## Cardman's Views on 'Treaty Laws'

(continued from last week)

There the free world, led by the United States, was stymied by the Stalin booby-trap—the veto. None other than Alger Hiss, our most influential representative at San Francisco and the closest adviser to the dying Roosevelt at the time, was chosen as Secretary-General of the UN conference on International Organization and, by a 1-1 vote, without a "veto" by the United States. His selection assured the passage of U. S. leftists, of all kinds, "from pink to vermilion" in the various "key spots" of the organization. Thus, the perpetrator and traitor, upon whom the American Secretary of State refused to "turn his back" was the leading genius of the UN and personally carried the charter to Washington. We need officials who will not hesitate to "turn their backs" upon all traitors and scoundrels and on Communist fellow-travelers, who may infest this government in any department.

The presence of several U. S. employees at the UN, of doubtful loyalty, is a sad indictment of the competence of the State Department toward disloyalty. Let me call your attention to the existing judicial decisions, which point the way to a new and unanticipated, developing law-making, whereby re-arranging has had to "treaty law" precede and nullify statutory enactments and the Bill of Rights. California, for many years, has statutes forbidding mixed marriages and alien ownership of land. Whether these were based on sound public policy, we are not nearly so concerned, although I am so. They violated no provisions of the constitutions of California or of the U. S., but the Supreme Court of that state held since the UN Charter is a "treaty" and provides for "racial" mixed marriages are valid, despite the statutory prohibition.

The same court held that the prohibiting ownership of land by aliens must be stricken, because it transgresses the "racial" clause of the UN Charter. The same result was reached by the U. S. Supreme Court. Mr. Goddard Acheson was an attorney for the alien who successfully challenged the California law on the ground that it violated the anti-discrimination provisions of the UN Charter which had been adopted as a treaty and had, therefore, superseded state law. By the way, Donatas, brother of the infamous "Red" was then, and is now, a member of the Acheson's law firm probably providing its color. The constitutional provisions

The defensive work of the Eagles was more effective than the points on Fort Stockton's side of the score would indicate.

must, likewise, yield when challenged.

Bringing the matter closer to home may serve to emphasize the seriousness of "treaty law" Art. 492 of the Penal Code of Texas makes it a violation thereof for whites and negroes to intermarry. The question of the effect of the UN Charter, and of covenants thereunder, on this statute has been presented to Mrs. Roosevelt, who is a member of the UN Commission on Human Rights, along with that other great liberal, Jacob Malik, and she answered, in her syndicated column as follows:

"There is contained in the Human Rights Covenant a clause that states that marriage shall be entered into freely with the consent of both spouses. I suppose that would mean that a white person could marry a negro or a person of some other color or race."

"This is from the pen of the person who helped draft it, in blissful disregard of solemn state laws. This is the painless method by which State sovereignty is undermined, without the furor likely to be provoked by direct action. Just adopt a treaty and the job is complete."

Exactly this was done after a federal statute enacted in 1913, proposing to regulate the killing of migratory birds, had been held invalid on the ground that the birds were owned by the States, in their sovereign capacity, for the benefit of their people, and not by the United States government.

To vitiate Art. 10 of the Bill of Rights, a treaty was then arranged with a foreign power to do the same thing and the U. S. Supreme Court struck down the doctrine of States' Rights, by its decision, as effectively as was done at Appomattox, by another method.

Does it not seem more than passingly strange that the "Iron Curtain countries" are so very prompt in their approval of the proposals of the UN Commission

on Human Rights which have been prepared and submitted by Mrs. Roosevelt and Jacob Malik and their fellow-committeemen? What rights or freedoms are the Russians and their satellites giving up or losing by the concessions of the American freedom? No, my friend, the rights and liberties being ceded by Mrs. Roosevelt and her crowd are those which our fore-

fathers bought with their blood and sweat.

Remember this, the Senate has no right to amend or modify a treaty. It may only accept or reject it. Thus, the elected representatives of the people are deprived of originating or amending proposals which can touch virtually every phase of human life. This is absolutely contrary to the basic principles of our form of government. American blood was shed from Lexington to Yorktown, for the right to be governed by laws enacted by the elected representatives of the people.

The problem with which we are confronted was not created for the U. S. by the UN. It was created by our Constitution and is being taken advantage of, and being pro-

tuted, by a gang of self-styled far-seeing and broad minded international do gooders and super staters. That is the reason an amendment to the Constitution is so essential to preserve our national and constitutional integrity and to

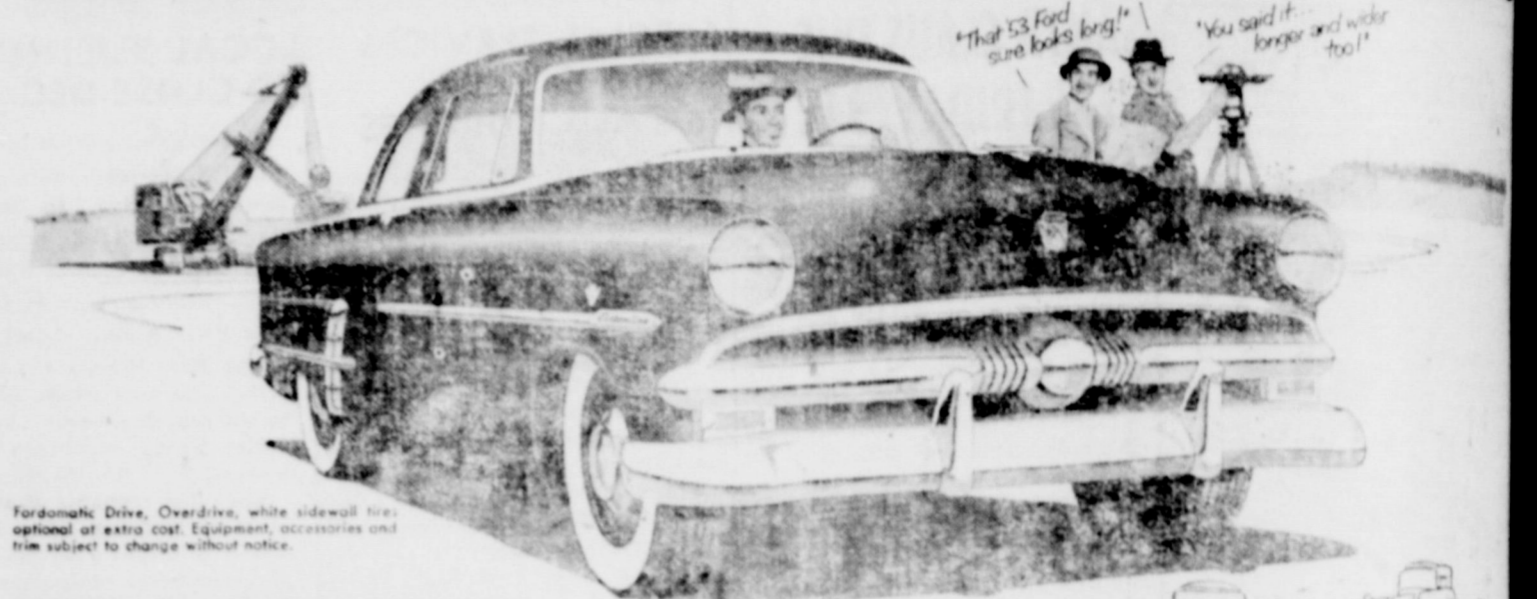
prevent foreign direction of our domestic affairs, through the adoption of alien-inspired treaties.

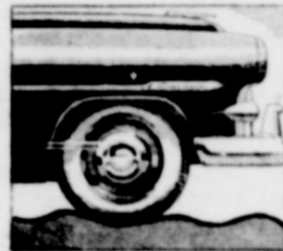

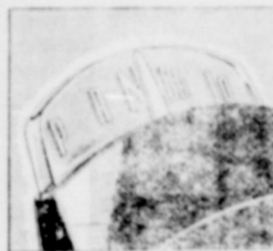

### Method Of Water Conservation Given By Ag. Commissioner

by Texas Dept. of Agriculture  
Nature was very generous in providing us the capacity for storing water underground. Although four-fifths of Texas has poor natural surface water resources, the underground water storage is not only great but widely distributed.

Conservation of underground water means preventing the waste of water which nature has already stored in these subterranean reservoirs. Conservation of surface water is the saving of water that would otherwise waste.

Most of the municipal supply in Texas is still coming from underground. Among the 700 or more municipal systems in the state using this source are those of Houston, San Antonio, Beaumont, Orange, Port Arthur, Galveston, Amarillo and Lubbock. Houston and San Antonio are two of the largest cities in America still getting their water from underground. Only about 200 Texas cities or towns depend entirely on surface water.

But when we start thinking of conserving future supplies, we are apt to make a natural mistake. We may see only the surface water and fail to visualize the need for replenishing the stock underneath the land.

Farmers and city people near a river are easily impressed by the sight of flood waters that sweep by unused. They can be quickly sold on putting up money for a big dam, especially where the federal government will match their dollars.

Big dams are practical and have their uses. But they are only one-half of the picture. The dam has not been built yet that wouldn't be rendered useless in 50 years by constant siltage behind it, unless expensive maintenance work is practiced constantly.

We need countless small dams and check dams in the tributaries of the big streams. This puts more of the water in the soil. Money spent in this way helps hold the soil on the land, allows water to seep back into natural underground reservoirs and prevents erosion.

**Ladislado Rodriguez In Marine Boot Camp**

Marine Private Ladislado C. Rodriguez, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Enrique Rodriguez, of Sanderson is now undergoing training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, in San Diego, California.

During the nine week boot camp Private Rodriguez will become well versed in such military subjects as precision drill, first aid, Marine Corps history and field tactics.

Three weeks of training will be at Camp Matthews Rifle Range, 15 miles north of San Diego. While there, he will fire the .30 Garand rifle, .45 calibre pistol, carbine and Browning automatic rifle. He will also receive indoctrination in firing light and heavy machine guns, mortars, flame thrower, and the latest type of bazooka.

Upon completion of recruit training, Pvt. Rodriguez will be granted a 10-day leave and assigned to a Marine Corps post or station for duty, or to a Marine Corps school for advance training.

A former employee at Kelly AFB, Pvt. Rodriguez participated in amateur boxing events at several San Antonio clubs.

**Warning Issued To Guard Against All Respiratory Diseases**

Carelessness in the treatment of a respiratory disease is not only foolish but very hazardous, according to Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, who warned Texans today to be on guard against such illness as leads to pneumonia.

Dr. Cox pointed out that pneumonia can and does strike with little or no warning, and in many instances its forerunner is a simple cold, an attack of influenza or some other respiratory infection.

"A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage which makes one constitutionally weak, especially if accompanied by fever, demands the immediate attention of the family physician," Dr. Cox said. "To self-treat and fight on one's feet a condition of this kind is to endanger life unnecessarily. It is desirable to take all possible steps to avoid respiratory illnesses since they so frequently lead to that most dangerous complication—pneumonia."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that it is important to build up normal

physical resistance by sufficient indoor ventilation, adequate, nourishing food, outdoor exercise, and sufficient sleep, but added that the family physician should be called immediately if, in spite of such care, a respiratory illness develops.

"Guard against pneumonia which is a communicable disease," Dr. Cox urged. It may be acquired by direct or indirect contact with a pneumonia patient. Reduced bodily resistance resulting from habitual disregard for normal physical requirements makes pneumonia doubly hazardous," he added, "and I cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of consulting a physician immediately upon the appearance of a respiratory ailment."

**Quail Season To End Season's Hunting For Area Sportsmen**

The annual quail season, which opened December 1 under the General State Law, climaxes a full season of wildlife harvest, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

Some sections of the state will find quail scarce because of the prolonged drouth, but generally, quail will be in pretty good quantity.

The General Law season runs from December 1 through January 16, with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset and with a bag

limit of twelve per day and not more than 36 in possession.

The special seasons section of the law permits hunting west of the Pecos River in December only, and Terrell County has a restriction permitting a possession limit of only 24 quail.

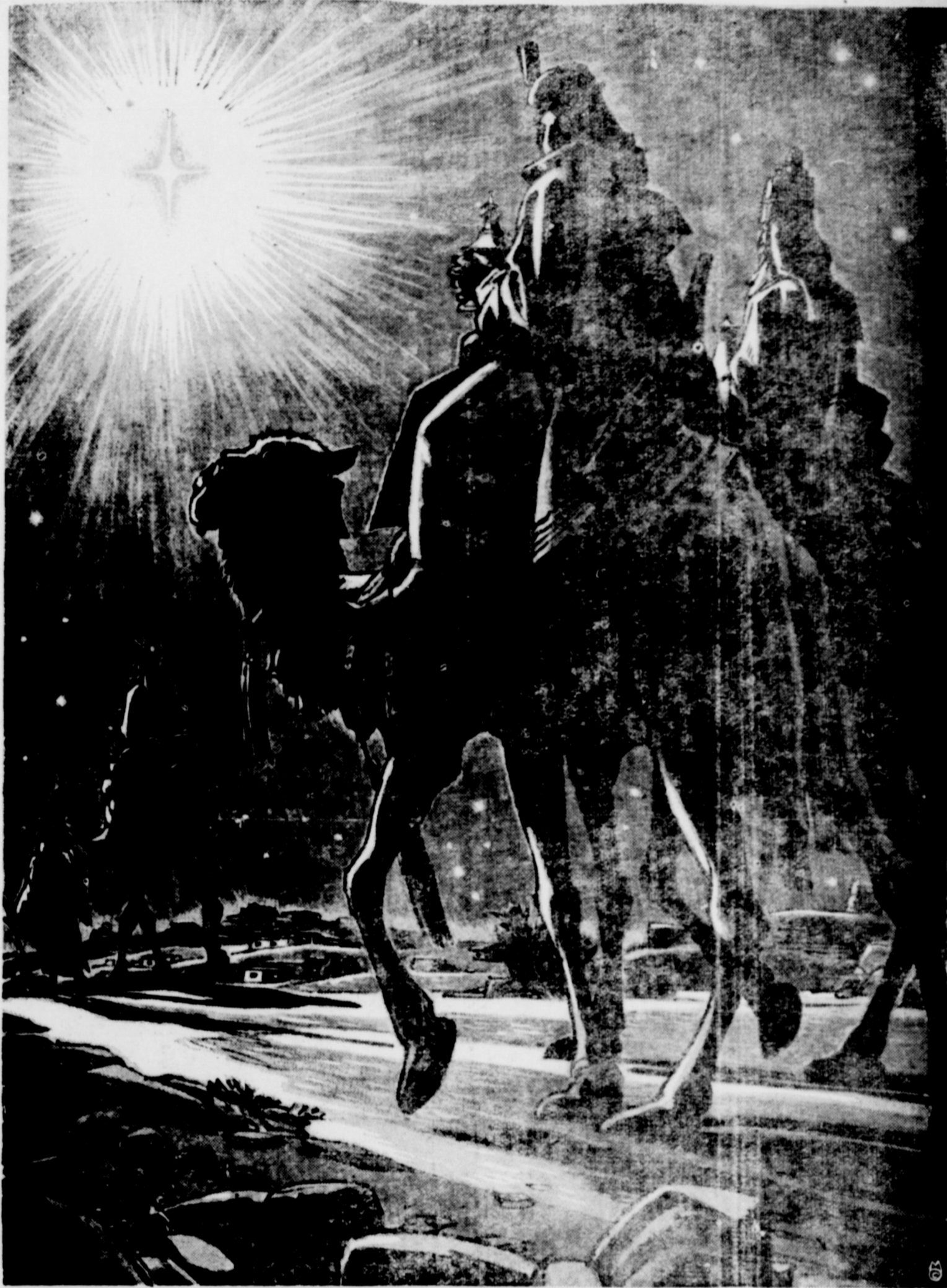

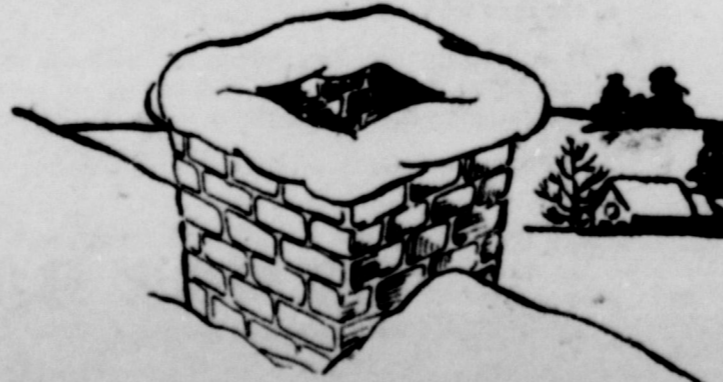
