LISTEN TO LUKE

Sanderson is bulging at the seams right now with newcomers who are employed on the several projects connected with the natural gas industry in Terrell County.

The influx of newcomers is a help to forestall the summer slump to business in normal conditions here.

All of the trailer courts are full and every furnished apartment that we know of is rented and there are few unfurnished apartments or houses not rented.

Another good piece of news for this area is the approval of the construction of Diablo or Amistad Dam. We like the name Diablo, but the great white fathers like the word "friendly" better than "devil", so we might have to start calling it Amistad together.

The dam will afford a recreational facility for all of this portion of West Texas and southwestern New Mexico. A dam with more water than Falcon behind it is a lot of lake. And there is room for a lot of fish. With a potential of 80 miles of backwater, according to their figures, means water backed up in the Rio Grande to just below Dryden in certain circumstances.

It will mean people coming through Sanderson and Dryden and Sheffield, going to the lake. It will mean lots and lots of things for this area.

It will mean the relocation of about 20 miles of highway and railroad, according to officials. This fact might mean a lot more to us than it means to them. There is also a possibility that when the lake is formed there might be a little more rain in this country.

We haven't bought our motor boat and skis yet, nor are we considering it, because of the probable duration of the plans for construction of the dam and right now — it looks like it might never rain enough to fill up a lake in the second place.

It seems recently that most of the writing has been about water. But as long as it is a prime subject for conversation, we will let it pass.

The pump finally came in to get water up to the big storage tank, and that process is being accomplished as quickly as possible. In the meantime, Sanderson people are continuing to use water at a rapid rate.

It was interesting to note the number of people who read The Times last week and curtailed use of outside water prior to installation of the pump. It was also interesting to note how many evidently didn't read The Times.

There was not a shortage of water during the past incident of loss of the pump. But as far as some people were concerned, there was an extreme shortage. They were not getting any water for outside use and no water inside use at times.

When there were some who had water shortage at all. They all they wanted.

Cooperation with the water district manager during times of these conditions of any and all are appreciated by both manager and other residents Sanderson who are affected by such conditions as experienced recently.

It's odd, isn't it, that the Gold-Blue works pretty well also in going to solve such problems recovery after a booster pump is down in the local water system.

Diablo Dam Okay Boosts Area Hopes For Brighter Future

The approval of \$109,554,000 for conclusion of an agreement with Mexico for the Diablo Dam to be constructed 12 miles upstream from Del Rio on the Rio Grande gave a boost to this area's prospects for better days ahead. The project will involve a cost of \$71,846,000 to the United States. The plans include an amendment specifying that the government will not install and operate hydroelectric facilities unless it determines that such units will pay for themselves.

It is said that the project will have 2 1/2 times the storage of Falcon Dam downstream. It will impound six million acre feet of water compared to Falcon's 4,150,000.

The dam will be constructed one mile downstream from the mouth of Devil's River, backing up water for 18 miles. It will have a potential storage of 5,660,000 acre-feet of water. An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons.

The spillway will permit 1,550,000 cubic feet of water to pour over each second. It will be 225 feet high and will have a center section of 1,950 feet of concrete.

It is estimated that 20 miles of railroad and highway will have to be relocated because of the water being backed up over present transportation routes.

The dam will be six and one-half miles long with a total capacity extending the reservoir water 80 miles, providing a 200-mile shoreline.

The site was chosen for Diablo after eight years of study as the

strategic spot to check the flood waters, which when fed by hurricane rains, have caused extensive loss of life and property over the years.

The idea is to gear the operation of Diablo or Amistad Dam with that of Falcon Dam to provide maximum beneficial use of water without lessening the flow below Falcon.

Camp Site Slated For Enlarging In Big Bend Nat'l Park

A \$19,247.00 contract for construction of 18 single and three group-camp ramadas in the Chisos Mountains Basin campground of Big Bend National Park has been awarded by the National Park Service to the J. D. Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo, Supt. Stanley C. Joseph announced this week. The bid was the lowest of seven submitted.

Supt. Joseph said this contract will provide campground shelter complete with stoves and tables and related site preparation to supply 21 additional camp-sites. Following completion of the structures to be built under this contract, the National Park Service will complete fine grading and installation of stoves and tables. The new sites are part of the program to provide additional facilities for increased campground use in Big Bend National Park.

Summer camping in the Chisos Mountains Basin is ideal. Nights are cool, and average daytime temperatures are moderate.

Motel, cabin, diningroom, service station and store facilities are operated by the National Park Concessions, Inc.

Cool Nights and Cloudy Mornings, But No Rain

Cool nights and cloudy mornings have prevailed in this area recently, but rain has been completely lacking.

Temperatures have dipped down to the high 60s during recent nights, with hard and cool breezes blowing during the nights. Dawn has found heavy overcasts, giving hopes for rain, but the sun soon burned off the clouds and caused the temperatures to soar to the 90s during the day.

Ranchmen of the area are searching weather maps for prospects for relief from the heat which is burning weeds, grass, and brush in the pastures, causing a dim outlook for fat and heavy lambs which are to be shipped soon. The lack of green feed is also causing a possibility of the necessity of shipping lambs earlier than is desired by the ranchmen.

Watchword Is 'Safety' For 4th

Thousands of Texans — law enforcement officers, public officials, traffic safety supporters, publicity people, and motorists will make a unified effort during the three-day Fourth of July holiday to do something that has been done only twice in the past eight years: Hold the Fourth of July traffic death toll below the official prediction.

The Governor's office said Saturday that excellent response had been received to Governor Price Daniel's request for statewide cooperation in one of the year's major efforts to "prevent senseless slaughter on our streets and highways" over the Fourth.

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that 27 persons will die in Texas traffic during the 72 hours of the holiday between 12:01 a.m. Saturday, July 2, and 11:59 p.m. Monday, July 4. The Department will compile the state's official fatality list during those hours.

The Fourth of July in 1946 was the last deathless in Texas traffic.

Pipeline Crew Moves In Here

Employees of the Western Pipeline Co. are working out of Sanderson on the project to install a 20" pipeline to carry natural gas from the Brown-Bassett field in Terrell County.

The line is a part of a system gathering gas near Puckett field in Pecos County and from there it goes on to the west coast.

The Western Pipeline Co. has offices in the old roundhouse and crews are being hauled to the work site in buses.

Both rock and welding crews are working out of Sanderson at the present, according to information received, and the crews are capable of laying about two miles of pipe per day, it is said.

Some difficulty is being had in obtaining dirt with which to make the first fill in the ditch over the pipe. This dirt serves as a cushion against rocks and expansion and contraction friction all of which wears off the protective coating which is put on the pipe before it goes into the ditch.

It is estimated that approximately 400 employees will be working on the pipeline at the peak of construction this summer.

The pipe will transport the gas processed at the carbon dioxide extraction plant, now being built in the Brown-Bassett field, to the Puckett field area.

Many of the employees of the pipeline company have house trailers and others have rented all known available furnished living or housekeeping units.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 N. D. Blackstone, an Albany gas discovery in Terrell County, has been depleted, according to information received.

The well was finished on June 11, 1953, for a calculated open calculated absolute open flow of 310,000 cubic feet of gas daily through perforations between 3,405-35 feet. The project was drilled to 12,303 feet and plugged back to 3,751 feet.

Location of the well is 1,980 feet from the south and 3,300 feet from the east lines of section 58 Block B2 of the CCSD&RGNG RR Survey.

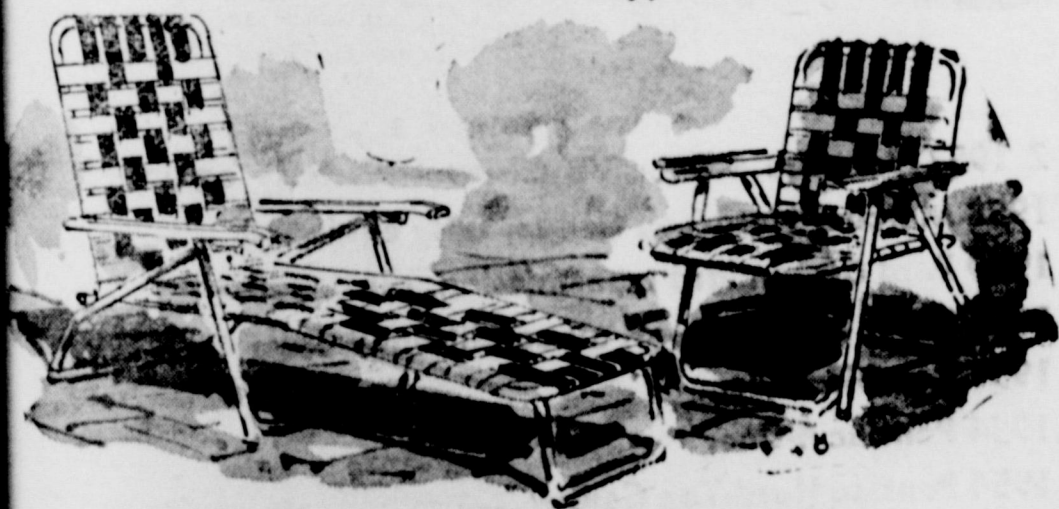

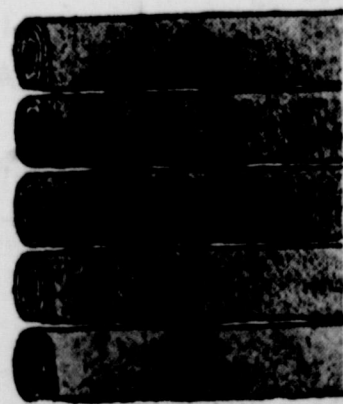
