Eagles Bust Alpine 34-22; First Home Game Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles spilled the Class AA Alpine Bucks by a 34-22 score on their own ground last Friday night. It was a non-conference game.

The Bucks blocked an Eagle punt on the 12-yard line early in the first period to set up their first score and their halfback, Llanez ran the ball over from the 3-yard line for the touchdown. The quarterback, Foster, ran the extra point.

In the second period Alpine made their second tally when the fullback Leyva went over from the 7-yard line to cap an 80-yard march. The try for the extra points failed.

In the same period, the Eagles intercepted a Buck pass to begin a 41-yard drive. John Ed Robbins ran 31 yards for the first Sanderson score. The points-after try was no good. In the same period Haley Haynes scored from the 3-yard line. Robbins ran the

extra points and then later in the same period Robbins broke into the clear for 35 yards and the third Eagle touchdown.

The Eagles went into the second half with a 22-14 lead and in the third frame Robbins racked up another score for the Eagles and in the fourth period, Susano Munoz ran for the final Eagle score to make the 34 total.

The Bucks also scored once in the last period, a short run by Llanez, and they also scored the extra points to bring the Buck total to 22 points.

Sanderson stayed away from their passing game against the Bucks and intercepted two of the Buck passes and held them to a 3 out of 8 completion record.

Sanderson was more acquainted with the rules and held their penalties down to 65 yards, getting three 15-yard penalties and four 5-yard penalties.

Proposals For Extensive Highway Work Released

The Times received information Wednesday of the possibility of extensive highway work that is being planned for this area.

Some of the work will be on US 285 and some on US 90 east.

It was learned that there was the possibility of the relocation of the highway on Big Hill, 10 miles northwest of Sanderson and the straightening of curves in the highway near Lozier Canyon.

It is understood that neither job will be a complete relocation of the existing highway, but rather changing curves and the grade where possible and expedient.

District Highway Engineer Archie J. Sherrod stated that the proposals had been submitted for approval by the Texas Highway Commission, according to the source, and that if acceptable by that group, local plans would go ahead immediately.

It was also pointed out that if the proposals were approved, a resident engineer would be moved to Sanderson along with two assistants. Other employees would be sought locally to fill out the crew needed for the planning and supervising.

False Report of Wreck Given Tuesday Night

A false report of a wreck 10 miles east of Dryden was given to Texas Highway Patrolman Malcolm Bollinger Jr. Tuesday night. The person reporting the accident stated that the sheriff, Highway Patrolman, and ambulance were needed at the scene of the accident.

Mrs. Bolinger first answered the phone when the call came and Mr. Bolinger asked her to inquire the name of the person making the report. He gave a name and Mr. Bolinger picked up the phone and the party calling hung up their phone, according to Mr. Bolinger.

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey was notified and a car coming from the east was stopped and they stated that there had been no accident in that direction. Sheriff Cooksey called W. V. Munson, operator of the Sanderson Ambulance Service, and asked him to make a "dry run" out east so that they could check on the possibility of determining the person who made the call.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that a determined effort is being made to find the person guilty of reporting false accidents and that prosecution to the full extent of the law will be sought when the guilty one is apprehended.

It has been pointed out repeatedly that such calls are dangerous, costly, and could prove serious in many ways. In answering an emergency call, the officers and ambulance drive at higher-than-usual speeds, so that they can give aid to injured or distressed people, and possibly prevent another accident because of the wreckage. Traveling at such speeds is dangerous to the officers, and ambulance driver; and costly to go a 60-mile round trip in two or three vehicles.

One of the great dangers, it has been pointed out, is the fact that some actual and real emergency could occur during the absence of the officers and ambulance on a false run.

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A campaign to pass the water conservation amendment on which Texans will vote this November (No. 4 on the ballot) got under way at a meeting of the Statewide Water Committee in Austin.

Proposed amendment would permit the State Water Development Board to acquire storage space in reservoirs built either by local or Federal agencies and conserve storm and flood waters for beneficial use.

The Statewide Committee urged its members to back the amendment and approved the Water Commission's proposed budget. It also commended Gov. Daniel for his "courageous, bold, and dynamic leadership" in bringing about the "greatest and most comprehensive water resources conservation and development program in the history of Texas."

Tick Survey The U. S. Department of Agriculture has turned up five kinds of ticks which are suspected as fever carriers in a survey currently being conducted in Texas.

The Lone Star tick, believed a carrier of Rocky Mountain spotted fever, Q fever, and tularemia and also a transmitter of

Bullis fever, and tick paralysis, has been found in Robertson, Rusk, Colorado, Medina, Kerr, Comal, Nueces, Karnes, Harris, and Hays Counties.

The Cayenne tick, found only in South Texas, is a producer or transmitter of Q fever, and has been discovered in Kenedy County.

The Gulf Coast tick, blamed for tick paralysis, has shown up in Washington County while its imitator (amblyomma immitator) rarely seen in the U.S., was found in Nueces County.

The spirose ear tick (only soft tick of the five) suspected in Q fever and anthrax, has been identified in Randall, Wichita, and Comal Counties.

Schools The men and women who run the schools — board members and administrators — come to Austin on September 30 for their annual conventions. They plan searching looks at the problems of schools, many of which sum up into five letters—M-O-N-E-Y.

Overhaul of the ad valorem tax system was proposed by a series of clinics held by schoolmen earlier this year.

Problems of textbook selection and teaching Americanism will be aired.

The textbook panel will review recent criticisms, as well prospective legislation which may be recommended by a study committee.

Blonde House The Texas House of Representatives is becoming a blonde.

Eleven coats of varnish applied over the years since 1888, have been peeled off the oak woodwork in the House Chamber. Earlier, workmen had done the same peeling job on the paneling on the ground floor of the Capitol.

Beauty of the original wood was thus restored. So a new light blonde look has taken over the Capitol.

Lower Chamber is also getting new flooring and carpets. The House gallery, where so many Texans have sat in hard chairs watching legislation being moved through the House, is getting new upholstered chairs to make the taxpayers more comfortable. Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont whose Rules Committee chairmanship puts him in a general supervisory position on the work of the State Board of Control, thinks it will be finished by November 1.

Old Folks Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools, faced with a report that 3,000 of its "patients" in state mental hospitals aren't

sick — but just old — will ask legislation to do something about it.

Reports indicate county judges are "committing" aged persons to state hospitals mainly because they and their families can't care for them.

Board suggests the State pay part of the cost of placing such persons in privately-owned nursing homes. Sons and daughters would be required to pay the balance. Problem is one of welfare, rather than psychiatry, says the Board. "We now have older persons crowding facilities that are supposed to be used for the mentally ill."

What It Costs

Texans who pay taxes to the state government got an idea of what the new school and welfare programs are costing when Comptroller Robert S. Calvert added up costs for the fiscal year which ended August 31.

State aid to public schools and colleges came to \$533,541,099 up nearly \$100,000,000 over the \$431,974,434 of the previous year. Welfare spending went up from \$188,875,904 to \$212,765,629. Increased federal aid for welfare paid most of the increase.

Highway construction and maintenance totaled \$371,870,298. This is about the same as the previous year.

In all, the state spent \$1,307,623,666, up \$115,000,000 from the previous year.

School Bus Passing

Texas Department of Public Safety says it will crack down this year on motorists who illegally pass a school bus stopped to take on or discharge children. State law requires the driver of any vehicle to stop upon approaching from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children.

Accident Rate Higher In District

"Fatal accidents are on the increase in our District as well as the rest of the state," said Ray B. Butler, commander of the 24-county Midland Highway Patrol District.

Capt. Butler this week released the district's August summary of rural motor vehicle traffic accidents that shows two deaths more than was recorded for the same period of time during 1961.

For the first eight months of 1962, in Terrell County, there was one fatal accident, nine bodily injury accidents; 13 property damage accidents; with a total of 23 accidents. The property damage was \$37,125.00.

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg To Attend Crime School

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg will leave this weekend for Austin to attend a four day school for officers at the Law Enforcement Academy of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin.

Courses will be offered in criminal law and investigation case reports, interrogation, and in narcotics.
