LISTEN TO LUKE

The Independent School District was voted in as expected.

There are some who opposed change but will probably now change to go along with the majority of the citizens and will object to the measure to as the bonded indebtedness of common school district when presented.

Everybody knows that there is a necessity for improvements in facilities for the local school and will be willing to do what is necessary to accomplish the end of bringing the situation up to the demands for satisfactory facilities.

The Commissioners' Court aided possible future financial condition — to some extent — in leasing the oil and gas leases in the county and also taxing the shut-in wells.

The independent school district will have a clear field in ratifying the act of the Commissioners for some tax money to augment other income sources.

When the development begins, there will be more available from that source and from local development, such as houses, new businesses, etc.

Of course, too, that type of income will also increase the need for additional facilities.

When the vote Monday morning was taken, many were surprised that more than half did not vote. Maybe there was the same as mine and mine's — we left town on a trip that was planned at the last minute with plans to resume before the polls closed. It didn't make it.

There were many who had expressed deep concern over the situation in the past that they did not get to vote for the reason or another, and when they could have, in order to boost the majority of "for" in a display of confidence.

When the voting of taxes — and this is a touchy subject with many — there is a source of tax that is not coming in — there is no one's fault but the law. This is on personal property and includes such things as furniture, and other valuable items considered real property. Items could bring considerable revenue in to the coffers of the owners would render them on them.

The board met Wednesday night for its organizational meeting and Brown was named president, Caroline vice-president and Hahn secretary.

The group made plans for an election for the purpose of assuming the obligation for the indebtedness incurred by the common school district, and also discussed operational procedure of an independent school district board as a tax levying body as well as school governing group.

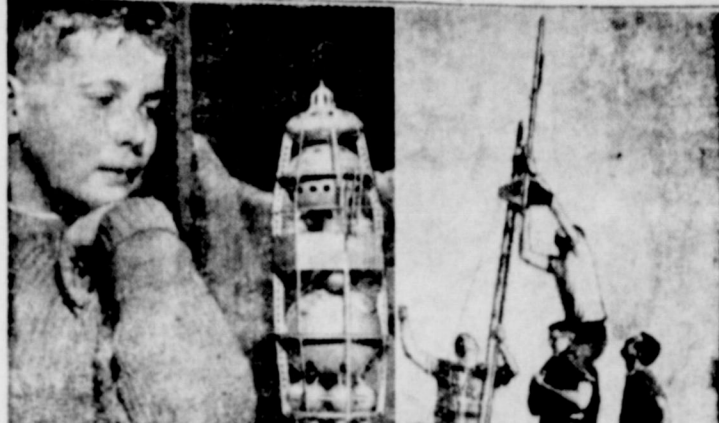

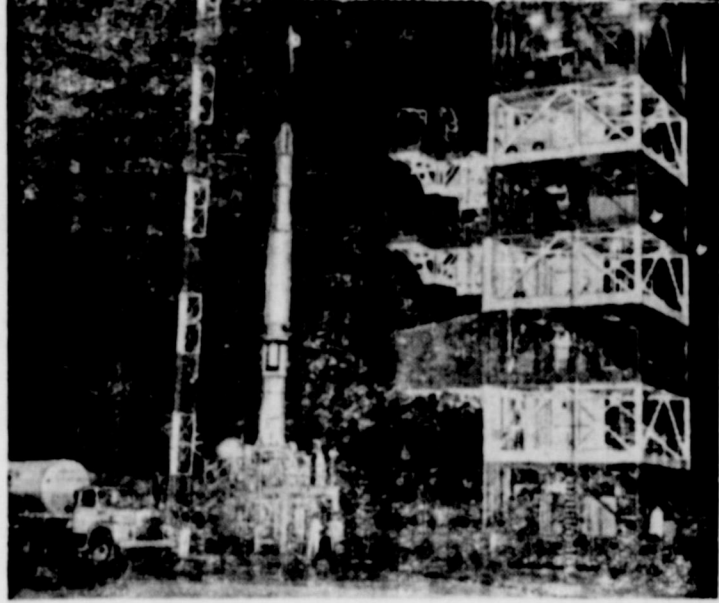

Financial Picture Of County Noted By Bank Statement

Little change is noted in the financial picture of the area by a statement issued by the Sanderson State Bank this week.

Loans, discounts, including overdrafts went from \$321,633.66 to \$321,299.97. U. S. Gov't. Bonds dropped from \$948,143.13 to \$900,566.18. Municipal bonds dropped from \$10,512.56 to \$9,132.92. Cash and with banks increased from \$455,816.21 to \$559,866.21. Banking house and furniture and fixtures remained at \$100 to bring total resources down from \$1,861,407.56 to \$1,857,451.38.

Liabilities also decreased from \$1,861,407.56 to \$1,857,451.38 with an increase in undivided profits from \$62,564.22 to \$63,576.56 and a decrease in deposits from \$1,663,843.34 to \$1,658,874.82. Capital stock remained at \$50,000.00 and surplus remained at \$85,000.00.

The last statement was published on March 4, 1958, and the comparison is for approximately four months.

Commissioners Set Valuations On Oil, Gas Leases

The County Commissioners' Court met in a called session on Tuesday morning for the purpose of setting tax valuations on oil and gas leases in the county and on the shut-in gas wells.

Thos. Y. Pickett of Dallas, and his associates, John Lockaby of San Angelo, and Gordon Humphries of Dallas, tax advisors to the local Commissioners' Court, met with the court and tax representatives from three major companies to come to an agreement on tax rates.

A valuation of 25c per acre was placed on all oil and gas leased land in the county, \$1,500 on the shut-in gas wells in the county, and \$5,000 on the Brown-Bassett No. 1.

All drilling rigs in the county were also placed on the tax roll. Mr. Pickett and the tax representatives of the companies holding leases in the county, agreed that the valuations set Tuesday were low and equitable for the present status of oil discoveries within the county.

It was pointed out that with other possible future discoveries and extension of gas or oil potential, that oil and gas leases valuations would advance considerably higher, according to the potential.

Exact figures of income for the county in taxes from this new source are available at the present.

Independent School District Okayed in Monday's Election

Terrell County Independent School District was voted in on Monday by a wide majority, according to unofficial but accurate tabulations. The Commissioners' Court will canvass the

ballot at their next regular meeting to make official the count.

Balloting returns from the precincts were: Precinct 1, 196 for and 22 against; Precinct 2, 19 for and 10 against; Precinct 3, 11 for and 2 against; Precinct 4, 4 for and none against.

Total tabulation was 230 for to 34 against.

Voting was considered average expected within the county for this type of vote. Ordinary school board elections do not get out a near representative vote.

Little opposition had been expressed commonly prior to the election, signifying the willingness of the majority of the voters to favor the proposal.

School officials and board members who fostered the proposal, expressed their appreciation to the vast majority who backed the proposal by their vote, thus placing solid confidence in the opinions of the duly elected board members.

Absentee Voting Now Possible For July Primary

Absentee ballots for the July 26 Democratic Primary in Terrell County started Monday in the office of Rue Adams, county clerk. Voting by absentee ballot may continue through Tuesday, July 22.

Any qualified voter who is outside the county and expects to be away over the election date may send an application to Mr. Adams with poll tax receipt or exemption and an absentee ballot will be mailed.

Voters in the county who expect to be away on July 26 may cast their absentee vote in person at the county clerk's office.

The July 26 primary is the first of two Democratic primary elections to decide party nominees for the general election in the fall.

Only one Terrell County contest is on the ballot, a race between Rue Adams and L. H. Lemons for county clerk.

An active vote is expected to be cast in two statewide races, for governor and U. S. Senator.

A voter who is disabled and cannot go to the polls on election day may vote absentee by furnishing a doctor's certificate saying he will be unable to go to the polls.

July 22 is the last day for absentee balloting.

Farm License Holders Warned

Norman K. Warner of Odessa, special investigator with the Texas Highway Department, was in Sanderson Tuesday and in an interview expressed caution to some local citizens. He stated that people who had farm license plates on their vehicles should be sure their vehicles are being used in a manner prescribed by law to make them eligible for purchasing farm license plates, or to purchase the proper type license plates.

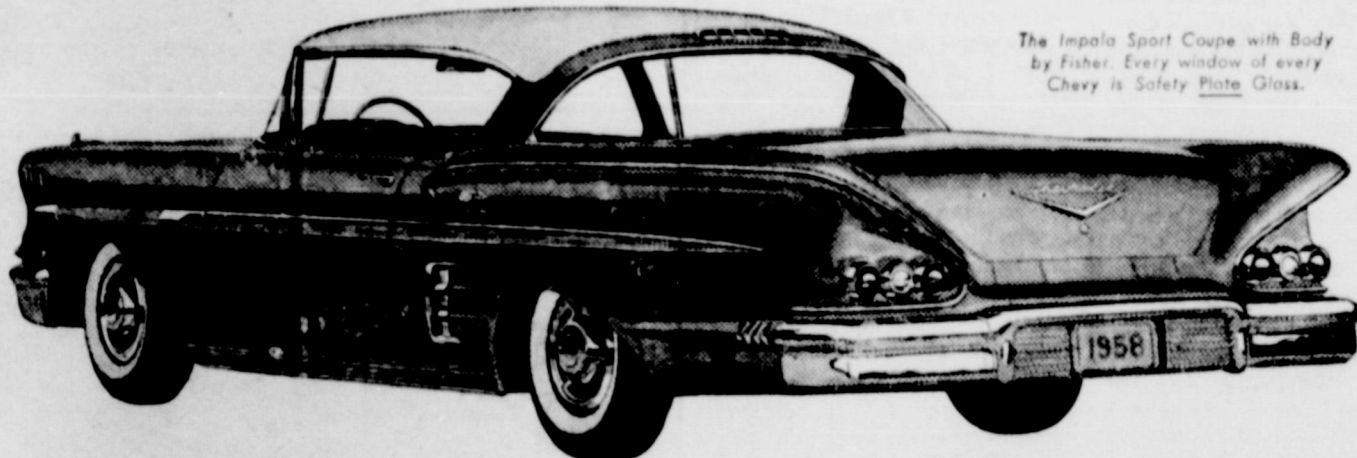
