

Terrell Co. Resident **Finds Uranium on** Edwards Co. Ranch

The Atomic Energy Commission last week verified the fact that a sufficient amount of uranium had een discovered on the Ernest Jessup ranch in Edwards County to warrant investigation by the commissio 1. The ranch, containing 4. 412 acres, is 10 miles southeast of Rock Springs.

Reports of samples commission by Jessup's son. Lowell Jessup, who operates the ranch, were verified afer representatives went over the ranch where the deposit had been found with a scintillator and Geiger counter. Young Jessup had been seeking uranium deposits on the ranch for about a

In October the commission reported to Lowell that samples of surface rock and soil submitted by him showed a radiometric analysis of 12 per cent, the equivalent of U308 and contained sufficient uranum to be of interest to the AEC.

The last of November, the commission notified him that the samples of surface rock and soil contained a chemical analysis of .116 per cent. Further investigation into the depth and content of the deposit will be made by Lowell Jessup.

Counting the ranch phones, there are some 400 phones in the county. The switchboard was in the home of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Stan sell and located on Persimmon Street. The local phone wires were attached to 2x4s on fence posts The McKees immediately purchas ed a larger switchboard for the telephone office which was established in their home, the house now occupied by the Carl Werneking family. The old telephone equip ment was moved to Marathon Telephone poles were put up and she recalled in an interview Tuescay that on Hallowe'en night while the wire was being strung, prank sters rolled the whole mile of wire off of the make-shift reel which Mr. McKee had left by the pole in front of their house and wrapped it around a large area of the town's trees, shrubs, fences, etc.

With the installation of better and newer equipment and good service, telephones immediately began to be in demand by local residents and ranchers and soon Mrs McKee was training a group of school girls to assist here as operators along with her own daughters, Merle and Sybil. Mrs. Horace Fletcher, Mrs. Tip Frazier, Mrs. James Smith, Miss Winnie Stirmap and Miss Castle Litton were some of the operators at that time.

The exchange was sold to Mr and Mrs. O. H. McAdams in 1925. the switchboard being installed in the McAdams home which is the two-story building now being vacated by the telephone company After about four years the Mc Adams sold the exchange and their home property in Sanderson to Del Rio and Winter Garden Telephone Co., Mr. McAdams continuing as manager.

In 1948 the transition was made from the old-type magneto system which eliminated the necessity of cranking and the magneto box-With the lifting of the receiver and the giving of the number to the operator, the connection was made by the operator who rang automatically with the switch-



Many Firms Still Delinquent In Tax For Unemployment

Almost 15,000 firms employing four, five, six or seven workers are now in the process of being coverd under the recently amended Texas Unemployment Compensaion Act, Weldon, Hart, Chairman of the Texas Employment Commision announced this week.

"Operators of these firms have esponded to letters, publicity and fforts by our local offices to adise them of their tax liability." art said, "however there are 23.-300 more who have not responded s yet. It would be to their ad antage to do so immediate y, s that penalties and assessment of back taxes can be avoided."

Following amendments to the 'ederal Unemployment Tax Act last year, the Texas legislature hanged the state unemployment aw accordingly. Any business that has as many as four employees or 20 days in 20 different weeks afte. July 1, 1955, becomes liable for memployment tax on its payrolls luring 1956. Beginning January 1 any firm which has 20 such weeks during a calendar year in which our or more persons are employ d on any day, will pay unemploy ment taxes
