#### Postoffice Annex To Pfc Francis Grigsby **Handle Parcel Post** Christmas Mail

Clyde Griffith, local postmaster announced this week that a postoffice annex would be opened Monday to handle all incoming and outgoing parcel post, insured and C. O. D. mail. The annex is to be in the bakery buildinig.

At the annex, patrons of the local postoffice may buy stamps, but there will be no mailing of first class mail, Christmas cards, or any mail other than packages in the annex. No package mail will be taken or distributed through the windows at the postoffice during the Christmas holidays.

Griffith stated that due to the fact that much success was had with the venture last year in expediting the handling of mail of all types, it was decided to again open an annex building for handling the rush of mail this year. He stated that Mrs. Charlie Rogers would be the only clerk hired to assist the present crew of clerks with the mail during the holidays and he urged the cooperation of all the patrons of the area to help the post office clerks give the public better service by adhering to the rules as set for the handling of the mail during the Christmas rush.

Further emphasis was made by Mr. Griffith on the necessity for a return address being put on each piece of mail, Also, all Christmas cards that have a three cent stamp are forwarded and every effort is made to deliver the mail to the addressee, if the address is incomplete or incorrect. Cards that are not sealed and bearing only a two returning lettermen with four cent stamp cannot be delivered to any address other than the one on the card and the card cannot be forwarded if the addressee has moved. Cards not delivered are returned to the sender if they carry a three cent stamp, Many thou. 





A major problem still remained; purebred cattle could not be brought into Texas to improve our herds, because they lacked the immunity of Texas cattle and immediately fell victims to the fever. Dr. Francis developed the means of immunizing these cattle by inoculation and made possible the development of the modern Texas cattle industry, with its fine cattle in beef and dairy strains. 
