Highway 90 Topping Finished This Week

Topping and widening work on U. S. Highway 90 west of Sanderson was finished this week by Hugh McMillan, contractor, of El Paso. The work was in progress about two weeks and the renovated stretch of highway is approximately 13 miles in length, from the Pecos County line to Wilson Street in Sanderson, the extreme west end of town.

The repaired road is two feet wider than the old highway and most all of the rough ruts and ridges were taken out by the repair work. A new center stripe will be added in the very near future with the added side yellow stripes to denote non-passing, etc.

Yes, maybe it was a thousand things to think about, anyway, they are thinking about anything but how we older folks are driving by the school grounds. This is the first place they know that they like them and they have confidence in our ability and know if they run out into the street, we are seen in time that we will — if we can — let them leave their ball or catch up in their friends, or make it across the street in a hurry so you won't be late for school.

In goodness sake, folks, let's do some thinking about that we wish we had. The warning signs near the school grounds are a very good purpose and may not there just to put an obstacle in the street to cause drivers to swerve to one side to miss them. Are they set up to test the power of the car and their ability to knock the signs down? They are placed as a reminder to drivers that there are children in the vicinity who are likely to run out into the street from between a parked car, or run out into the street in plain view.

You haste could save a few minutes but caution may save a life — it could be your own — worse than that, it could be an innocent child who was depending on you for his livelihood.

This year we are going to try to get some interest in the school set for driving classes. The highway patrol will assist every way possible in the preparation of those interested in learning how to drive. There are many, young and old alike, who without a full knowledge of our own ability and the ability to perform in such a manner as to promote safe driving.

If you think that this driving course might be a good thing, let me know about it and we believe it can be done.

We believe the driving course could serve a good purpose both in and out of the high school. It should be arranged so that no class need be affected and the cost to the school would be absolutely minimized. Sanderson has somehow managed to carry some of charm on her shoulder in the past. Should Be Made For
First Grade Children**

Austin, Aug. 29, "Children are not really ready to enter school until they have had a complete physical examination," Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, reminds parents. "All boys and girls enrolling in the kindergarten or first grade classes of Texas schools should be taken to their physicians, or to a public health clinic, for an immediate physical check up if they have not had such an examination in recent months."

It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatments or corrections that may be necessary before school opens. No youngster should be permitted to begin a school career with less than the best possible physical equipment.

"As most parents know, vaccination against smallpox is necessary. Those who receive this immunization in infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of immunity and those who have never received this protection should be vaccinated without delay.

"Diphtheria immunization is also an important safeguard for all boys and girls about to enter school. Those who have never been immunized against this disease should receive toxoid shots now. Children who were inoculated against diphtheria when they were babies should now have a 'booster dose' in order to maintain their immunity at a sufficiently high level.

"Other immunizations that the individual physicians may recommend are also desirable as further health protection.



Estimated Federal expenditures for current fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, equal to estimated total income payments to all individuals in the blackened area, while total state and local expenditures equal aggregate income payments of states in crosshatched area.

This country must, of course, spend whatever is necessary to bolster our national defense, says The First National Bank in Boston in the current issue of an article appearing in a magazine. Continuing, it says, "But while we are spending staggering amounts for military purposes as a protection against aggression, the Administration is undermining our financial segment, the cornerstone of our nation's security, by condoning waste and extravagance that in the aggregate may approximate \$10-billion annually. Furthermore, there is no apparent official concern over our financial plight, as is evidenced by the fact that pressure groups within the Government itself are busily drawing up blueprints and propagandizing for all sorts of projects, many of which not only have no connection with national defense but rather have a Utopian tinge. It is hoped that the taxpayers of the country will

be aroused from their lethargy and while there is still time realize that they are the victims of squander-maniacal public servants who are 'selling them down the river'. The crucial financial situation calls for a united front by those who pay the bills.

The extent of the drain by government of the people's income is graphically presented on the accompanying map. In 1929,

Federal expenditures were less than two-thirds of the total income payments to the inhabitants of California. In 1938, Federal expenditures were equal to the income payments of the eleven Pacific and Mountain states. For the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, it is estimated that the Federal expenditures will take the equivalent of the aggregate income payments of the Pacific and Mountain states and, in addition, North Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Minnesota, Iowa and nearly three-fourths of Missouri. This is shown by the blackened area on the accompanying map. If total state and local expenditures are added, the area would be extended to include the remaining portion of Missouri, plus Arkansas, Louisiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, and two-thirds of Georgia, as is shown by the cross-hatched section of the map. In other words the total government expenditures for the current fiscal year will take an amount equal to all of the income payments to individuals of states with a land area that covers nearly four-fifths of the country and has an aggregate population of about 62-million persons and more than 22-million workers.
