\$2,407,000 Loan **Okayed To REA** The Times received a telegram

Monday from Cong. J. T. Rutheriord in which he stated that the Rural Electrification Administration had approved a loan in the amount of \$2,407,000 to the Rio Grande Electric Cooperative at Brackettville. The loan is for the purpose of financing construction of 1.109 miles of distribution lines to serve 678 new rural consumers. Some of the money will also be used for system improvements and some to pay back the borrower for money used in the last few years to connect up new

Tom Hurd, general manager of the REA group, was reported by the Del Rio News-Herald to have stated that the extensions of service will be into an area around Dell City, Van Horn, Fort Stockton and Pecos.

Hurd also stated that some of the money is expected to be available in 45-60 days and he anticiprites abouta year's wait to complete bids and planning, before the actual start of the first proiect.

Three Men Get **Heavy Fines** In JP Court

Three local men drew fines of \$200.00 each in Justice Court after pleading guilty to charges of fighting and disturbing the peace The charges were filed by local officers.

The charges grew out of an altercation which took place in Dryden Sunday night when the three assaulted another man without provocation, according to information available. The victim received body and facial bruises and in some way was cut over the left eye and a sharp instrument cut his shirt at the waist and barely scratched the stomach. His glasses were broken in the melee and several stitches were required to close the wound over the eve. Two of the men were involved in another altercation earlier in the day, according to local officers, after which one of them paid a fine of \$5.00 in Justice Court after a plea of guilty to charges of fighting and disturbing the peace. Another altercation which directly involved one of the men occurred Saturday night in Dryden. according to sheriff's department officers, but the victim refused to file charges or testify. The victim was knocked unconscious and received a black eye from the blow. Survey work began Tuesday morning on a proposed route for the extension of RM 2400 from US 285 to 1217 toward Sheffield. The present hard-top is ap-

proximately 12 miles from US 285 and the planned reconstruction extension is from that point for approximately 13 miles.

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Austin - When tax bills finally were passed by both the Texas House and the Senate, it was not dollars, but ideas that delaved agreement.

House bill was designed to raise about \$150,000,000 over the next two years; Senate bill, approximately \$160,000,000. Big dif ference was in where the money would come from. House bill was divided evenly between selective sales taxes and taxes on natural resources and corporation franchises.

Senate, which heard a long string of witnesses on the dangers of shutting prosperity-making industries out of Texas changed the ratio. In its version natural gas and corporations pay about 18 per cent of the tab; se lective sales taxes, 82 per cent.

Senate voted a 15-15 tie on its bill, with Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey breaking the tie in favor of the bill.

How They Stack

These items were hit, in varying degrees, by the House and Senate bills that went to conference committee

Corporations - Senate, raise to \$10,800,000 by hiking the franchise tax from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 capitalization. House, raise \$12,000,000 by a new two-factor tax on interstate corporations.

Natural Gas - Senate, raise \$5,000,000 by increasing the production tax from 7 to 8 per cent House, raise \$36,500,000 by lowering production tax to 5 per cent and adding a 5 per cent sever ance beneficiary tax.

Motor Vehicle Sales - Both houses agreed on increasing the sales tax from 1.1 to 1.5 per cent to bring in an additional \$7,070. 000 to \$8,000,000.

Cigarettes - Senate, raise \$31,-500,000 by boosting tax 3 cents a pack. House, raise \$10,500 (esti-

FRIDAY, JUNE 19, 1959 mated) by a 1 cent a pack in

crease. Utiliites - Senate, increase the tax on water, gas and electric utilities by 20 per cent, for an estimated \$2,600,000. House, increase all other utilities to the telephone company rate of 2.2 per cent, for an estimated \$8, 000.000.

Alcoholic Beverages - Senate increase liquor tax from \$1.40 to \$1.65 a gallon, to raise \$2,000,000 House, increase it to \$2.25 a gallon for \$7,000,000.

Wine, Senate increased tax by 20 per cent, for \$201,000. House doubled it for \$1,000,000.

Senate also tripled fees for selling beer and wine, doubled permits for liquor selling, for an estimated \$1,600,000. House bill does not include this.

Tobacco Products - Senate would tax all such products except snuff, by 12.5 per cent, to raise \$5,400,000. House tax twice this.

Sulphur - Senate voted to re tain present rate. House would reduce from \$1.40 to \$1.03 per ton. There is disagreement as ic whether production increase Rev. N. Femenia, pastor would offset the tax increase in total revenue received

Theatre Admissions -Both House and Senate lopped this by about \$120,000 a year.

Sound Equipment -Senate added a 22 per cent sales tax on radios, televisions, hi-fi and stereophonic sets for an estimated \$3,200,000.

Boats - Senate added 1.5 per cent sales tax on boats and moturs for an estimated \$5,000,000 Property Bill Nixed

For the second time this year the House of Representatives has refused to sweep unclaimed property into the State Treasury Tie vote of 66-66 killed the efforts in the special session. Vote that killed the bill earlier in the regular session was almost as close.

Gov. Price Daniel had urged the measure as a means of rais ing an estimated \$25,000,000 for the State's ailing general fund It would have required banks, oil and gas companies, insurance companies and others to turn over to the state any property belonging to persons who have been missing for more than seven years.






