## Tri-County Line Case Up to Judge

A decision affecting boundary lines of three counties is now in the hands of 52nd District Judge Truman Roberts.

Judge Roberts heard testimony in the tri-county case last Friday in Hamilton, then asked attorneys to submit final arguments supporting their case, in writing, within two weeks.

No decision is expected from the judge until he has had time to study the written final arguments.

The suit over disputed boundary lines was brought by Coleman County against Callahan and Taylor counties. Involved is a strip about 25 miles long and 400 to 850 feet wide, which is jointly claimed by Callahan and Coleman counties, and a

strip about 4½ miles long and 400 feet wide, claimed by Coleman and Taylor counties.

Attorneys say there is no direct precedent in the case.

Representing Callahan County was County Attorney James Paul Shanks, with Taylor County Attorney James Jeffrey representing his county. Hal Woodward of Coleman presented the Coleman County case.

Attending from Callahan besides Shanks were County Judge Byron Richardson, Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell, and L. F. Newton, Clyde school superintendent.

Estimates show taxes on all property in the disputed area would run less than \$150 per year.

## City Tightens Trash Rulings

Trash and garbage collection regulations have been ordered tightened by the Baird City Council. Beginning Aug. 15, refuse will not be collected from homes or businesses which do not conform to regulations.

Councilmen ruled trash placed in barrels will not be picked up after Aug. 15. Trash or garbage must be in covered containers of from 20 to 32 gallon capacity and must be placed where it is accessible to city crewmen.

Action was taken on the matter after councilmen heard a report that picking up trash from barrels is costing the city \$300 a month more than necessary. Use of an extra employe is necessary on the trash truck to pick up barrels -- but would not be necessary if refuse is in containers of no more than 32 gallons.

Winn Talley, principal of Baird Elementary School for the past four years, has been named junior high school principal at New Home, 18 miles south of Lubbock.

Mrs. Talley, who has taught in Baird Elementary School, will teach in the elementary school at New Home.

In addition to serving as elementary principal at Baird, Talley has also been junior high school coach.

## COUNTY, STATE OFFICERS HUNTING PAIR AFTER JAILBREAK IN BAIRD

Officers were combing Callahan County area Thursday morning for two Alabama men who escaped from the county jail at Baird shortly after 8 p. m. Wednesday.

The two men, Weldon Ray Waters, 23, and Thomas Wesley Murry, 45, were given long prison sentences last month by 42nd District Court juries in Callahan County. They were in the county jail awaiting ruling on their appeals in the sentences.

Both men, residents of Birmingham, Ala., were convicted of possession of narcotics. Waters received a 35-year prison term and Murry a 40-year

term from Callahan juries.

Officers theorized the pair had help in escaping from a trusty in the jail. A window weight may have been used as a bar to allow the two to make their escape.

Both men have records of previous jailbreaks, officers said. They had been placed in separate cells in Taylor County jail in Abilene, where they were held before their Baird trials, when officers learned of a planned breakout attempt.

Roadblocks were set up in all directions around Baird after the break. The search first

## Public Housing Rent \$2,580

Rental on units operated by the Baird Housing Authority totaled \$2,580.73 for the six-month period ending June 30, according to a report by Claude Holley, the authority's executive director.

Total receipts for the housing authority were \$2,881.77. For the same six months, operating expenses of the authority totaled \$1,787.88. Included in that figure is \$575.11 for administrative expenses, \$673.37 for utilities, and \$332.66 for maintenance and operation.

The authority also spent \$34.95 on capital improvements during the six months, for total expense of \$1,823.83.

After deductions for operating reserves and related items, the authority wound up the six-month period with residual receipts of \$108.78.

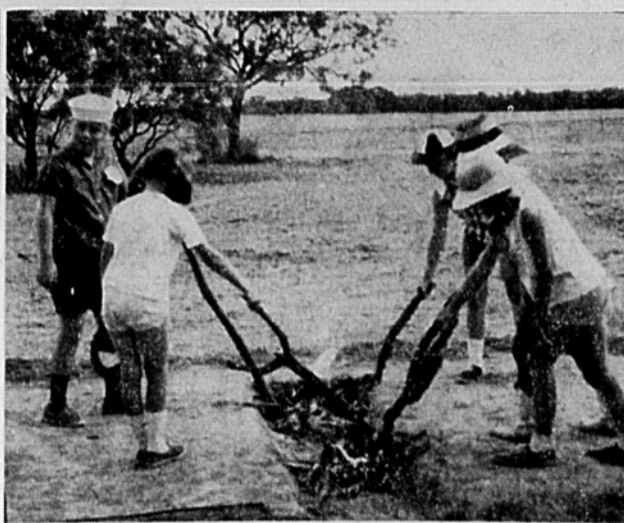

**AUSTIN** — Texas Research League warns that another fiscal "crisis" looms for state government in 1967, when new taxes of \$40,000,000 a year may be necessary.

Simple arithmetic points to a "sizeable" money problem, says the league. It notes that while Texas' new fiscal period will begin September 2 with a general revenue surplus of some \$97,800,000, it will end August 31, 1967, with little more than \$1,000,000 in the fund. Gov. John Connally's budget staff has estimated a balance of about \$4,200,000.

Comparing the shrinking surplus with some non-recurring revenue measures agreed on by the 59th Legislature, TRL researchers conclude lawmakers in 1967 may have to pass a \$107,200,000 new tax bill.

League admits the figure may be higher or lower. Its staff acknowledges that sales tax revenues are running well ahead of official estimates this year and if it keeps up, the new tax requirement may be reduced to \$30,000,000.

Actually, general sales tax collections this year are "much higher" than in 1964, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reports. Collections since the current fiscal year began last September 1 total \$164,200,000, compared with \$150,600,000 for the corresponding period a year ago.

TRL observes: "An \$80 million tax bill is no small matter, but neither is it a really serious crisis for a state with the untapped tax resources and growth potential of Texas. This is, of course, an optimistic -- as well as an unofficial -- estimate and the tax required might well be higher if revenues do not come up to these expectations, or if expenditures substantially exceed them."

League suggests that the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy "look at many available revenue-raising possibilities in the course of its studies."

**SPECIAL SESSION REJECTED** — Governor Connally has rejected requests for a special legislative session to deal with rising car insurance rates in Texas.

State Representatives Carl A. Parker and J. D. Weldon, both of Port Arthur, requested such a session to investigate the rate increases averaging 13.4 per cent which were authorized by the State Board of Insurance to take effect August 1.

Connally said he doubts any practical benefits would be gained from a special session at this time, although he shares concern over the increases. The governor made three principal points:

Texas' liability rates after the August increases will be lower than those of 34 states and the District of Columbia.

Two recent legislative inquiries already have been conducted on rate-making methods and have determined no fault with the Insurance Board's formulae which are available for public scrutiny.

The Legislature is willing to give "little support" to stronger laws to curb rising auto accidents which bear directly on insurance rates.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED** — David L. Greenberg was named by Governor Connally as judge of the new county court No. 1 of Galveston county. He is a law partner of Galveston Sen. A. R. Schwartz.

Connally appointed Sen. Walter Ritcher of Gonzales to the board of control of the Southern Regional Education Board and Rep. Don Cavness of Austin to SREB's Legislative Advisory Council.

Truett Latimer, former member of the State Legislature from Abilene, is now executive director of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee. He succeeds George Hill of Austin.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court has agreed to review the case involving the state's right to tax coin-operated vending machines on military reservations. Third Court of Civil Appeals, overturning Austin District Court, earlier held that the state had the power to collect tax on Fort Hood machines.

High court backed Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals in ruling that Moore County District Court must hear the suit chal-

lenging boundaries of county commissioner's precincts.

**DESEGREGATION PLANS APPROVED** — U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare reports that 625 of Texas 1,370 school districts have submitted statements of compliance with the 1964 civil rights act which received federal approval.

Another 67 Texas districts have submitted acceptable voluntary desegregation plans and 13 more have court-ordered plans.

Deadline for integration of schools receiving federal aid is Sept. 1, 1967.

**TEXAS ECONOMY PROBED** — University of Texas Bureau of Business Research turns up these interesting facts and figures in a new study of the Texas economy over the past decade: Personal income per capita rose from \$1,585 to \$2,175; real purchasing power increased some 18.8 per cent compared with 24.7 per cent for the nation; Texas per capita income dropped from just under 90 per cent of the national figure in 1954 to just over 85 per cent of 1964.

More than 65 per cent of all Texas personal income remains in the form of wages and salaries. Manufacturing supplies 13.18 per cent of personal income; petroleum and natural gas producers pay 3.20 per cent; wholesale and retail trade provide 13.01 per cent; and government wage and salary payments, 14.05 per cent.

Cigarette tax collections jumped \$1,800,000 above May level as smokers stocked up before the new three cents a pack tax increase went into effect July 1.

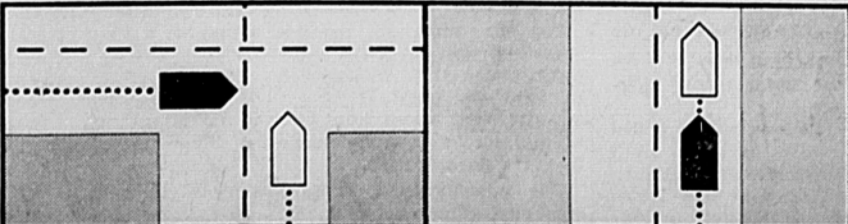

## Devil's Backbone Skyline Drive Little-Known Texas Attraction

Devil's Backbone Skyline and Canyon Dam country -- the play on names is allurement enough, and the weekend tripper and tourist who swings through this part of Texas southwest of Austin certainly will not be disappointed.

The tour route lies only a few miles south of "LBJ Country," where President Johnson has his ranch home on the Pedernales River between Johnson City and Fredericksburg.

Visitors will be rewarded with a scenic drive in the stimulating hill country air and with the outing and recreational opportunities offered by the numerous parks, no less than seven around Canyon Lake, itself.

Fun-bound traffic may approach from the west side of the area on National Highway 281 and, just south of Blanco, turn east on State Highway 32, a stretch of which is Devil's Backbone Skyline Drive. It is recommended that the trip continue past Fischer about ten miles to Purgatory Road, a right-turn route to the followed (by signs) into Canyon City and to Canyon Dam and the lake.

On the San Marcos side, to the east, motorists should follow State Route 12 westward about ten miles to its junction with State 32. They should follow Route 32 all the way to Fischer before turning south on State 484 to the Canyon Lake area.

Either way they go, visitors are due to get a thrill in motor-ing garnished with scenic beauty. Devil's Backbone is a ridge route that undulates, weaves, dips and turns, unreeling a sequence of Texas views of color-slide quality.

Residents properly boast of the high altitude-low humidity of the magnificent hill country. Canyon Lake, over 900 feet above sea level, is the highest lake in Texas. Water from the Guadalupe River already has filled the lake to a depth of more than 75 feet at the dam. The state is building new wide

paved roads to encircle the lake and the whole area is vibrant with the bustle and excitement of a new playground and resort frontier.

Meanwhile, guests may enjoy the inviting visitors area at North Park and Overlook Park at the dam.

One may even find time enough left to roll south to New Braunfels' Landa Park or even Natural Bridge Caverns.

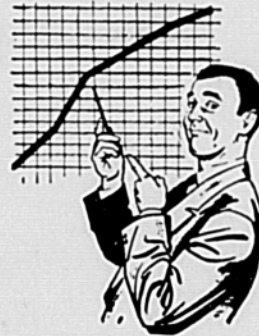
Representing the Baird chapter will be J. D. Faircloth and Gary Franke. Faircloth is president of the local chapter and will serve as the group's delegate to the convention.

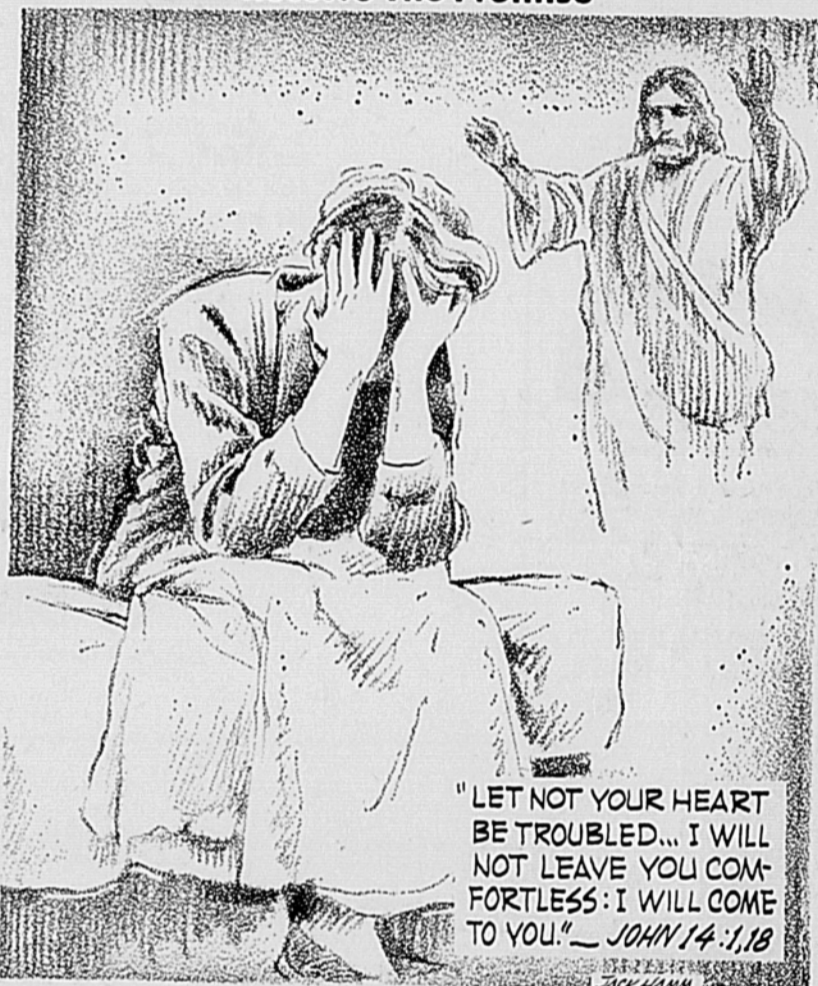

## Devil's Backbone Skyline Drive Little-Known Texas Attraction

Devil's Backbone Skyline and Canyon Dam country -- the play on names is allurement enough, and the weekend tripper and tourist who swings through this part of Texas southwest of Austin certainly will not be disappointed.

The tour route lies only a few miles south of "LBJ Country," where President Johnson has his ranch home on the Pedernales River between Johnson City and Fredericksburg.

Visitors will be rewarded with a scenic drive in the stimulating hill country air and with the outing and recreational opportunities offered by the numerous parks, no less than seven around Canyon Lake, itself.

Fun-bound traffic may approach from the west side of the area on National Highway 281 and, just south of Blanco, turn east on State Highway 32, a stretch of which is Devil's Backbone Skyline Drive. It is recommended that the trip continue past Fischer about ten miles to Purgatory Road, a right-turn route to the following (by signs) into Canyon City and to Canyon Dam and the lake.

On the San Marcos side, to the east, motorists should follow State Route 12 westward about ten miles to its junction with State 32. They should follow Route 32 all the way to Fischer before turning south on State 484 to the Canyon Lake area.

Either way they go, visitors are due to get a thrill in motor-ing garnished with scenic beauty. Devil's Backbone is a ridge route that undulates, weaves, dips and turns, unreeling a sequence of Texas views of color-slide quality.

Meanwhile, guests may enjoy the inviting visitors area at North Park and Overlook Park at the dam.

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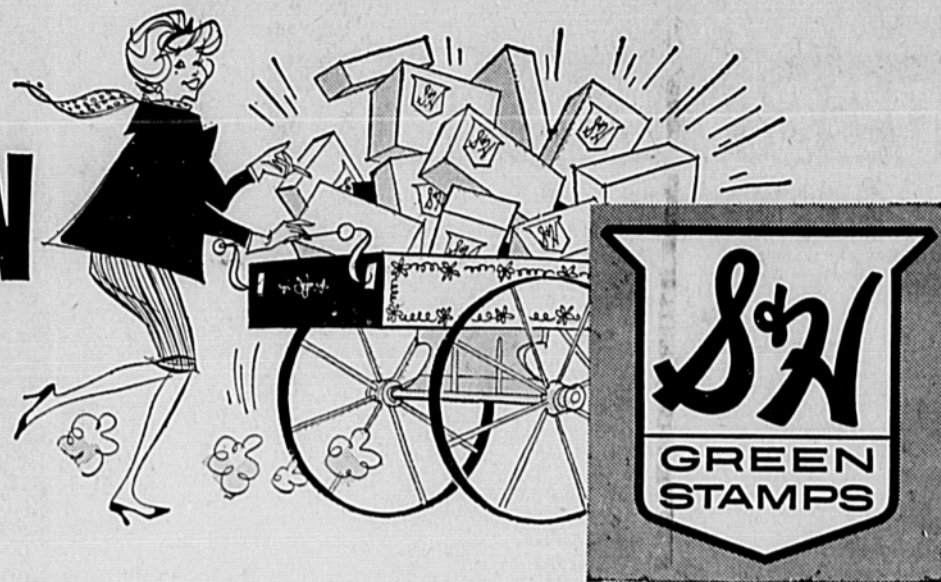
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
