# Suggestions Regarding Control of Polio

By DR. GEORGE W. COX, State Health Officer

Until recently it was generally believed that polio is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory trace. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Suitable garbage containers should be kept covered. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor toilets. All trash and rubbish should be burned immediately.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere stricty to the state law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. In the present emergency, those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high standards of sanitation.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Every effort should be made to maintain in the home the same sanitation standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is a sick child. Cases should be isolated for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene Cases should be reported early and should be placed under the care of a licensed physician. For cases that are entitled to state aid, communications should be made to the Crippled Children's Division of the State Department of Health. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches and theatres be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.

# Suggestions for the Individual and Home

Avoid sudden chilling, such as would result from a plunge into extremely cold water.

Wash hands thoroughly before eating.
If possible, avoid tonsil and adenoid operations during epidemics.

Observe scrupulous cleanliness of the per-

son; frequent bathing is advocated.
Immaculate clean clothes are important.

Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic mouth wash are recommended.

The nasal passage should be kept clean.

Dental defects should be corrected.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before using.

All foods should be protected from flies, filth and insects.

In the home, dishes should be washed in hot, soapy water and rinsed in very hot clear water.

Sinks, bath tubs and other plumbing fixtures should be scoured clean and rinsed with an antiseptic solution.

Bedding should be sunned and aired often. Ridding the home of rats, flies and roaches is absolutely necessary. DDT Spra

# Four Thousand Cripples Aided During 1948 By State

AUSTIN, April 7-Almost four thousand Texas children from more than 225 counties have received beneficial services and aid to happy, normal living under the Crippled Children's Division administered by the State Health Department, during the calendar year 1948. This information is shown by the annual report issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Offirer.

According to Dr Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy. osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints. cleft palate, harelip and club feet. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 5 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits 43,433 days of hospital rare, 2,897 dafs of convalescent home care and 4,986 doctor's visits.

"As long as sufficient state funds are available, any crippled Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to the help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said, "if his doctor believes






