Sanderson Wool Prices Stronger

About 300,000 pounds of wool were sold here Tuesday at a wool sale at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. John T. Williams, owner and manager of the wool house, stated that he believed the sale very good considering the present market.

Eight-months wool brought from 48.50 to 52.75 cents per pounds and there were approximately 155,000 pounds of this type of wool sold.

About 153,000 pounds of twelve months wool brought from a low of 48 cents per pound to 53.25 cents per pound. Prices on the 12-months wool was mostly above 51 cents per pounds.

Buyers indicated that the market has eased off anywhere from two to four cents per pound during the past two or three weeks.

Principal buyers in the local sale were Forte, Dupre, Sawyer Co., Boston, 63,000 pounds of 12 months wool and 77,000 pounds of eight-months wool; Prouvost-LeFebre Co., Inc., Boston, 49,000 pounds of 12-months and 8,500 pounds of eight-months; Emery Russel and Goodrich, Boston, 47,-000 pounds of eight-months; Me-Donald Wool Co., Menard, 33,000 pounds of 12-months; W. F. Drake Jr., San Angelo, 8,300 pounds of 12-months; Bill Fields of Sonora. 12,000 pounds of eight-months. and Colonial Wool Co., Boston, 12,900 pounds of eight-months.

Pipeline Work Begins; Equipment Being Moved

Work on the construction of a 52-mile 20-inch gas transmission line from the Brown-Bassett gas field in Terrell County to a mainline connection of El Paso Natural Gas Co in Puckett Field of Pecos County is scheduled to begin within the week. Key personnel are asembling in Fort Stockton and men and equipment are being moved in to Sanderson for treating the pipe to ready it for assembly into the pipeline. The work is to be done by Western Pipeline Co. of Austin

Western was awarded the contract by El Paso Natural Gas Co. which has under contract a major part of the gas thus far developed in Terrell County. Also included in the contract are eight miles of gathering system lines in Terrell County.

Clint Schell is the project superintendent or Western Pipeline with Jim Gray, Fort Stockton office manager. C. L. Stewart is the general construction super intendent in this area.

Herman Rothmeyer of El Paso Natural Gas Co., will be the project engineer.

Schell said that 175 to 200 men would be employed during the construction peak.

Pipe for the new lines has been stored in freight yards in Sanderson, Dryden and Fort Stockton since last year.

The 20-inch line will connect a \$3 million carbon dioxide removal plant just begun in the Brown-Bassett Field under a contract by the Fluor Corp. of Los Angeles.

It is expected that a peak of 300 employees will be used in the construction of the carbon dioxide extraction plant.

The area east of the stored pipe in Sanderson has been cleared to facilitate the moving of the pipe and heavy equipment used in cleaning and preparing the pipe for installation.

Mobil Oil Co. officials said in New York that about 50 million cubic feet of useable natural gaz per day will be furnished to El Paso Natural Cas Co. from the Brown-Bassett Field. Delivery through the pipeline is expected in December.

Mobil has four wells in the field and plans to drill two more in 1960, it was learned. The oil company owns a half-interest in the field with Western Natural Cas Co owning the other half.

Gas from only one producing formation has been committed to the El l'aso line. Arrangements for sale of gas from other zones in the field have not yet been completed.

Terrell Gas Field Named By RRC

The Texas Railroad Commission, Oil & Gas Division, has granted field designation of Cobbiestone (Strawn gas) for Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Annie Spencer. Terrell County discovery 10 miles southwest of Sheffield

The hole was finaled March 19 for a calculated absolute open flow of i.700,000 cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 11,371-386 feet.

Location of the well is 660 feet from the west and 1,980 feet from the north lines of section 68 Flock B-2 of the CCSD&RGNG Survey.

TEXAS LAWMEN ISAAC W. BURTON, RANGER The First Sea-going Ranger Twenty men to lick an invading force of three warships! But Captain Isaac W. Burton's men were Texas Rangers. It was 1835. His little company had a good long stretch of beach to patrol, the Texas Gulf coast. Orders were to look out for Mexicans and get 'em. On June 3 they saw a ship in the bay of Copano. Said Captain Ike, "We can't swim, so we'll make 'em come after us!" History doesn't detail the enticement used. perhaps a Mexican flag or a petticoat. but a boat promptly came ashore. Just as promptly captured, the rowers were forced to take Captain Burton and a dozen Rangers out to the ship. Very soon, with Captain Ike in command, the ship was headed for Velasco, at the mouth of the Brazos. But contrary winds delayed her. Not ill winds. for while she was hove to, two other Mexican ships showed up. The Ranger Captain, with the unwilling assistance of the Mexican skipper, decoyed their officers aboard his prize ship. When the winds eased a bit the entire prize flotilla eased up to Velasco landing to deliver about \$25,000 worth of arms and supplies to the Texas Army. Thereafter, much to their embarrassment and chagrin, Captain Isaac W. Burton and his sea-going Rangers were known frontier-wide as the "horse marines".
