

Austin - Instead of simmering down at summer's end, Texas' political pot is boiling more furiously than ever.

New significance has been added to the already controversial State Democratic Convention next week. Monday the executive committee must clarify a winner in one of the most breathtakingly close gubernatorial races in Texas history.

Unofficial counts showed Price Daniel leading Ralph Yarborough by some 3,000 votes. But each side regarded returns in certain areas as questionable.

It promises to be an even closer finish than in 1932 when Mrs. Miriam Ferguson edged out Ross Sterling by 3,798 votes.

Decision of the executive conmittee apparently is all-import. ant. In the Ferguson-Sterling contest courts refused to interfere with the committee ruling. They said it would delay the general election.




