

# Here Sunday Night

Wild Chase Ends

After Tire Shot

A wild chase through Sanderson late Sunday night ended after a tire was shot on a car reported to have been stolen, according to a story related by Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey Monday morning. The story follows:

"Larry Eugene Goodwine, a 19-year-old while male who was an employee of Boys' City, a home for delinquent boys near Driskill, admitted the theft of some identification belonging to Morris Ray Harris Jr. of Sinton. The identification included several credit cards. He also admitted the theft of \$270.00 from boys in the home, a pick-up belonging to the home, and drove the truck to Robstown. From there he went to Corpus Christi and bought a .32-calibre automatic pistol and about \$60 worth of clothes on Harris' credit cards. He caught a plane from there to Houston and there he rented a 1962 Chevrolet from the National Car Rental

Service in the name of Harris. "After Goodwine left Houston heading west, he picked up two hitchhikers and drove on to Uvalde where he picked up a third hitchhiker, Jerre Delano Klepsig, white male 28 years old. All four went to Del Rio and registered in a motel Saturday night, going to Acuna with Goodwine paying the expenses.

They left Del Rio about 9:00 Sunday night and headed west on US 90 en route to Juarez. At Comstock, Goodwine and the two hitch-hikers went into a cafe to a cun of coffee and Klepsig ran off with the car, pistol and the money that was left. The three hired a car in Comstock to pursue Klepsig. They stopped in Dryden and Goodwine phoned Sanderson contacting Terrell County Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg and reporting the car stolen. Hogg, who was talking to Constable George Gann at the time, immediately saw the car and made pursuit. Klepsig made an effort to outrun the officers through Sanderson and Gann, using Hogg's .251 rifle, shot at the car. The bullet struck the right rear tire from a distance of about 40 feet and Klepsig lost control of the car, skidding into a post. He jumped out and ran into the pasture north of the highway. Sheriff Cooksey, Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bolinger, and Immigration Officer R. A. Turner Jr. were contacted and after a short search Klepsig was found north of Chester Darr's house. He was arrested and placed in jail. The other three showed up about that time to claim possession of the car and after interrogation by the officers, were held as material witnesses and for further investiga-

Monday morning the sheriff's office in Sinton was contacted for them to make investigation on Harris, and it was learned that Harris was in the sheriff's office in Sinton and reported his wallet stolen. A warrant was sent for the arrest of Goodwine charging felony theft and he was returned to Sinton Wednesday.

The two men picked up out of Houston by Goodwine pleaded guilty to vagrancy and each received a \$1.00 fine.

The car will be returned to Houston by its owners.


