Niles Friday Retires From Railroad Job

When the Southern Pacific passenger train left San Antonio last Friday a group of friends and fellow employees had gathered at the depot to give their "wishes" and a large envelope of money to Niles Friday, porter, who was making his last run before taking his 50-year retirement on account of his age.

Friday was born in Yoakum in 1892. After being left an orphan at the age of three, he was reared by his grandmother who had three children of her own and resided on a farm in East Texas. The grandmother worked for \$3 per week and so as early as nine years of age he recalls milking cows, cutting wood, and performing other chores on neighboring farms to supplement the family's income.

He began his railroad career with the San Antonio and Aransas Pass Railroad (SAAP) at the freight house in San Antonio on September 12, 1912. The next year he transferred to Yoakum to be employed as a passenger brakeman until 1917 when he joined the U.S. Army as a member of the 90th Division, serving in France until he was discharged in 1919. He returned to his old job until 1925 when the Southern Pacific Railroad took over SAAP and he was made a porter but performed the same duties, that of brakeman, until 1942 when white men were placed on head ends of passenger trains as brakemen.

Friday stated that throughout his 50 years of service, he has never been in a train wreck, but he has had some hair-raising incidents. The most outstanding ones were the Corpus Christi storm in 1919, when the city was partially destroyed and the bridge and causeway washed out behind the train; the flood of 1954 when the Pecos River bridge was washed away and also some of the track ahead of Friday's train which spent from Saturday night until Monday afternoon near Langtry and passengers were transferred by helicopter to Del Rio to resume their journey.

For the past 12 years Friday has been running from San Antonio to Sanderson and stated that those years had been among the most pleasant ones of his 50 years' experience.

His wife died in 1949, but he has maintained his home in San Antonio across the street from St. Paul's Methodist Church where he has been an active member for many years. He has a step-son, a son, and two granddaughters there. The son is a mail carrier and his daughter-in-law is a teacher.

When asked about his plans for retirement years, Friday stated that he could hardly wait to get into that \$135.00 chair he had bought last year "just for the occasion".

He is survived by his wife and one son, Robert. Funeral plans are incomplete.

In both whitetail and blacktail country, it was reported that the weather just was not suitable for deer hunting. There has been a cold snap or two, but no prolonged cold weather which seems to affect the willingness of the animals to move around more in the early mornings and late afternoons.

In country where deer are known to range, there seemed to be few or no bucks seen at all by hunters.

Most ranches reported the deer in "good" to "fat" condition.

There was a larger influx of deer hunters and equipment into the Trans-Pecos area this year than in any previous year, according to "main streeters". Local service stations, grocery stores, the drug store, and hardware stores noted a peak business during the two days prior to the opening of the season. Another such boom is expected this next weekend, the second weekend of the 15-day season.

Many Eligible For Social Security Have Not Applied

According to H. P. Thomas, district manager of the Odessa Social Security office, more than one million eligible people 65 years old and older have not yet applied for their social security payments. Many have not applied because they are still working, he said.

However, since last year it has been possible for many older people to collect their full or partial retirement benefits even though they still work.

Under the changed law, those eligible for social security retirement payments may earn up to \$1200 a year and still receive all benefit checks for the year. If earnings are over \$1200, the new rules frequently permit the payment of some social security benefits. The amount payable depends on how much over \$1200 a person earns and on the amount he would normally receive from social security each month.

For each \$2 earnings between \$1200 and \$1700 only \$1 of benefit payments is withheld. For earnings above the \$1700 bracket \$1 of benefits is withheld for each \$1 of earnings.

One example, Thomas said, would be a married couple who are both 67 years old, fully retired, and eligible for \$1800 a year in social security benefits. Even if the husband were working and earned \$2,000 a year, he and his wife would be entitled to social security benefits of \$1250 a year under the new rule.

Persons who want to figure out how much they may receive in social security benefits even though they are working, have been invited to visit the social security office, 1428 East 8th St., Odessa, for further information.

Thomas explained that some of them may be entitled to back payments of up to 12 months.

Want Your Deer Skin???

Successful deer hunters who do not wish to keep their deer hides are asked to bring them by Dudley's Texaco Station where they will be accumulated and sent to the state's hospitals where they will be used in therapy work.

Hunters are asked to throw a handful of table salt on the raw side of the hide, allow it to drain and then roll it up before they bring them to the station.

All hides will be hauled by freight companies free of charge.
