criticized the people of the community because there was no cooperation in a union Easter service. Reading the article has caused me to write you, explaining the stand the Church of Christ takes which will explain our part of the lack of cooperation.

"As concerning special days, I refer you to Romans 14:5: 'One man esteemeth one day above another; another esteemeth every day alike. Let every man be full persuaded in his own mind.'"

"We, of the Church of Christ, have no intention of minimizing the birth, death or the resurrection

of Christ. We believe that we are to conduct our worship services according to the commandments, examples and necessary inferences, which we find in the New Testament.

"The observance of Easter Sunday or Christmas as special religious services is not commanded or implied in the New Testament therefore we do not make special ceremonial services on these days in our regular worship services."

"We believe that Christ does know and is very much aware of the conduct of all of us, not just on one Sunday of the year, but 52 Sundays a year and for that reason we teach and encourage our members to be present for worship services on the first day of every week to partake of the Lord's Supper in remembrance of Christ until He comes again."

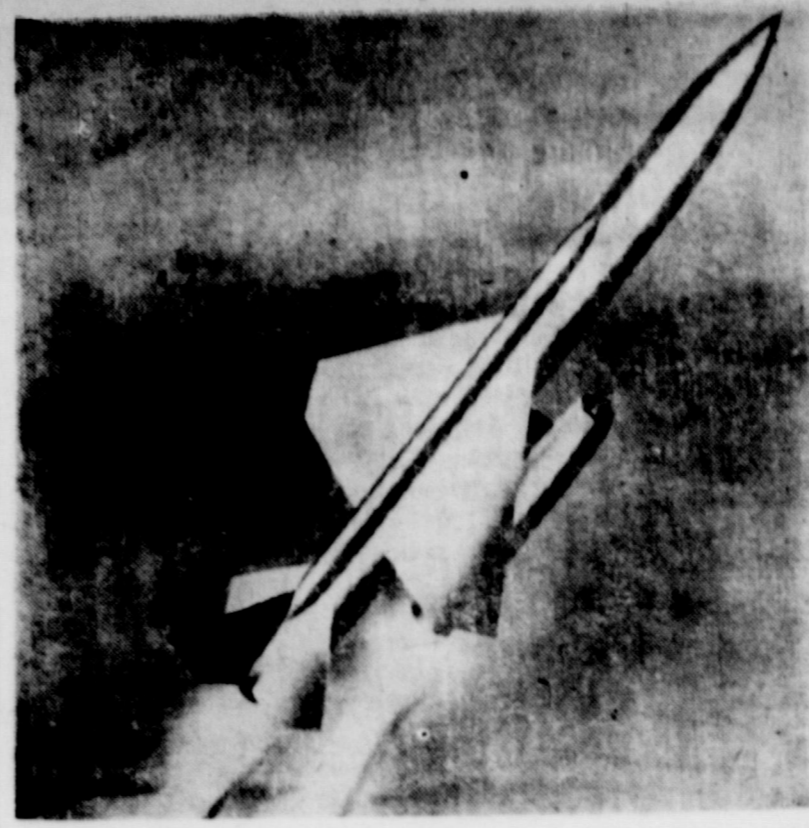
