Good Rain Falls Over Two Days

What was said to have been one of the best rains in several years fell over most of Terrell County last weekend. Heaviest rains were in the north and central parts of the county, tapering to light rain in the southern section.

Up to three inches was reported in some sections of the county and to the west in Brewster and Pecos Counties. The figure of 3-inch was reported to the south.

The rain began falling Wednesday night and fell all night all day Thursday and Thursday night, remaining cloudy all day Friday and Friday night.

All of the rain reported fell in a light drizzle or heavy mist.

Results of the rainfall and the following sunshine have been noted in the outcropping of weeds and brush. The mesquite of this area has all put out.

Allison Well Has Multi-Pay; Hoge Hole Is Gasser

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1, W. M. Allison in section 8 of Block A4 Mrs. A. Pride Survey, a Terrell County prospector 18 miles southeast of Sheffield and nine miles northeast of the one-well Brown-Bassett, North (Atoka and Fusselman gas-distillate) field, flowed gas in five minutes rated at 5,700 cubic feet daily, and recovered 130 feet of gas-cut mud on a drillstem test in the Strawn detrital.

Tool was open 2½ hours on the test taken between 9,410-470 feet.

The hole is scheduled to 11,100 feet in the Ellenburger.

A later test in the Strawn revealed a daily flow of gas rated at 25,000 cubic feet and recovered 190 feet of gas-cut drilling mud on a drillstem test in the Strawn.

Gas surfaced in 46 minutes on the 2½ hour drillstem test between 9,333-414 feet. Drilling continued below 9,439 feet.

An earlier test of the Leonard between 3,375-425 feet flowed gas at the daily rate of 297,000 cubic feet and recovered 300 feet of gas-cut mud.

According to information received last week, the O. J. Hoge hole being drilled by Socony Mobil on Section 28, Block 161, had a flow of gas of 10-million cubic feet daily at 14,800 feet.

Screwworm Fly Program Assured

The continuation of the program to control the screwworm in West Texas by the dropping of sterile male flies is assured with the collection of funds necessary for financing the project.

In Terrell County, 90 people donated \$25,204.43 toward the fly control fund.

In a news release from the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, it was reported that 95,432,050 sterile screwworm flies were released during the week March 24-30.

There were 13 screwworm cases confirmed in Texas and 218 non-screwworm cases tested during the week of March 24-30.

During March, Texas reported 50 screwworm cases and 409 non-screwworm cases.

Area ranchmen are urged to call Justice 5-1646, Mission, Collet, when they have a case of what is thought to be screwworms. Samples of the worms will be inspected and if the case is a screwworm, then measures will be taken to care of the elimination of the flies in that particular area, according to information received from the center of the eradication program.

Changes Proposed In Local Schools For Next Year

Supt. H. L. Richardson this week released proposals for some changes during the next school year — 1963-64. The proposals were accepted by the board of trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District at their meeting in February of this year. They have been under consideration, according to Richardson, for several meetings and final action was taken at the February meeting.

The proposals are as follows:

Cut three teachers from the teaching staff in the elementary school; Reorganize by moving the first grade to the new elementary building; Maintain self-contained classes in grades 1 through 3 and use team teaching (departmental work) in grades 4 and 5. Operate Junior High School on a six-period day with one hour class periods, teaching more subjects for one semester rather than for a whole year with 45 minute class periods.

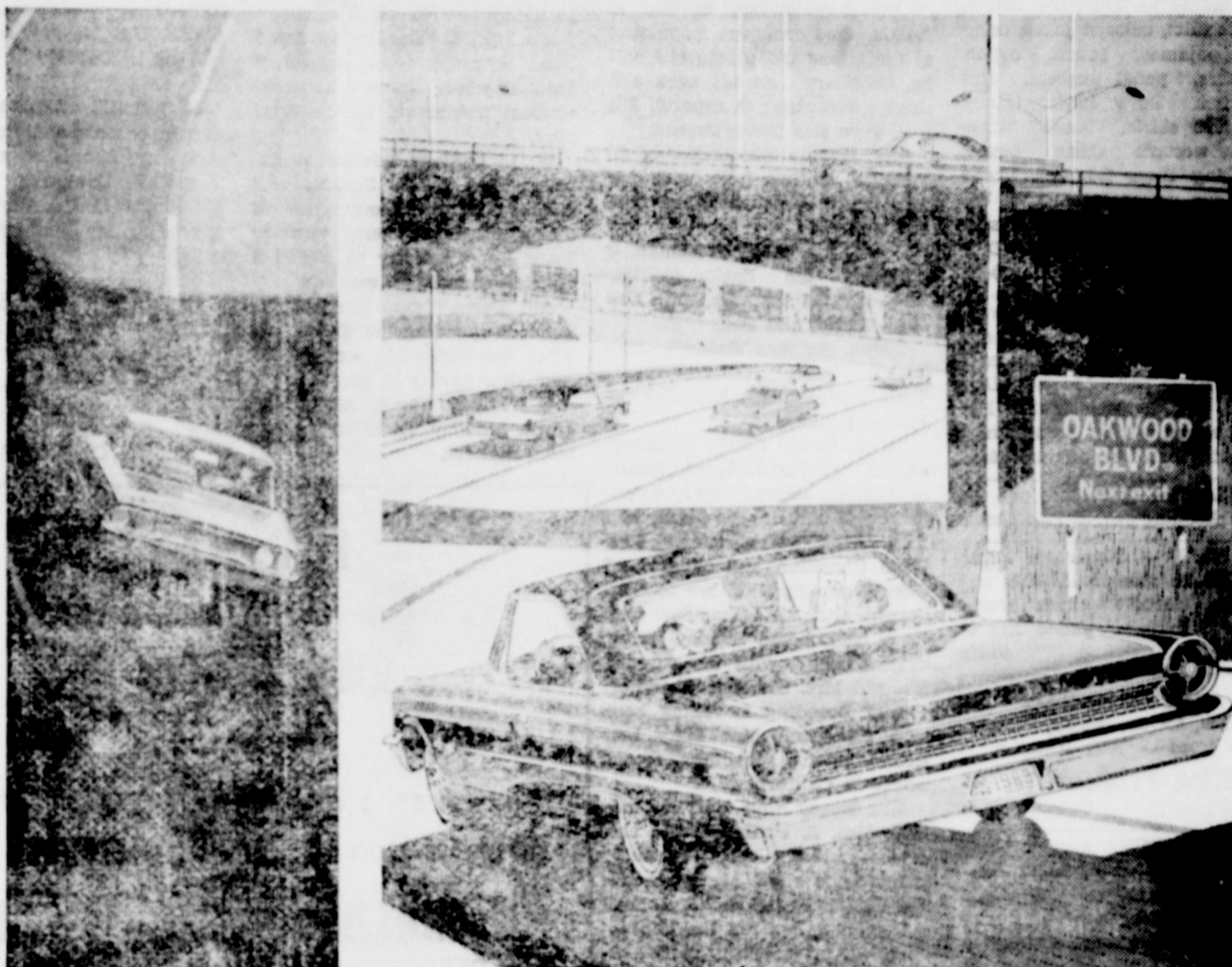

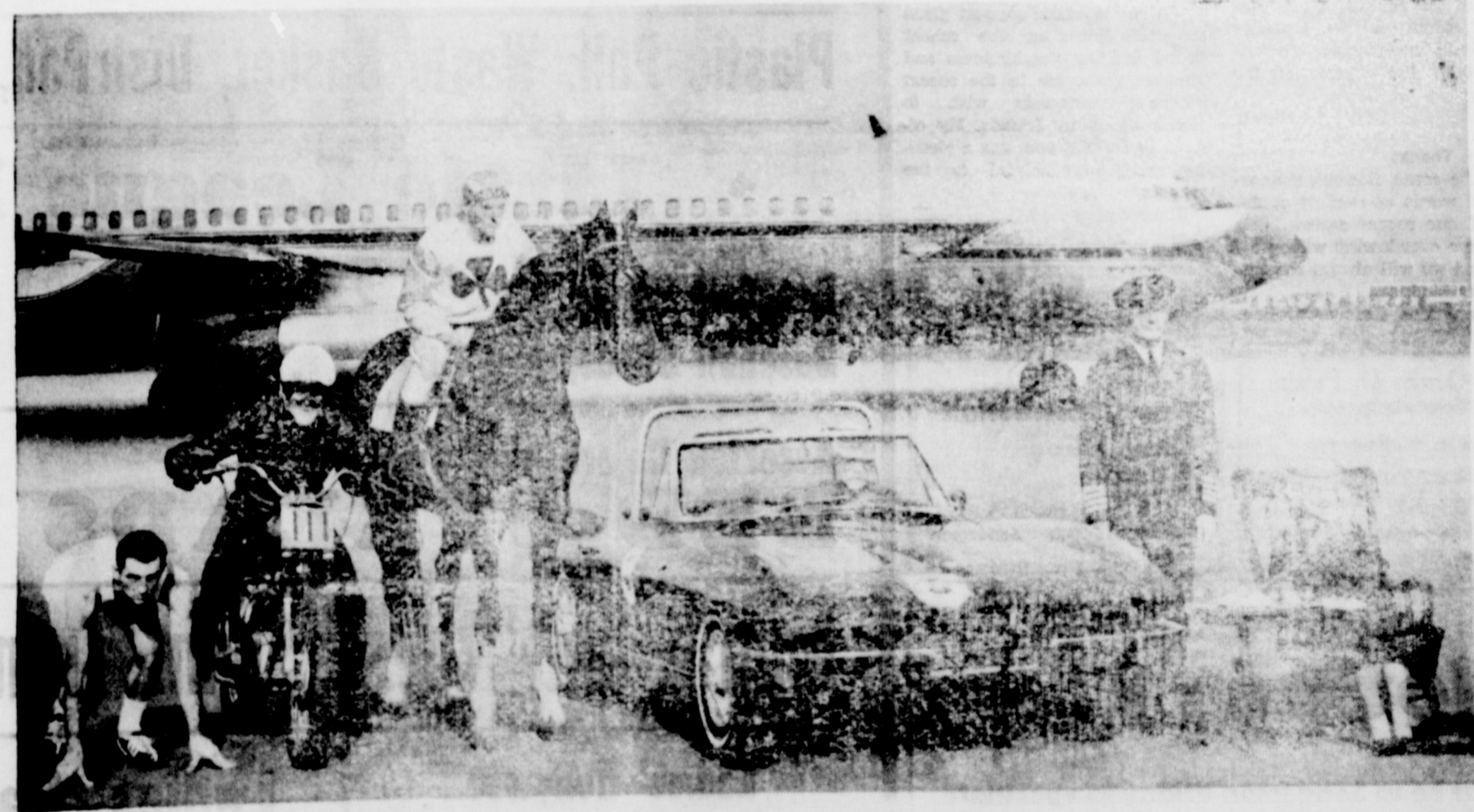

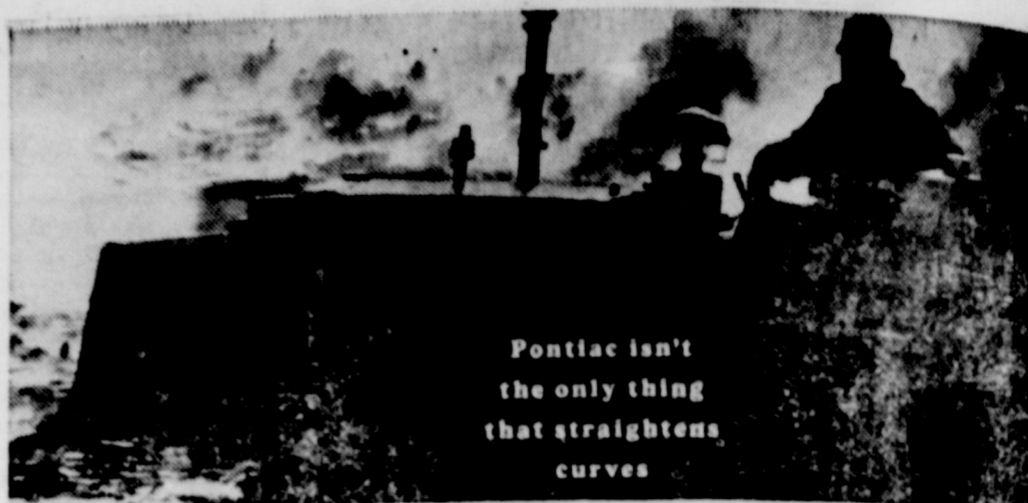
