Mr. Cardwell was never married and had no survivors, according to the death certificate.

Light Vote in County Saturday Regan Elected

A light vote was registered in the special election in Terrell County last Saturday when the voters were called upon to decide the fate of the School Building Amendment for State supported colleges and the selection for a successor to Rep. R. Ewing Thomason, who became Federal District Judge of this district on August 1.

Ken, of El Paso, garnered the largest vote in the Congressional race with Regan second and Gary third. Over the District, however, Ken Regan was elected over the field of seven candidates.

The amendment carried in Terrell County by a large majority. Precinct Four did not cast a single vote in the amendment election.

Terrell County Planning Council is the tentative name of the new civic club whose purpose is to coordinate the projects and plans for community development and betterment of all the clubs and organizations of the city. At the meeting last Saturday evening a temporary staff of officers was chosen to act until a constitution and by-laws can be drawn up and the council function accordingly. J. J. 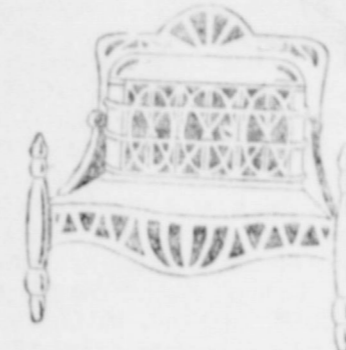
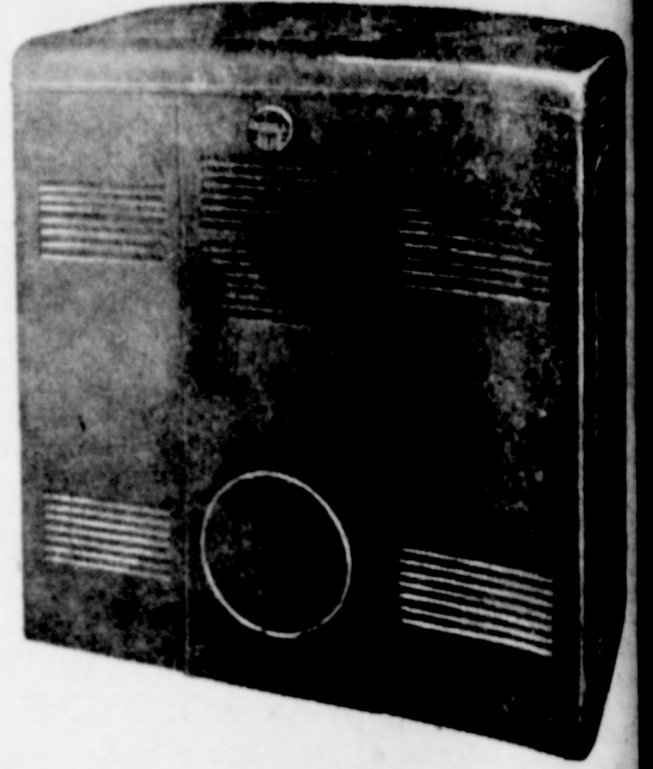
