

Constant Alert" Theme for 1965

tailed child receives vaccination against smallpox. The vaccine that thwarts death and disfigurement has been around for a long time. Yet

despite its development in 1796, smallpox killed 25,000 and afflicted 100,000 around the world during 1964 alone - some 170 Not only in countries burdened

with disease, but as well, in countries cleaned of it does smallpox endanger health still. A few hard facts show why:

· Often a country beset by smallpox lacks enough vaccines to immunize all of its citizens.

· Too, more-primitive groups frequently refuse vaccinations offered, either through fear of it. or because long-held beliefs forbid it. About 12,000 Ecuadorian Quechuas, a mountain-dwelling Indian, so resisted vaccinators recently.

· So long as smallpox exists anywhere, a country even though free is not safe. Wiped-out in the United States and Canada, it still penetrated New York and Toronto — in each instance re-introduced by a traveller, • Also in such countries, few

are the MD's who've seen an

actual smallpox case. Added to this, the disease's tricky to diagnose. Often, a mild case is taken for chickenpox, and a severe one for acute leukemia or meningitis or even pneumonia.

To call public attention to such problems, the World Health Organization chose "Smallpox Constant Alert" as the theme April 7, World Health Day, in observing the 17th anniversary of its founding.

Much has already been done to eradicate smallpox. A global campaign begun in 1958 has cut the number of reported cases by one-fifth - from a high half million of a dozen years ago.

According to WHO Director-General, Dr. M. G. Candau: "The complete eradication of smallpox would not only rid the world of a disease which is a constant menace, but would also show what international co-operation can achieve.

"In the meantime, a 'constant alert' against smallpox will have to be maintained.




