

Increase In Travel To Park Is Noted

Increases in travel at Big Bend National Park continued over the Labor Day weekend. Use of cottages and of the campground in the Chisos Mountains Basin last weekend increased sharply over the Labor Day weekend last year. The count at the cottages during the past weekend was 358, an increase of 22 percent. The campground count was 808, representing a very sizeable increase of 63

On Saturday, September 2, a new record of attendance at the evening program was set when 263 visitors came to hear the illustrated talk by a park natural-

Total travel for the year to date to the park is more than 10 percent in excess of last year for the same period. During the month of August there were 27 campfire programs with 4,045 visitors in attendance, which is an all-time high.

Area Code Numbers Can Speed Calls To Other Cities

Knowing the area code number for towns where long distance calls are made will speed the completion of long distance calls. according to officials of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Using this new calling method you give the long distance operator the area code and the distant telephone number instead of giving her the name of the town you are calling.

Sanderson residents may inform friends and relatives other cities that the area calling number is 915, thus people calling here would give the operator these instructions: "Area Code Number 915 DI 5-2442"

This procedure would enable the operator to immediately dial this number to the switching equipment which would automatically route their call to Sander-

It was emphasized that knowing the area code number of the long distance telephone you are calling only speeds up the completion of the call. The telephone company asks that you get the area code number of frequentlymade calls to speed up the pro-





time began, unless it is by me in the construction of this sentence.

If you eat it here, it's taxable, if you wear it on the outside, it's not, unless it cost more than \$10. If it's already taxed, you don't tax it again, unless it's beer and when it's eaten with meals.

You buy one newspaper a week and there's no tax, you buy one a week and pay for it in advance and it is taxed. If you buy tomato plant food, it's not taxed, rose food is, unless you put it on tomatoes. Printing is taxed, unless the consumer has an exemption, such as the school, county, etc. We have to pay a tax on the supplies that go into the printing unless we can break down the cost of the ink, grease, oil, electricity, water, etc., that goes into the manufacture of such tax-exempt products. You wonder why your local retailer has been a little cross lately? This is it!

Any or all of the legislators who are trying to dodge the responsibility of all of this, should have to work with it a while and hear the comments of the public.

We know that it is improbable that such could happen, but it is our firm conviction, still, that our state government could save a sufficient amount of money to make up for any deficit we may have in our state treasury. Or come pretty close.

1 can (1 pound) red tart pitted cherries (water pack)

cup sugar teaspoons cornstarch Pinch of salt tablespoon butter

teaspoons lemon juice teaspoon red food coloring Unbaked tart shell** Serve with generous wedges of zesty, tangy, butter-smooth Danish blue cheese.
