on cattle, was withdrawn Monday after a petition had been presented to Judge G. J. Henshaw, asking that the election order be remanded.

Tax monies from this source were to go into a fund to be paid into the county treasurer and handled by the commissioners in providing protection for the livestock industry in Terrell County. Under the present system the Terrell County Protective Association, which was organized only a short time ago, has charge of maintaining an inspector and other details. Monies are raised by subscription from members of the association.

Auto Wreck Friday Night Injures Several

California Car Almost Goes Over Big Hill on Stockton Highway

A collision of the automobile of T. D. Lester of Bridgeport with a pickup driven by Ollie (Kid) Stout Friday night at about 10:30 resulted in severe cuts and bruises received by parties of both vehicles. The pickup driven by Mr. Stout belonged to Pink Robertson and he and Elton Loden were enroute to the Robertson ranch at the time.

Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Lester and family, and Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Lester and nephew, Jack Lester, were in the other car. The collision occurred at a turn in the road some 16 miles out on the Sheffield road damaging both cars badly. T. D. Lester, who was driving, was rendered unconscious for several hours and received cuts about the face and also severe bruises. Mrs. Lester received a blow on the forehead and one arm was badly bruised. Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Lester both received gashes about the face with Dr. Lester receiving a leg injury. Mrs. Lester had cuts under her chin and on her throat. Her throat was also bruised inside. Jack Lester received lacerations above the right eye which necessitated a stitch. Miss Faye Lester, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Lester, received a cut above the left eye. Another daughter, Imogene, received slight bruises. They were brought into Sanderson by Mr. and Mrs. Collins Coates.

Mr. Stout received a cut across the forehead necessitating five stitches and received two broken ribs. He was thrown clear of the cars by the impact. Mr. Loden was not injured.

Another near accident occurred Saturday afternoon when E. Gross of Los Angeles, California, almost went over the guard on Big Hill on the Fort Stockton highway. He started down the hill and started skidding on the loose gravel. He hit the guard rail which caught the front of the car, turning it completely around and facing it back up the hill. The car was hanging over the edge of the cliff, about 25 feet deep, when it came to a stop without overturning.

The car was brought back to town and within a few hours he was on his way again.

Another Sanderson Rodeo is here. On the occasion of this fourth annual show, the need becomes apparent for a rodeo association to put on our annual rodeo.

Everyone has heard of the Crockett County fair association which provides Ozona with a "bang-up" rodeo each year; and of the Edwards County fair association which puts on the Rock-springs show.

These associations are made up of the leading citizens of the counties and towns in which these rodeos are held. They put on their rodeos for the benefit of the community at large, and they do a good job of it. The members of the association share in the profits.

Now, why couldn't there be a Sanderson Rodeo Association. The men who have managed Sanderson's shows in the past are capable and experienced in the handling of a rodeo, and, if they got together with the other leading ranchmen and business men of the county, we could really have a show.

Sanderson's rodeos have always been well-managed and well directed, and have brought much favorable publicity to the town. It stands to reason that if all the capable rodeo managers would get together to hold a rodeo, they could even improve on the show. The association's profits could be used to build a new grandstand and improve the rodeo grounds, and everyone in town would profit from the rodeo.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all offices of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI,

Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____ do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____

of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against.

so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
Sec. 4. The amount of any funds in the State Treasury, or any other source, otherwise appropriated for the expense of such election, shall be used for that purpose. This is a true and correct copy of the original on file in the Secretary of State's office.
