Texas Polio Toll Reaches New High

Austin, December 5 — A 20 per cent increase over the record 1949 total of polio cases is indicated for Texas this year on the basis of official figures.

According to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Texas will have over 2,800 new cases of polio in 1950.

Texas reported 2,884 cases up to November 18. During November and December in 1949, the state had 217 new cases. The foundation using this as a basis of what to expect this year, says Texas will have more than 2,800 cases. The 1949 total was 2,355.

Meanwhile, Texas has received from the NFIP for patient care slightly more than \$322,700 more than the state sent in to the national headquarters during the last three years.

The state thus has had to depend on other states to handle the complete research financing burden and to even aid with care of Texas patients.

Texas, which has been among the hardest hit of the states has received almost one-tenth of the cash advances made from the National Foundation.

The state is counted on to make up the deficit when the only financing campaign for polio care and research is conducted — the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31.

The party will be at the Masonic Hall at 7:30 Wednesday, December 20 and all Rotarians and their families are cordially invited to attend.

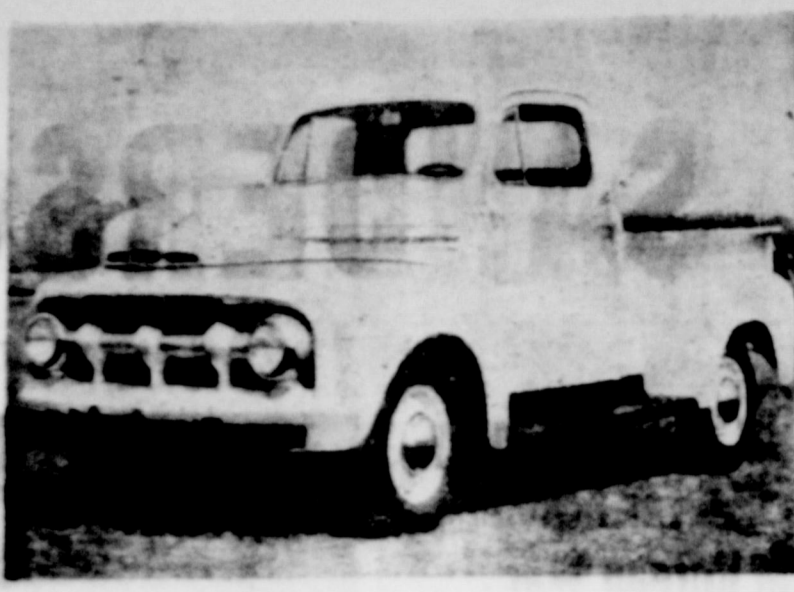
Juniors To Sell Christmas Trees Beginning Monday

The Texas cattle industry was in dire distress around the turn of the century as the result of splenic or tick fever, commonly known as Texas fever. Carried by ticks, it killed few native cattle in Texas, but when transplanted to Northern states was deadly. Texas cattle were quarantined, and could find no outlet on the northern markets. Dr. Mark Francis, a young veterinarian from Ohio-State University, came to the A. and M. College of Texas and started the search for a means of combating the scourge. He developed the technique of dipping to free the cattle of ticks, which in time led to lifting of the quarantine. A major problem still remained; purchased cattle could not be brought into Texas to improve our herds, because they lacked the immunity of Texas cattle and immediately fell victims to the fever. Dr. Francis developed the means of immunizing these cattle by inoculation and made possible the development of the modern Texas cattle industry, with its fine cattle in beef and dairy strains. Dr. Francis served as chief of veterinary research and Dean of Veterinary Medicine at the A. and M. College of Texas until his death in 1936.

Deer Meat Given To Burned-Out Families

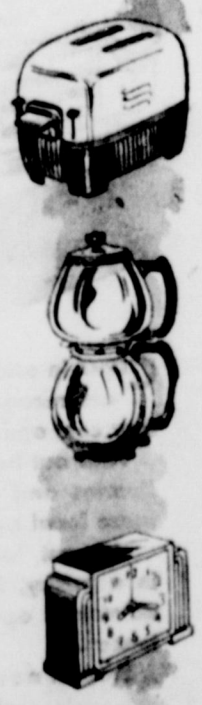
