It seems that those who chose to have dealings with that man are now paying again for those dealings, and as was to be expected, the further it goes, the higher it goes.

Some seem to think that the mess is going to go a long way toward the top of the administrative ladder, and it is our opinion that it should go as far as is necessary to find out all those implicated in any wrong-doing.

## **ASC** Committee **Election Coming**

The election of the Terrell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) County Comittee for 1963 will be by mail with the final date for the return of the ballots being September 10, 1962. The commit tee elected will assume their duties October 1 of this year.

Nominees will be selected by petition. Petitions to place names in nomination must be signed by 10 or more eligible voters and must be received in the local office not later than August 22. Persons nominated by petition will have their names placed on the ballot provided such persons are found to be eligible and willing to serve.

If a nominee is found to be ineligible by the present county committee, he will be so notified and he may appeal to the county committee by August 27.

Briefly, eligibility requires that a person be eligible to vote in a county committee election: be a legal resident of Terrel! County, not have been removed or suspended "for cause" from county committee employment or public office, not have been engaged in political activity during the past year, not be a fulltime employee of the U.S.D.A.

Assistance in preparing petitions is available in the county office, according to Clarence Jessup. ASC committee chairman. Jack Harrell and Roy Deaton along with Mr. Jessup, make up the 1962 committee. E. E. Harkins Jr., and Jack Hardgrave are alternate committeemen.

The present county committee will make such nominations as may be necessary to complete a slate of nominees which must be at least ten persons. The committee may also make additiona' nominations if it is necessary to insure representation of the entire county

To be eligible to vote in an ASC election, a person must be of legal soting age, must have an interest in a farm or ranch as owner, tenant, or sharecropper and meet at least one of the foilowing qualifications:

a. A payment is or will be made with respect to the ranch under Agricultural Conservation program or there is being carried out on the ranch at least one approved practice under the cur-

b. A marketing quota or acreage allotment is currently established for the ranch.

c. The person is eligible for a cooperator's loan or other price d. The person is eligible for payment under the National

e. The person is eligible to participate in any other program administered by the county com-

Efforts are being made to reach every eligible person with mailed ballots which should be mailed about September 1. Mr. Jessup pointed out that anyone who does not receive a ballot and thinks he should have one, should contact the county office

Questions on eligibility to vote will be determined by the county committee when the ballots are tabulated. The public is invited to attend the tabulation meeting. the date of which will be announced later.

### Amendment Changes Printed In Digest To Aid Readers

A brief digest of the 14 proposed amendments follows:

NUMBER ONE on the ballot (HJR 25) — Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

NUMBER TWO on the ballot (SJR 9)-Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from forty-seven million dollars (\$47,000,000) to fifty-two million dollars \$52,000,000).

NUMBER THREE on the ballot (SJR 22) - Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree. Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER FOUR on the ballot (HJR 46) - Provides for a state program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reser-

voirs. NUMBER FIVE on the ballot (HJR 51) - Creates hospital dis-

tricts and limits their power. NUMBER SIX on the ballot (HJR 36)-Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers attorney has appealed the case and employees of counties and and asked for a trial by jury in political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more

NUMBER SEVEN on the ballot SJR 13)-Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency. resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members

NUMBER EIGHT on the ballot SJR 7)-Establishes a ceiling of two million, five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

NUMBER NINE on the ballot (HJR 70) - Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

NUMBER TEN on the ballot SJR 12)-Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

NUMBER ELEVEN on the ballot (SJR 25)-Authorizes resale of repossesed lands in the Veteran's Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

NUMBER TWELVE on the ballot (SJR 19) - Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or

the tidewater limits thereof NUMBER THIRTEEN on the ballot (SJR 6)-Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

NUMBER FOURTEEN on the ballot (HJR 32) - Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government,

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections, provided existing obligations are not impaired, but in no event shall any change of rate exceed twenty-five cents (25c) per one hundred dollar valuation.

The Legislature may authorise the governing body of any county bordering on the Guif of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by firtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

Nothing in this amendment shall increase the right of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged in the length of the Constitution

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
