Lee Holen Tells Of Survival Fight On Alaskan Floes

Local friends have received newspaper clipping from Mrs Lillian O'Neill of Bremerton Wash, a farmer resident, telling of the recent survival fight made on ice floes in the Chukchi Sea of Alaska by her son-in-law, Lee Holen, 43-year-old pilot, and his bear-hunting passenger. George Bauman of Nevada, Mo.

Holen, after completing his military service, has been a bush pilot in Anchorage, Alaska. On a flight to Point Hope, about 300 miles north of Nome, on February 26, his Super Cub plane was forced down after running out of fuel from fighting heavy winds. Fashioning a raft out of the gas tank which they removed from the plane, they made it to shore and for seven days they leaped from one rotting ice floe to another, often sinking to their waists in the frigid waters.

They credited their sleeping bags, although wet, with keeping them alive. They existed on snow for drinking water and some precooked moose sausage and pilot bread. They ran into a party of Eskimos hunting caribou who took them into Kilvalina by dog sled.


