The local boys have been holding their own in competition in the several years and it is expected that the team this year will meet the standards set by teams of past years.

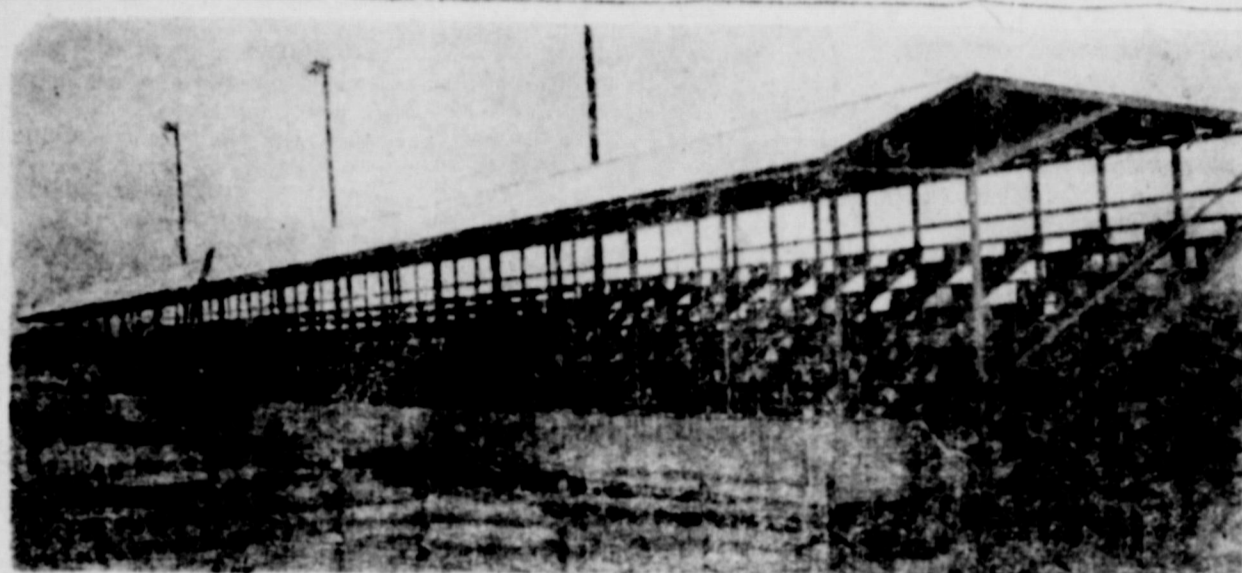
RECORD SALE OF 52 LICENSE TAGS REPORTED HERE

Evaluation of Local Schools Complete

On Monday and Tuesday of this week the Terrell County Schools were hosts to a group of educators who made a complete study and evaluation of the school system. The group was composed of classroom teachers and principals in both the elementary and high school fields, superintendents, and heads of departments of Sul Ross College. Dr. J. B. Speer of Sul Ross served as coordinator.

Schools who contributed personnel for the evaluation were Iraan, Ozona, Pecos, Fort Stockton, Del Rio, Marathon, Alpine, Marfa, and Sul Ross.

The committee and local faculty members were honored with a barbecue Monday night by the Sanderson Parent-Teacher Association in the American Legion Hall.
The two-day visitation and inspection by the committee ended with a detailed report of the committee members to the local faculty, school board, and patrons of the school district in the school auditorium Tuesday afternoon. Many commendations and immediate and long-range recommendations were made by committee members. Because of the great detail in which these commendations and recommendations were given, space will not permit a complete list at this time. However, the report, as a whole, was favorable and showed a comparatively efficient school system in Terrell County. By using the report of this committee as a basis, it will enable the school administration to take advantage of the recommendations made in the evaluation in further improving the school system. Some recommendations call for immediate improvements and some for long-range planning.

Mass Chest X-Ray Survey May 28-29

Announcement was made this week of the setting of the date for the fifth annual mass chest X-ray survey for Terrell County on May 28 and 29.

C. H. Hoover from the tuberculosis division of the State Department of Health, Austin, was in Sanderson Wednesday afternoon to confer with the directors of the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association in regard to the survey.

Mr. Hoover reported that one-third of the eligible residents of the county had a chest X-ray last year and of that number, twenty cases of chest abnormalities were found. It is hoped that an even larger number of persons will cooperate with the sponsoring organization this year and make use of the free facilities which require only a few minutes of time. All persons in the county fifteen years of age and over may have an X-ray made. The importance of having a chest X-ray made every year was stressed.

Mrs. H. A. Smith was named general chairman for the survey.

EAGLE BASEBALL SEASON OPENS ON APRIL 18

The Sanderson Eagles baseball team, under the tutorage of C. W. Snowden, opened their 1952 season on Monday night at 7:30 p. m. Snowden is ready for the opening of the baseball season after several weeks of practice and getting in shape for the season schedule.

Next Tuesday afternoon the Marathon nine will play in Sanderson at 2:30. All local diamond fans are urged to make their appearance at the diamond west of town to see the local nine in action.

The season includes three out of the five games to be played in Sanderson. The conference play begins April 18 with the Eagles going to Pecos. April 25 Fort Stockton will play here. May 2 Wink will play here and May 16 the Eagles go to Alpine.

Coach Snowden said that he expects his boys to make a good showing since most of them are returns from last year's team.

Galoar Cobos and Higinio Pena will be on the receiving end this year for the team with Juan Olivares and Joe Vasquez sharing serving honors. Other members of the team will include Jack Savage at first base with help from Roman Zepeda, who will also play in the outfield. Gene Hibbard at shortstop, Rosendo Silvas at third, David Martinez, second base and outfield, with assistance from Olivares at second in off-the-mound innings, and an outfield comprised of Eleno Marquez, Roberto Arredondo, Frank Vasquez, Pascual Rios and Martinez.

The boys have been working out for several weeks in long and hard hours of hitting and fielding practice. Vasquez and Olivares are both improved pitchers over last year's showing.

The organization sponsoring the rodeo announced that a new grandstand had been completed and afforded plenty of seats for the expected crowd. Television and newsreel photographers will be on hand as well as photographers from nationally-distributed magazines. The sponsors assure plenty of thrills and excitement from the events which are scheduled for the rodeo performances, including all events usually connected with rodeos for the cowboys.

WOLFE WINS MILE IN DISTRICT MEET

Wille Wolfe loped off to a winning finish practically uncontested, by finishing a good 50 yards ahead of the second-best runner. Wolfe's time was 5 minutes, 6 and 7 seconds, just 7 seconds off the district title. It was thought that this race could have set a new district record had there been a pace-setter for Wolfe.

Jack Talbot finished third in the 100-yard dash with a time of 10.7, and was third in the broad jump even with 17'6".

Henry Russell Seeks Court of Civil Appeals Post in July Primary

A long-time West Texas lawyer and former district judge, Henry Russell of Pecos, this week announced his candidacy for the office of associate justice for the Court of Civil Appeals. The court is part of the Texas Eighth Supreme Judicial District and sits at El Paso. The present judge has announced he will not seek re-election.

Judge Russell came to West Texas following his military service in World War I. He was county attorney of Ward County in 1919 and served as district attorney for Martin, Midland, Ector, Ward, Winkler and Reeves Counties in

JUDGE RUSSELL TO SPEAK TO ROTARY, LIONS CLUBS

Judge Henry Russell of Pecos will address members of the Sanderson Rotary and Lions Clubs and their guests at the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club next Wednesday noon at the Turner Hotel. The Pecos jurist will speak on "Americanism."

Under a governor's appointment, Russell served the unexpired term of William L. Kerr as judge of the 109th District of Texas. He was a member of a law firm in Midland until 1921 when he moved to Pecos where he presently resides and practices law.

In making his announcement for the office which he seeks, Russell emphasized the fact that he is not experienced in the field of office seeking. Except for his former terms as district attorney and as a member of the board of trustees of his school district, the other offices he has held were bestowed by appointment.

Engaged as he is in a judicial race, Judge Russell declined in his announcement to make a statement as to the matters he would hope to accomplish if he is elected. Instead, he has simply said that if elected, he would serve in the best manner possible, attempting to recognize established rules of law in determining law questions submitted to him for decision.

"If elected," Russell stated, "I will devote all my time and energies to the duties of the office in an effort to continue the court as one of the outstanding appellate courts in the state."

Freeman Says Oil Hopes Are High

"Our hopes for a producer is really high." Those are the words of R. E. Freeman, when he was in Sanderson the first of the week.

Freeman said that he is now drilling at 7,235 feet in gray lime and that prospects look better than at any depth he has encountered.

Work on the well east of Dryden has been slow since Mr. Freeman is only working one crew and is using cable tools. The drilling operations have been handicapped on several occasions but the determination of the operator has made it possible to continue even though there were many discouraging handicaps.

"The formation we have found now," says Mr. Freeman, "makes us glad that we kept plugging, for it looks mighty good."

Leasing in that area has about come to a standstill but there are reports of possible new locations in the near future.

It has been reported that a rig is drilling just 1-4 mile off the Dryden-Sheffield road approximately seven miles southwest of Sheffield. Activity at this site has not been widely publicized however, and details of this drilling work is not obtainable at the present time.

TS&GRA Observers To Go To Mexican Labor Conference in Miami

Steve Stumberg, Ernest Williams and Penrose Metcalfe were named at a meeting of representatives of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association meeting in Sonora Tuesday, to attend labor agreement talks between the U. S. and Mexican officials to begin in Miami on April 16.

The men will not act in an official capacity but hope to be able to represent their organization and the ranchmen of the area by meeting with the U. S. representatives at informal conclaves. The purpose of the meeting is to work out, if possible, new agreements for entry of Mexican laborers into this country and many interested groups are expected to have representatives at this meeting.

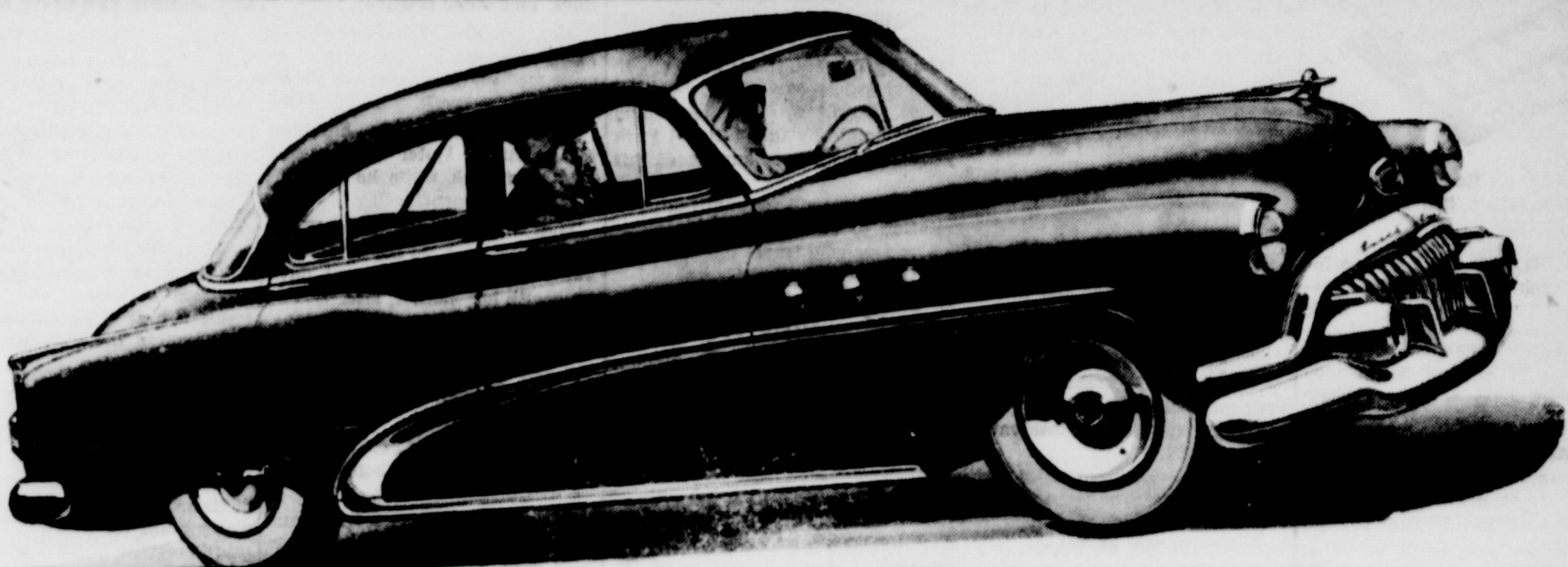

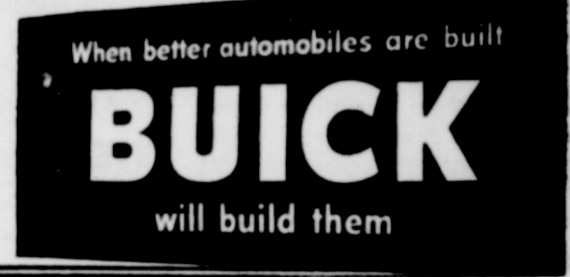

1951 Honor Roll For Texas Cities Given By State Health Dept.

Austin — Twelve Texas cities have won awards from the Texas State Department of Health, and 23 others have been recognized for maintaining municipal water supplies which conform to State Health Department standards.

The awards — loving cups and plaques — are presented each year by State Health Officer George W. Cox to cities making outstanding progress in water and sewage treatment plant operation. Named to the 1951 Honor Roll were:

Jefferson County Water Control and Improvement District at Groves for having the highest percentage of its population connected to the public water system.

Marshall for having the best water plant for control. The Marshall plant daily performs bacteriological and chemical analyses of its water.

Fredericksburg, for having the highest percentage of its population connected to the sanitary system.

No outdoor toilets exist in Fredericksburg.

Del Rio for having the highest ratio of sewer connections completed last year. Del Rio made 450 connections last year.

Burnet was designated as making the most judicious use of its sewage effluent for irrigation. San Angelo was selected for making the best use of its sewage sludge.

San Antonio was designated as maintaining the best sewage plant laboratory. Modern facilities are available at this plant, Dr. Cox said, and competent personnel are in charge.

Crocket County Water Control District in Ozona won a loving cup for keeping the most attractive

water plant, and Baird won a cup for making the most improvement to its water system.

Loving cups were also presented to Bandera for having the most attractive sewage plant; Mason for making the best quality sewage effluent; and to Longview for making the greatest improvement in its sewage plant.

Cities which won Departmental approval for their water systems are: Alice, Arlington, Arp, Bellaire, Conroe, Corrigan, Corsicana, Donna, Graham, Hico, LaGrange, Lamesa, Lampasas, Liberty, Lindale, Mont Belvieu, Rosenberg, Schertz, Schulenberg, Smithville, Taylor and Troup.
