## New Type Tax To Be Paid By Some Businesses

Business firms subject to the new floor stocks tax on products included in the recently passed Highway Act may now obtain copies of Form 2265 from the district office of Internal Revenue at Austin, District Director R. L. Phinney said this week. Returns, with payments, are due by October 15.

Floor stocks taxes will have to be paid on inventories in the hands of dealers (defined to include a wholesaler, jobber, distributor, or retailer) on July 1, 1956, the startin date of the new or increased will fall on the following kinds of inventories

(1) Trucks, truck trailers, busses, etc., held for sale by a dealer on July 1. The dealer will have to pay the tax either on the price be paid or on the price for which the

(2) Tires of the type used on highway vehicles and held for sale by dealers on July 1. The floor stocks tax would also apply to such tires installed or held for installation on such date by manufacturers, producers, or importers

(3 Tread rubber held by any person, other than the manufacturer, producer or importer, for sale or use in the recapping or retreading of tires of the type used on highway vehicles on July 1.

(4) Gasoline held for sale on July 1 by a dealer (but not retail stocks of gasoline held in tanks at the place where they are intended to be sold at retail through pumps directly to the consumer, nor gasoline held by a producer or im.

During the same period accicents on the non-radar-patrolled stretches - farm to market roads and city streets, etc. - climbed 13 per cent. A similar increase could have been expected on state and federal highways, Connor believes, especially since total mileage inreased also - nearly 5 per cent. Had normal trends continued, 81 more lives would have been lost in 1955.
