S. L. STUMBERG NAMED DIRECTOR OF NATIONAL WOOL BUREAU IN AUGUST

At a meeting of the American Wool Council and the National Wool Growers' Association in August, S. L. Stumberg, Terrell and Brewster County ranchman, was named as a director of the Wool Bureau, a combination organization of the American Wool Council and the Wool Secretariat. The Wool Secretariat is composed of representatives from Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

He succeeds Eugene Ackerman, who was appointed president of the Wool Bureau by the National Wool Growers' Association and the American Wool Council.

Stumberg stated that the Wool Secretariat had appropriated \$500,000 to be spent in wool promotion in America. He added that he was very proud of the appointment as he had been very interested in the activities of the associated organizations for the past number of years, attending the meetings whenever possible and keeping up with the wool promotion plans over the nation that are carried on by the sponsoring organizations.

The next meeting of the Wool Bureau will be held in Los Angeles at the Ambassador Hotel October 25.

Highway 90 Topping Finished This Week

Topping and widening work on U. S. Highway 90 west of Sanderson was finished this week by Hugh McMillan, contractor, of El Paso. The work was in progress about two weeks and the renovated stretch of highway is approximately 13 miles in length, from the Pecos County line to Wilson Street in Sanderson, the extreme west end of town.

The repaired road is two feet wider than the old highway and most all of the rough ruts and ridges were taken out by the repair work. A new center stripe will be added in the very near future with the added side yellow stripes to denote non-passing, etc.

Terrell County children went back to school Tuesday to begin the 1951-1952 school term. High school pupils had been registered on Friday and Saturday and books were issued to the elementary pupils when they registered Tuesday morning. All classes were dismissed by noon Tuesday.

Hunters Urged To Aid In Mourning Dove Banding Program

Austin, Sept. 2 — Game management folks are counting on the sportsmen of Texas to help give their dove banding program a needed boost this fall.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission said hunters can help by sending in bands taken from the legs of bagged mourning doves.

These bands, which are placed on the young doves before they leave their nests, provide game departments with vital data about the habits of this popular game bird.

When a hunter shoots a banded dove and sends in the band along with the date and place the bird was taken, the biologists refer to the original record showing when and where the bird was banded. In this way they determine valuable information about travel and other habits of the birds which is needed in setting hunting seasons and for other routine purposes.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said he believed more hunters would cooperate if they understood the importance of the banding program. That comparatively few do realize this need was reflected in the records for the 1950 mourning dove season when only 125 bands were reported.

In that year, approximately 3,000 doves were banded and it was estimated that hundreds of these were harvested, along with birds banded in other seasons.

The bands used this year in marking an estimated 5,000 doves bear the mark "F&W Svc., Washington, D. C."

The Director of Wildlife Restoration said hunters finding the bands may send them either to Washington or to the Game Department in Austin. He reminded sportsmen that the place and time the birds were shot was important.

Physical Examination Should Be Made For First Grade Children

Austin, Aug. 29. "Children are not really ready to enter school until they have had a complete physical examination," Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, reminds parents.

"It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatments or corrections that may be necessary before school opens.

"Diphtheria immunization is also an important safeguard for all boys and girls about to enter school. Those who have never been immunized against this disease should receive toxoid shots now.

"Other immunizations that the individual physicians may recommend are also desirable as further health protection.

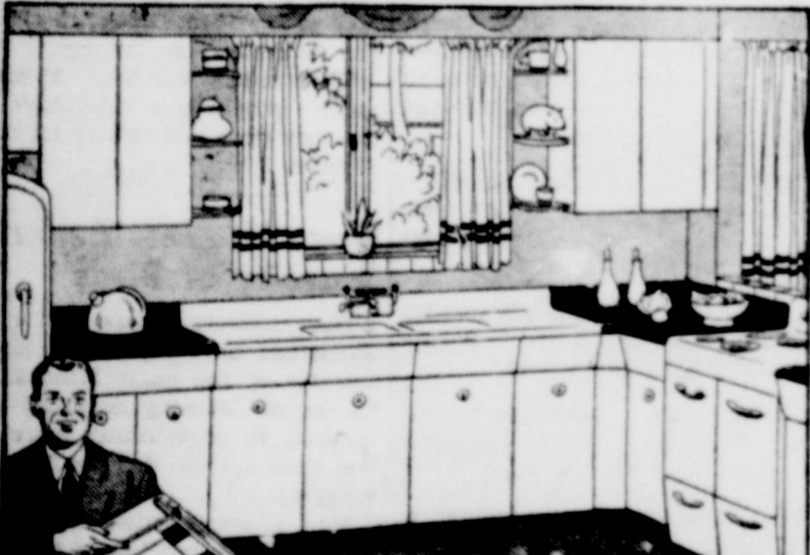
The Comanche Springs at Fort Stockton have gone dry. That body of water gave them one of the most beautiful swimming pools in Texas. Now the pool is no longer

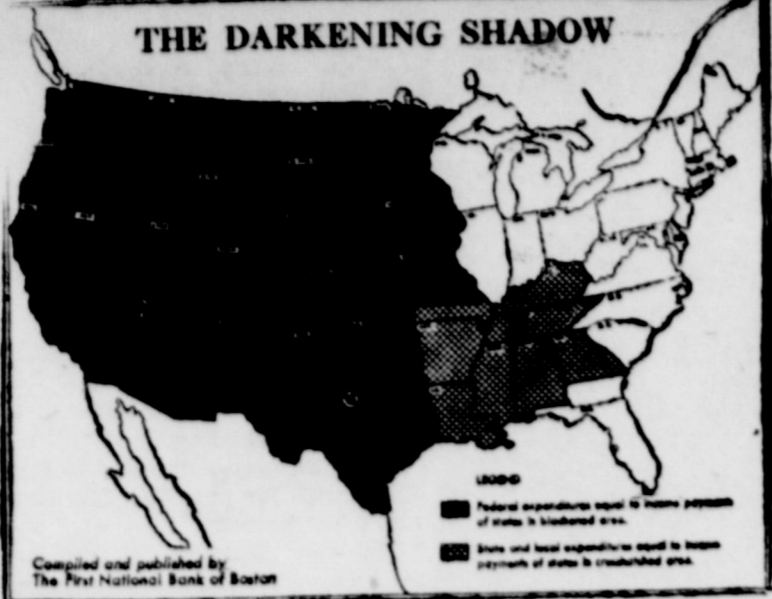

Estimated Federal expenditures for current fiscal year ending June 30, 1951, equal to estimated total income payments to all individuals in the blackened area, while total state and local expenditures equal aggregate income payments of states in crosshatched area.

This country must, of course, spend whatever is necessary to bolster our national defense, says The First National Bank in Boston in the current issue of an article appearing in a magazine. Continuing, it says, "But while we are spending staggering amounts for military purposes as a protection against aggression, the Administration is undermining our financial segment, the cornerstone of our nation's security, by condoning waste and extravagance that in the aggregate may approximate \$10-billion annually. Furthermore, there is no apparent official concern over our financial plight, as is evidenced by the fact that pressure groups within the Government itself are busily drawing up blueprints and propagandizing for all sorts of projects, many of which not only have no connection with national defense but rather have a Utopian tinge. It is hoped that the taxpayers of the country will

be aroused from their lethargy and while there is still time realize that they are the victims of squandering public servants who are 'selling them down the river'. The crucial financial situation calls for a united front by those who pay the bills. "The extent of the drain by government of the people's income is graphically presented on the accompanying map. In 1929, Federal expenditures were less than two-thirds of the total income payments to the inhabitants of California. In 1938, Federal expenditures were equal to the income payments of the eleven Pacific and Mountain states. For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1951, it is estimated that the Federal expenditures will take the equivalent of the aggregate income payments of the Pacific and Mountain states and, in addition, North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Minnesota, Iowa and nearly three-fourths of Missouri. This is shown by the blackened area on the accompanying map. If total state and local expenditures are added, the area would be extended to include the remaining portion of Missouri, plus Arkansas, Louisiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, and two-thirds of Georgia, as is shown by the cross-hatched section of the map. In other words the total government expenditures for the current fiscal year will take an amount equal to all of the incompayments to individuals of states with a land area that covers nearly four-fifths of the country and has an aggregate population of about 62-million persons and more than 22-million workers.
