Benefits for dependent members of your family are likewise based on your average earnings The higher your average, the higher your benefit, and your dependent's benefits. An individual worker's benefit ranges from a minimum of \$30.00 per month \$24 for women at 62) to a maximum of \$108.50. It is important that you understand how your social security benefits are fig. . ured in planning your retirement



cilities was also brought about by the Texas Education Agency's changes in mandatory courses for affiliated high schools. That body added a history course and increased science requirements, thus making it necessary for affiliated schools to add additional classroom teachers and facilities.

Most residents of the county are cognizant of the careful and conservative actions of the school board in the past and the board members stated that their present action in the attempt to form in independent school district was in keeping and conformance with their conservative views, but was a step they deemed absolutely necessary for the best interest of the school patrons, pupils, and taxpayers.

Under the common school district government, the local board would, of necessity, go to the commissioners' court to plead their need for additional operating capital. The court, in turn, if they were agreeable with the needs of the school board, would either raise valuations or the tax rate to furnish the needed amount. The tax rate at the present is at the maximum in the county, thus a raise in the valuations would be the only recourse for additional funds for

An independent school district is a tax levying and collecting agency and as such could set the valuations and levy taxes and


