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By-Laws Constitution

meeting, which was held at week at the Court by the Sanderson Ceme- terial Association, the Constitu- tion By-Laws, which had been drafted, were ac- cepted. The Constitution as adopted provides that administrative affairs of the association be under the direction of an executive committee of three in addition to the officers of the association. The members shall be appointed by the President of the association on the first Monday of each term and term shall be one year.

The officers of the Association are: president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and other officers as may be determined. All officers shall be elected annually at their office until their successors are duly installed. The membership in the association shall consist of any and all persons who have or may contribute the sum of five dollars to the association within the fiscal year. The contribution of five dollars or more shall entitle the contributor to all the privileges of membership for which the contribution was made.

All owners of lots in the cemetery are considered as having membership in the association.

The laws provides the fiscal year to run from May first to the following first Monday in April.

The meeting of the prices of lots were raised to \$25 per acre. The water rate was set at one dollar per acre per month per lot, payable in advance. The rate for water for the first six months of each year shall be one dollar per acre per month. The rate for the second six months shall be one dollar per acre per month. The rate for the third six months shall be one dollar per acre per month. The rate for the fourth six months shall be one dollar per acre per month.

Spring Flower Show To Be Presented By Garden Club Friday

The Sanderson Garden Club will hold their first annual flower show on next Friday, May 3 at the Masonic Hall. The show will be held from 3 to 5:30 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m.

Entry blanks are being mailed to flower growers in Sanderson, asking that they enter any flowers or pot plants that they may have in the show. Anyone failing to get an entry blank may obtain one from the Kerr Mercantile Company.

There will be classes of arrangements of potted plants, specimen plants and flowers.

The Garden Club will also have for sale tomato plants, pepper plants, pot plants of various kinds such as geraniums, petunias and begonias.

The judges will be members of the Del Rio Garden Club and from the Alpine Garden Club.

All growers of flowers of any kinds or those that have pot plants are cordially invited to enter them in the show. All entries in the show will be judged on the plants alone and not the containers that they are in.

The public is cordially invited to attend the show, admission to which will be free.

Alpine Rodeo To Be Held On March 8-9-10

ALPINE, Texas, April 22—The dates of May 8-9-10 have been set for the first Big Rodeo to be sponsored by the Sul Ross Booster Club, and to be held under the lights on Jackson Field at Sul Ross State College, Alpine. Cash prizes for the three days will total almost \$5,000.

According to Mr. Raymond Quigg and Mr. Fayette Yates, producers of the rodeo, top ropers and riders of the South-west will perform, and 25 wild-eyed broncs and 25 Brahman bulls, fresh from the wide open spaces are now on feed, and there will be no shortage of rodeo stock. Buffalo from the Yates ranch are expected to be on hand.

Advertising trips have started with Fort Davis, Balmorhea, Pecos Barstow, Monahans, Wink, and Kermit. Other trips to Fort Stockton, McCamey, Crane, Rankin, Sanderson, Marathon, Marfa, and Van Horn are planned.

A parade will be staged on down town Alpine streets the afternoon preceding the rodeo opening. The Chamber of Commerce is cooperating in this event. Daily admission will be \$1.80 for adults, 90c for students and 60c for children under 12, all prices including the federal tax.

Any profit from the rodeo will go to the Booster Club for use in promoting the athletic program at Sul Ross.

Spring Race Meet Scheduled for Next Week in Del Rio

DEL RIO, April 24—A \$2,500 entry fee quarter of a-mile race with top quarter horses of the nation competing will be held April 29, opening day of the Del Rio Livestock Association's spring race meet at the Del Rio Park.

Probable entries in the race will be Ernest Lane's Miss Princess; Barbara B from Roy Gill's stable of top horses; Shue-Fly, the mare belonging to the Hepler Brothers; Hard Twist, fine stallion belonging to Lewis Blackwell; Pumpkin, belonging to L. Wharton; Don Logan's mare, Blondie; Leaman Adamson's Bay Annie; Squaw H., the J. O. Hankins mare, and probably two entries from South Texas and Louisiana.

Some of the entries have already posted their fees.

The first day will also see another race of interest when "My Question," palomino mare belonging to Tom Gray of Tulsa, is matched to run three-eighths of a mile for \$2,500 on each side, against "Wonder Lad" belonging to Jim Derrick of Carlsbad, New Mexico.

Feature of the second day will be a \$1,000 entry fee quarter mile race and a 250 yard race for \$1,000 entry fee.

A three-eighths mile race with a \$1,000 entry fee is slated for the third day for older horses and a \$500 entry fee 220-yard race for two-year-olds.

May 2 will see the top quarter horses out to set new records in the 330-yard open race with an entry fee of \$2,000. Entries expected in that race are Roy Gill's Tonta Gal; W. L. Miers' Texas Star; C. L. Stigall's "Lady Lane;" "Skippy" belonging to E. H. Lane Arthur Uhr's "Miss Panama;" Helen Michaelis' "Pumpkin;" Fowlkes Brothers' "Miss Ona;" Ray Lewis' "Dr. Pepper."

Two-year-olds will run a featured quarter-mile race with a \$500 entry fee on May 3.

Each day during the six-day meet, the Del Rio Livestock Association will furnish around \$8,000 for purposes with all entry fees added. Eight purse races will be run each day in addition to the feature and the match races.

On the last day of the meet, \$2,800 in purse with all entry fees added will be put up. In the event there is doubt on which horse are fastest, they will run again, making eight feature races in one day. Winners in the races run the preceding five days will have preference in filling the card, officials said.

Receives Injuries As Result of Car Collision Saturday

As a result of a collision of two automobiles last Saturday evening, Mrs. John Williams of Dryden is confined in the Del Rio Hospital suffering from body bruises and injuries to her right knee.

The accident occurred late Saturday evening, about dusk, at Emerson on Highway 90 about eight miles west of town, when the car driven by John Williams was in collision with a car driven by Billy Gene Hill of Longfellow.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams were enroute to Marathon and Billy Gene Hill was enroute to town from Longfellow. Billy Gene had turned out to pass a car when he noticed the Williams car coming and swerved his car to go into the bar pit at the same time, Mr. Williams, seeing the Hill car coming toward him and fearing a head-on-collision, also went to the bar pit trying to avoid a head-on-collision. The front of the Williams car was badly damaged while the Hill car was struck along the front of the passenger side and turned over on one side. In the impact, Mrs. Williams, who was riding in the rear seat, was thrown across the front seat receiving body bruises and a broken knee. Mr. Williams was cut about the chin and nose, also receiving minor bruises. The Hill boy received a bruised right leg.

On Wednesday morning Mrs. Williams underwent an operation on the injured knee and reports were that she was doing nicely and it is thought that she will suffer no permanent injury as a result of the accident.

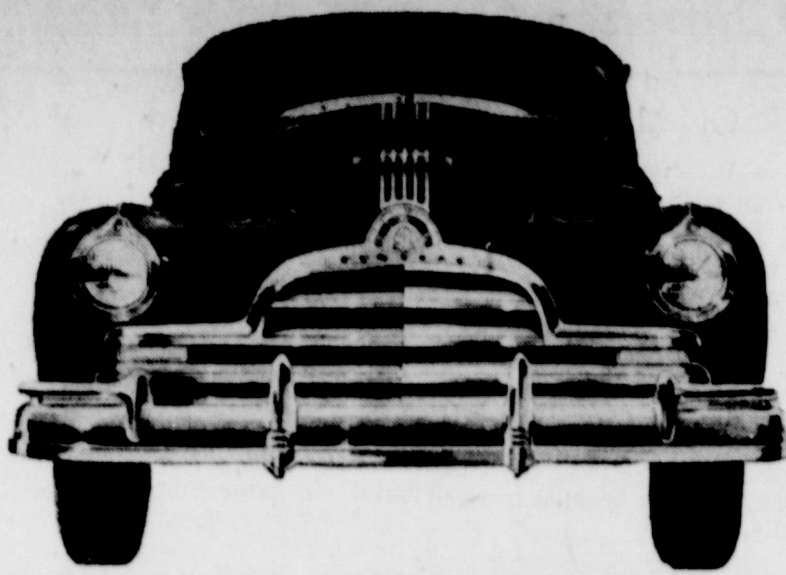
