FAMILY OF FOUR ENROUTE HERE ASPHYXIATED

Mr. and Mrs. I. O. Samanie and two children were asphyxiated in a tourist cabin in a camp near San Antonio when they left a gas stove burning in the cabin and closed all windows and doors. They were enroute to Sanderson to spend the holidays with Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Lester, Mrs. Samanie and Mrs. Lester being sisters.

They were registered at the camp at about 8:30 p. m. Sunday, according to the owner, and were discovered Monday night after officers had been notified when no response could be gotten from the cabin. Justice of the peace estimated the family had been dead since 7:30 Monday morning.

The Lesters were notified here and left immediately for San Antonio. Mrs. Dema Walker continuing to Lufkin where funeral services were held.

Mr. Samanie was a paint contractor of Lufkin.

Allan Bosworth Writes New Story

In the December 28th issue of The Saturday Evening Post now appears the first installment of Allan Bosworth's new serial story, "Wherever the Grass Grows." The author is a younger brother of D. O. Bosworth and a son of Mrs. Betty Bosworth, both of Sanderson.

The Post, in its "Keeping Posted" column, gives an introductory sketch of Mr. Bosworth, telling something of his life and literary struggles; but beyond that it may be said that he spent a good part of his childhood in West Texas among the people of whom he writes so well and that he knows the very roots of the grass he takes for his theme.

"Wherever the Grass Grows" is a historical novel of the brush country of South Central Texas; time, about 1875. There is lively action, suspense, and bright romance promised in the first installment; and those oldtimers and sons and daughters of oldtimers who have read and enjoyed Frank Dobie's "Vaqueros of the Brush Country" should also get a fine kick out of this highly realistic Texas novel, written by a Texan, Allan Bosworth.

Sanderson High School Member of Southern Association

The Christmas dance sponsored by the Sanderson Fire Department proved highly successful, both as an evening of enjoyment and financially.

Gross receipts taken in at the dance, from admissions, cold drinks, sandwiches, coffee, and from the cake sold, totaled \$242.49. Paid out, including the orchestra, advertising, cake, wax, etc., amounted to \$185.51, leaving a net total of \$56.98, from which the cost of the cold drinks will have to be taken.

Drivers Urged to Use Caution During Holidays

Many deaths could be prevented by the observation of a few simple, common sense rules, said Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety.

"In starting on a trip, leave soon enough that you can drive at a safe speed and arrive on time," he suggested.

Survey Made of Sanderson High School Graduates

A survey has recently been made as a part of the guidance program offered in the Sanderson High School of the last 86 graduates of the school. This study covers a five year period and the classes considered were those graduating in 1936 and through 1940. Of the 86 graduates of the Sanderson High School considered the boys led in number by 48 to 38. The girl graduates, however, have found the way to the marriage altar more frequently than have the male graduates. Twelve girls have married, while only 8 boys have set up a home of their own.

The study of the graduates of the local high school for the past 5 years further shows that these ex-students have scattered badly since they received their diplomas. They are located from the Atlantic to the Pacific in numerous states. More than fifty per cent of the graduates have attended college, the exact number being 53 out of the 86. Most of those attending college have stayed with it for at least one or two years and 41 of the 53 who entered college are still in college or else have completed their college work. Of the 19 members of the class of 1936, seven completed their college work last spring.

Other facts concerning those who have left Sanderson High School in recent years are as follows: Only 11 of the 86 actually live on ranches at the present time, while exactly one-half of the graduates, or 43, still call Sanderson and Terrell County their home and live here at least a part of the year; only one of the ex-students has died since graduation; several are in the United States Navy with one attending the Naval Academy at Annapolis; one now in his third year at West Point; three are engaged in making airplanes, or learning this industry. Practically all graduates are employed if they are not in school; twelve working in offices, seven in stores, and three others are now teachers. Some are preparing to be doctors, some secretaries, some teachers, some ranchmen, and housewives

and—no doubt, some to be soldiers.

Conclusions made from a study of the ex-students for the past five years are used in determining what courses are offered in high school. Homemaking courses and commercial courses are evidently in demand and of benefit to students. Since such a large percent of the ex-students go to college, a course must be offered to prepare these for college while at the same time practical courses are offered. While some ex-students of the Sanderson High School fail in college and thus drop out of school, the study revealed the fact that college grades made by ex-students correspond almost exactly to the grades made by a student while in high school.

The class of 1936 contained 19 with 6 girls and 13 boys. Of the class 12 entered college with 9 of them still in college or have graduated.

In the class of 1937 there were 12 of 6 who were girls. Seven entered college and 4 have completed their college work or are still in attendance.

In 1938 there were 15 members, 6 of them girls. Twelve entered college and 9 have completed their college work or are still attending.

Class of 1939 was composed of 14 with 6 girls. Seven of the group entered college; six are still in attendance or have completed their work.

In 1940 26 graduated with 14 girls. Fifteen entered college and 13 are still in attendance.
