Visitors will be able to observe test pens of cattle and their records and hear outstanding beef cattle research men headed by Dr. Charles Kincaid of Knoxville, Tennessee during the morning, said A. A. Melton, acting superintencent of the experiment station. The sale sponsored by the Highland Hereford Breeders Associa

tion will begin at 1:30 p. m. The first performance tests o cattle by an experiment station in cooperation with ranchmen is credited with having begun at the Balmorhea station. From the tests a new phase of beef production has begun.

Forty bulls and five heifers have been consigned to the sale, added J. W. White, Jr., of Marfa, and president of the Highland Hereford A-3C Betsy Flores Breeders Association: They have been fed a bulky growing ration
