Commissioners Set Valuations On Oil, Gas Leases

The County Commissioners' Court met in a called session on Tuesday morning for the purpose of setting tax valuations on oil and gas leases in the county and on the shut-in gas wells

Thos. Y. Pickett of Dallas, and his associates, John Lockaby of San Angelo, and Gordon Humphries of Dallas, tax advisors to the local Commissioners' Court, met with the court and tax representatives from three major companies to come to an agreement on tax rates.

A valuation of 25c per acre was placed on all oil and gas leased land in the county, \$1,500 on the shut-in gas wells in the county. and \$5,000 on the Brown-Bassett

All drillings rigs in the county were also placed on the tax roll. Mr. Pickett and the tax representatives of the companies holding leases in the county, agreed that the valuations set Tuesday were low and equitable for the present status of oil discoveries within the county.

It was pointed out that with other possible future discoveries and extension of gas or oil potential, that oil and gas leases valuations would advance considerably higher, according to the potential.

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
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



TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

CHIEF FIELDS OF THE CHEROKEES The Warrior Who Lived and Died for Peace

Not all of the champions of freedom honored in Texas history were Anglo-Americans. One whose ideals of liberty led to his death at the hands of his own people was a Cherokee chief ... Richard Fields. From the east Fields led his tribe into Texas in 1820, to find a country where they could live peacefully. Attempting to secure land

for the tribe, he appealed to the Mexican Governor at San Antonio de Bexar. From there he made his way to Mexico City, to beg for land from the Viceroy. Unsuccessful, despairing and without funds, he returned to fight for his cause. At Nacogdoches Fields joined the Anglo-Texans who were forming the ill-fated Fredonian Republic.

Under the flag of Fredonia, Texas was to be divided between the Anglos and the Indians, share and share alike. But the Republic of Fredonia lasted just 45 days, the flag was lowered on January 31, 1827. Then Chief Fields unhappy and confused Cherokee people held him responsible for this new misfortune. The old chief, the dedicated freedom-fighter, was executed on the following May 8th.
