Talk this week has been ranging from the danger of another war to the breaking of the drought.

One rancher avers that the drought isn't broken until HE gets some rain. Others have had good rains but need more. Still this column insists that any rainfall in Terrell County is a drought-breaker.

We heard of a rancher near San Angelo who had started to his ranch with a load of relief feed and the draws got up and had him water-bound, so he turned his pickup around and headed back to town to apply for flood relief. That hasn't happened in Terrell County yet that we know of.

Clouds keep forming and then disappear as if to remind us that we must not be too over-confident. Some months ago we started quite a furor when we made some criticism about the communities where groups would pray for rain. We got our hand called on the subject that we were too prejudiced to be influenced against our original plan. We stated that if we expect prayers for special favors to be answered we are just wearing out the knees of our britches. Of course we believe in the power of prayer, but the prayer of selfishness never goes beyond the ceiling.

At any rate the powers that are in session now at Geneva have little hope for realizing any lasting good. We are meeting there with a country which can know no good, regarding the basic rules of the meeting, they began by trying to under us into recognition of Red China. That will not work. Mr. Dulles is reported to have stated that he will bundle up and come home if the other powers yield to Russian demand. Any way you look at it from here, it looks like hopeless endeavor for peace. If we believe in prayer, let's pray earnestly that our country's leadership may be guided to do the things which are right and just. Let us continue to pray that our nation may humble itself before God and be in the right thinking about our responsibilities as a nation. If we pray for God to show us what we are to do — show us what responsibility is ours, and with willing hearts to accept our duty and do the best we can, then, and only then will our prayers be answered.

We still see improvement in our safety campaign for vehicles. A take the attitude that their method of driving is their business. The safety and common-sense nature of trying to obey traffic rules and rules should be sufficient help a person to realize that willful disobedience of any law or is a flagrant danger and should be stopped.

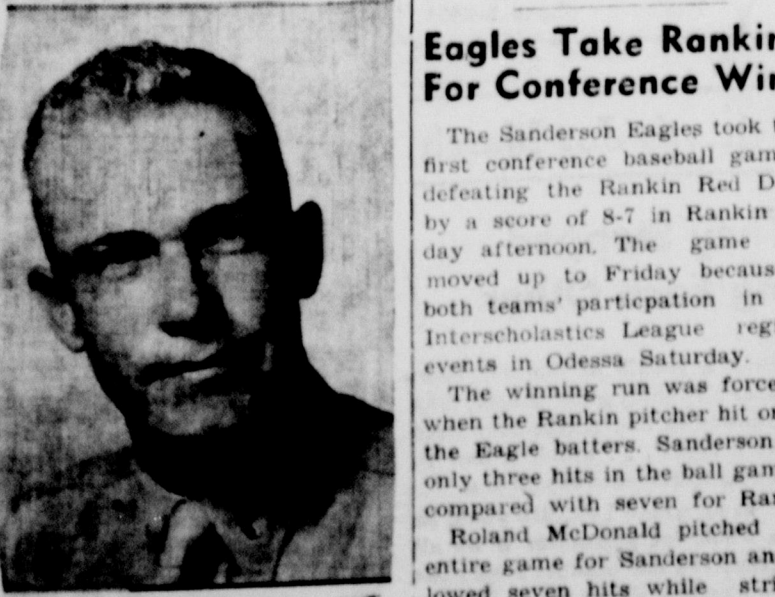
More livestock for the events was bought last week, with 12 steers for the team-typing events.

FLOWER SHOW IN LEGION HALL OPEN TO PUBLIC

"The World We Live In" is the theme of the annual flower show to be sponsored by the Sanderson Garden Club Friday. Following the judging of the entries in the show at the Legion Hall, the show will be open to the public from 3 to 8 p. m. Admission is free and a cordial invitation has been extended to everyone to attend the show.

Entries for the show will be accepted from 9 to 11:30 a. m. and late entries will be marked "not for competition" but will be displayed for the public.

Anyone may enter flowers in the show regardless of whether or not they are a member of the Garden Club. Flowers in the arrangement classes need not be grown by the exhibitor. Flowers in the horticultural specimen classes must be grown by the exhibitor. Potted plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least three months prior to the show.

Classification tags may be filled in at the door at the time of entry, but it will be more convenient if they are filled in at home and brought with the entry. Extra entry cards may be secured from Mrs. O. T. Sudduth.

Containers for specimen entries will be furnished by the Garden Club.

The horticultural classes include sections for all roses, bulbs, annuals, perennials, annual and perennial vines and flowering trees and shrubs. There are classes also for each large and small dish garden and terrariums (plants growing in deep vase or jar). Geraniums of all sorts will be classed. House plants, fern and flowering house plants and collections of succulents and of herbs are named in the show schedule.

The arrangement classes cover a wide variety of styles; nearly any arrangement will find a suitable place in this year's flower show. The schedule calls for line arrangements; a yellow or bright arrangement to depict sunlight. There is a dried arrangement class which is for succulents arranged with sticks and stones. A class called "the Ocean" will have many types of arrangements that will call to the viewers the sea or the seashore. All white arrangements will be placed in the class called "the snow". "The Forest" class is for an all-green flower or foliage arrangement. There is a class called "the Garden" that will call to mind the small or large group of flowers one may gather on any bright morning from her own garden to use in her own home. Then there is a class called "the Harvest", in which fruit, vegetables and flowers may be mixed, or any arrangement made with just one of the type.

George M. Thurmond Enters Race For State Representative

George M. Thurmond of Del Rio announced his candidacy for State Representative of the 100th Legislative District, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary on July 24, 1954. The district is composed of the counties of Val Verde, Terrell, Maverick, Kinney and Brewster.

The announcement was made on Tuesday of this week.

Born at Del Rio on October 22, 1930, Thurmond is a son of Judge and Mrs. Roger Thurmond of that city. He attended the public school system of Del Rio and graduated from high school there.

Majoring in government, Thurmond graduated with honors in 1952 from the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn. In September, 1952, he entered the University of Texas Law School and will receive his Bachelor of Laws degree there at the end of the next regular session.

He is a member of the Phi Delta honorary legal fraternity and the Editorial Board of the Texas Law Review, honors that are conferred only on outstanding students of the law department of the University.

Thurmond was an employee of the State Senate during the regular session of the 53rd Legislature, and is now employed as a quiz master at the University Law School.

In announcing his candidacy, Thurmond said:

"As a fourth generation West Texan, I believe I am fairly cognizant of the many complex problems facing our State, and especially our area.

"My predecessors on both sides of my family have been residents of this section of Texas and identified with business, professional and public life here for over 50 years. My late grandfather, for whom I was named, was district attorney in the early 1900's, of a district that covered a large part of West and Southwest Texas. My great-grandfather, the late J. R. Hamilton, is reputed to have bought and sold as many Texas sheep as any man before or since his time.

"My roots are pretty deep in this part of Texas, and with my heredity, training and environment I have an everlasting interest and faith in its welfare.

"I covet the opportunity to work in an official capacity for its advancement. That is my aim and purpose in asking the people of this district to grant me the privilege of serving them in the Legislature."

Thurmond is unmarried and is an Episcopalian and a member of Phi Gamma Delta social fraternity.

Rain and Hail Fall in East Terrell County

Rains reported from 10 inch to 1 inch fell in the eastern part of Terrell County Tuesday afternoon ranging all up and down the Pecos River, the eastern boundary. Lightest rains were reported in the northeastern part of the county ranging heavier southward. The intensity of the hail seemed to follow the density of the precipitation, since light hail and little or no damage was reported from the northeastern part of the county. Some hail stones in the east-central and southeast part of the county were reported to be of hen-egg proportions and some damage was expected to result from such large stones. Some reports of chunks of ice, rather than stones, were given.

Guilty Plea Entered in Vandalism Charge

W. R. (Pat) Taliaferro, an ex-Texas Ranger, was sentenced to 30 days in jail in County Court here Monday before County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

The man was arrested here last week end after upholstery in several cars had been slashed. Cars and trucks parked in the business district were found to be mutilated on the seat and back of the front seat, all in the same manner.

Taliaferro pleaded guilty on one charge of vandalism and the court got his agreement to pay all damages after the 30-day sentence expires. Only one charge was filed.

Among cars and trucks which fell victim to the slashing were a ranch wagon belonging to Herbert Brown, two delivery trucks of the Pierson Butane, a car belonging to the Ferguson Motor Co., and a car belonging to the McKnight Motor Co.

Perhaps the biggest news from the capitol or any part of the state last week was the rain. From its Austin office, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced that precipitation over much of the state, including drought-ridden West Texas, brightened the prospects for ranchers and farmers this year. Everywhere the situation was described as improved, but more moisture was needed to insure agricultural success during the coming season. While the rains helped, the Texas drought was not completely broken. Governor Shivers said he would ask for more Federal aid for dry West Texas counties. As usual, Texas weather went to extremes. In the lower Rio Grande Valley, there was too much rain. Flood situations existed for a time in many South Texas cities. An important victory was won by the State of Texas in a five-year old attempt to collect anti-trust penalties from ten major oil companies. The third Court of Civil Appeals here ruled that the companies conspired to fix and maintain non-competitive tank wagon prices on gasoline. Defending companies argued that the petition should be thrown out because it did not give specific names, dates and details of the alleged conspiracy. Reversed by the court's decision was a ruling handed down in 1952 by District Judge Charles O. Betts whose opinion was that the state had failed to show a cause of action. The group allegedly controls 90 per cent of the state's gasoline outlets. Penalties totaling \$14,000,000 are sought by the state. Texas politics started with a rush as Governor Allan Shivers broke a log jam by announcing that he would ask the voters for an unprecedented third term. Actually Governor Shivers is now in his third term; he took over as the state's chief executive upon the death of Governor Beauford Jester in July 1949. When his present term is ended

Shepperd Announces For Re-Election



Texas Attorney General John Ben Shepperd formally filed for re-election to a second term today, subject to the action of the Democratic primary. In his announcement Shepperd pledged continuing war by his office on "Crime, Communism and Corruption." "We feel that our quick action in checking the drive by the Communist Party to take over key Texas ports and on right in Duval County to uncover and halt the theft of public funds both have won approval of the people." During 1953 his office won 97% of its cases - 1199 out of 1232 tried or appealed. In the same year his office recovered through judgments, fines and forfeitures, enough money to operate the Attorney General's office for 25 years. As an economy measure Shepperd reorganized the Attorney General's department when he took office. In 1953 he returned \$25,000 in unused money to the state's treasury by cutting office expenses, his own salary, traveling expenses. He considers the record of his actions in office as cause for consideration by the voters. Reconsideration by the voters for re-election.

C. T. Johnson Here To Campaign For Lieutenant Governor



C. T. Johnson, 43-year old Democratic candidate for Lt. Governor of Texas was in Sanderson Wednesday of this week on behalf of his campaign for that office. He is receiving state attention stung by a one-man war against the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. rates and is carrying on his campaign with that as a major issue. In order to reduce the rates he proposes a state telephone commission to regulate the rates. He stated that there are 45 of the 48 states that operate such a commission satisfactorily. Johnson stated, "It is very unfair for the public to be penalized by these rates just because a telephone is today's necessity." He also advocates \$100 monthly pension to eligible citizens at 65, pointing out that Texas ranks in 44th place nationally with its present low \$34 monthly pension. Johnson favors a state-wide conservation program as a dire necessity, and \$1,000 bonus to all veterans. He is a civic leader of Austin, a veteran, married and is a Baptist.

he will have served longer than any other governor - five years and five months. Looming as Shivers' chief opposition were Ralph Yarbrough, Austin attorney who ran for governor in 1952; and Reuben Senterfitt, of San Saba, speaker of the House of Representatives. Yarbrough is a loyal Democrat who will ask for the support of those voters who went along with Adlai Stevenson in the last presidential race. Senterfitt is a conservative who differs with Shivers over several issues during the last special session of the legislature. Officially entered in the Governor's race was J. J. Holmes, an Austin contractor. Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey, Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White will ask for another term in their present offices.

Water conservation was a prime subject for the political speakers. That problem is one of the state's biggest, and influenced Shivers in his decision to run for his third term, he told reporters. He said that in his opinion Texas has sufficient water if the supply is conserved, adding: "Texas can solve its own water problems. It ought to be done in large part on the local and state level." C. T. Johnson, candidate for the office of Lieutenant Governor, as part of his platform, proposed the construction of 100,000 small dams in Northwest Texas to hold rainfall. He also recommended a canal to connect 10 Texas rivers and provide an interchange of water to balance irregular flow. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson also urged thousands of small dams in the upland areas of Texas for water storage and protection against floods. Senator Johnson drew opposition in the opposition in the person of Representative Dudley T. Dougherty of Beeville, wealthy oil man and rancher. Dougherty cranked up his campaign by sending to Johnson in Washington a telegram asking him some questions. Dougherty wanted to know: Does Johnson approve of the use of U. S. troops in Indo-China? Does Johnson favor sharing the atomic secrets with other nations? Will Johnson assist in the investigation of federal loans on Texas hotels and apartments.

Of course, we know that somebody is lying, and we haven't decided yet who is telling the biggest lies. It is a matter of more than preferential duty given or asked for a private in the army. On the surface there seems to be nothing but a bit of horseplay to such an inquiry. But there is definitely more than an investigation concerning the treatment of a GI. There are principles of government at stake that could, if allowed to continue, tear the whole foundation of our democracy. Men in high places must learn that they are not bigger than the country which they may be working for, directly or indirectly. Our guess is that there will be light - and shadows - cast on the actions of some pretty big men before this is over. If it finds out the truth, we hope it hits them hard.

Good Game Outlook For Coming Season

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said field reports indicate the recent general rains spared Texas its worst spring for game bird nesting in modern times. He added that cover, food and water, which were at a low ebb, already were rallying, presaging "fairly favorable nesting conditions." He said reports from the major big game range in the Hill Country indicate deer are greatly benefited by recent rains. Those on over-populated ranges were facing starvation for want of food. "The Director said some areas still are dry, but explained that most of the state 'got some showers.'" He said the critical period "lies just ahead" for nesting of such popular game birds as wild turkey and quail. Mourning doves have been nesting for some time in most state areas. The Director said "the spring will be a crucial one for our quail, which suffered so greatly from the drought the last few years." He said the quail, also stricken with periodic cycle slump, appear to exist in sufficient seed stock to begin coming back generally.

T&NO Gets 25 Cars For Passenger Comfort

First deliveries of an order for 25 new passenger chair cars placed by Southern Pacific last year have been delivered to the railroad, it was learned here today by Joe Little, local agent. The announcement was made at San Francisco by the vice president in charge of system passenger traffic. The cars embody newest developments for passenger comfort and are for service on the Sunset Limited and other name trains. These cars were ordered to bring a gap to fill the increased demand for low-cost rail transportation. About three-fourths of the road's passengers now travel in chair cars and coaches, rail officials said. All of the new cars have foam rubber seats adjustable to various positions. Some cars are equipped with chaise lounge type leg rests specially designed for sleeping ease for service on trains carrying overnight travelers.

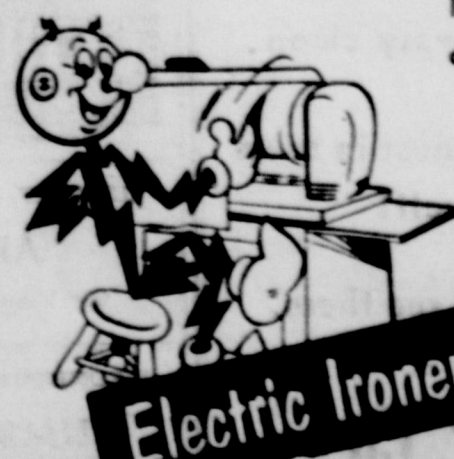

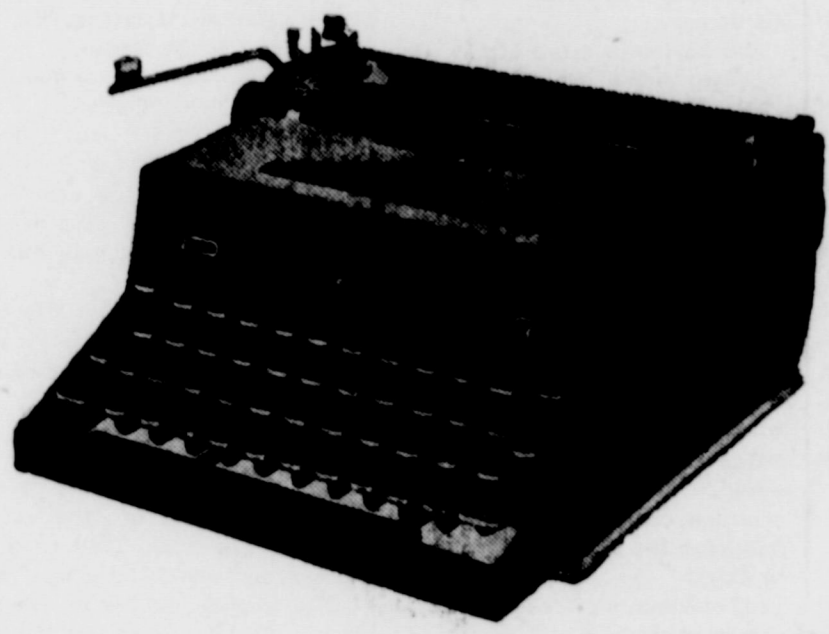
